



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## Residential Neighborhood Permit Parking Program

CITY OF BLOOMINGTON



### 1. Who is eligible to obtain the Neighborhood Parking Permits?

Individuals who maintain their residence within the Neighborhood Parking Zone may apply for one parking permit per vehicle. Proof of residency for homeowners is a current property tax statement or current utility bill. Renters must submit a current lease. We cannot accept altered leases. A current vehicle registration is also required.

### 2. Is it possible for me to apply for my Permit by mail?

Yes. Complete the application form and send it along with your check, Visa/MasterCard information or money order to the address provided. Be sure to include proof of residency and a copy of each vehicle's current registration.

### 3. What is the fee for the Permits?

Each Permit is \$25. A visitor permit is also \$25 (one per address). Permits expire August 15th of each year. Permits and visitor hangtags are not prorated.

### 4. How do I display my Permit?

Permits must be affixed to the vehicle in the lower left corner (driver's side) of the rear window and must be visible to the Parking Enforcement Officer. Visitor permits hang from the rearview mirror.

### 5. Does the Parking Permit guarantee me a parking space?

No. There are no reserved spaces and Permit holders are not exempt from emergency regulations or other existing parking ordinances or laws.

### 6. Can I park anywhere in the zone with a Permit?

Yes, the Permit allows you to park on-street anywhere in the zone where there is not another parking restriction, such as a No-Parking zone or a yellow curb.

### 7. What do nonresident landlords, realtors and service vehicles do?

If they cannot park off-street, they may use a Visitor Permit from the resident receiving service, or call Parking Enforcement at 349-3436 to notify us of the

specific location where they will be temporarily parked as a special exception. They may also purchase a Service Vehicle Hangtag for \$50. Service Vehicle Hangtags expire August 15th of each year and enables them to park in all ten neighborhood zones.

### 8. Who may purchase a Visitor Permit?

A visitor permit can be purchased by a resident living in the Neighborhood Parking Zone and can be used only by a visitor while temporarily visiting that address. Visitor permits may not be used by anyone residing at the issued address. Only one visitor permit may be purchased per address. Businesses do not qualify for visitor permits.

### 9. What happens if I buy a new vehicle during the year?

Should the make, model or license tag number of your permitted vehicle change during the year, you may bring the new vehicle registration and the old permit to the Parking Enforcement Office, City Hall, 401 N. Morton and obtain a Replacement Permit. The fee for a Replacement Permit is \$10.

### 10. What happens if the residents of a property change during the calendar year?

The new resident may complete an application form and, if eligible, may purchase a permit. Permits are non-transferable.

### 11. What hours will the Parking by Permit areas be enforced?

Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. through 5 p.m. every day City Hall is open. Neighborhood Parking regulations are in effect throughout the year.\*

### 12. How much is the fine for a violation of the Neighborhood Parking by Permit Ordinance?

Violation of this Ordinance and anyone abusing or misusing the Permit is subject to an escalating fine of \$20.

### 13. Does my parking permit allow me to park in all of the ten zones?

No, your permit entitles you to only park in the zone for which it was issued; parking in any other zone will result in a ticket.

## Permit Holders, Please Remember...

- ◆ All permits are vehicle specific.
- ◆ A permit cannot be transferred, sublet or sold.
- ◆ Permits are only valid for the zone in which they were issued.
- ◆ Permit holders are subject to all City of Bloomington parking regulations.

### THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON ORDINANCE 92-06

designates Residential Neighborhood Permit Parking Zones. Residents in those zones may receive Parking Permits that allow only the vehicles with permits to park on the street between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Permits expire August 15th of each year. This Ordinance is meant to protect motorists, bicyclists and pedestrians from excessive commuter traffic competing for parking spaces as well as to reduce the amount of traffic in the neighborhoods.
