ORDINANCE 84 - 26

To Amend the Bloomington Zoning Maps, Dated June 7, 1978

WHEREAS, the Common Council passed a Zoning Ordinance amendment and adopted new incorporated zoning maps on June 7, 1978 which are now incorporated in Title 20 of the Bloomington Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission has considered this case, ZO-22-84, and recommended that the petitioner, CFC, INC., be granted an amendment to the Bloomington zoning maps and request that the Common Council consider their petition for rezoning of certain property:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, THAT:

SECTION I. Through the authority of IC 18-7-4 that the zoning be changed from BG to BD for property located at 311 West 7th Street, Bloomington, Indiana, more particularly described as follows:

All that part of In Lot Number 270 in the City of Bloomington, Indiana, that lies East of the East Right-of-way line of the Chicago, Indianapolis, and Louisville Railway Company.

Also, part of In Lot Number 269 in the City of Bloomington, Indiana, described as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the Northwest Corner of In Lot Number 269, running thence East 19.2 feet, thence South 132 feet, more or less to a point which is 18.4 feet East of the Southwest corner of said In Lot 269, thence West 18.4 feet to the Southwest corner of said In Lot Number 269, thence North 132 feet to the place of beginning.

SECTION II. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.




