Appeal a Parking Ticket	
	Appeal a parking citation that you believe was written in error without having to appear in person. This appeal automatically freezes your fine so you don't have to worry about getting an answer back before the fine escalates.
Apply to serve on a City Board or Commission	
	Apply for appointment to City Boards, Commissions and Committees. Information about current vacancies is available. Applications are kept on file for one year in case vacancies occur during that time.
Arrange a Wedding Ceremony	
	Civil ceremonies may be performed in our office or anywhere in Monroe County. We have suggestions for ceremony words, or will work with you to make the ceremony meaningful for you.
Find An Ordinance	
	Find an ordinance as it's written and passed in its legislative form, or as it has been codified into the Bloomington Municipal Code.
Explore the City's Municipal Code	
	View the City's Laws online. After legislation is passed into law, it is inserted into the appropriate section of the Bloomington Municipal Code.



Girl Scouts participate in Government Day at City Hall. Girls introduced, debated and voted on legislation that would create a water park on the last bit of greenspace in the city.



Historical Records Division

The Clerks Office holds important historical records from 1845 — the beginning of city government in Bloomington — to the present electronic records. These records include the original charter for the City of Bloomington written on January 13, 1845. The library is open to researchers by appointment.
