ORDINANCE NO. 75-4

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 17 OF THE BLOOMINGTON MUNICIPAL CODE ENTITLED, "BUILDING REGULATIONS"

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, INDIANA:

SECTION 1. The Bloomington Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding thereto Section 17.04.250 which shall read as follows:

> 17.04.250 Location of Heating Devices. No device generating a glow, spark, or flame capable of igniting flammable vapors shall be installed in any open garage or storage area where flammable liquids or gases may be stored, used, or handled. Any such devices referred to above shall be installed in an enclosure of not less than one-hour fire resistive construction and shall receive outside combustion air in conformance with Section 3718 of the Rules and Regulations of Indiana Administrative Building Council, Volume I, 1969. This section shall not apply to devices presently in operation or to replacements thereof.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, promulgation and publication in accordance with the law.

Re: Bullding Code Change

Date: August 7, 1974

On August 6, 1974, upon your recommendation 1 visited with Chester Axsom, Blocmington Fire inspector, to discuss the possible need for Building Code changes to prevent fires in private homes as the result of gas appliances operating where fiamable vapors are stored. Prior to my visit he reviewed the matter with Chief Gose and both mon strongly support the change mentioned below.

T The next step is to have Resous Istrabadi review the matter and then you or the city attorney can draft an ordinance change for city council approval...(I hope). I'll also try to get support from the Builder's Association If appropriate.

I'll call Mr. Istrabadi and arrange an appointment this memo is intended to keep you up to date.

The changes will have to be made in the One and Two Family Dwelling Code 1971 edition.

We want to restrict the location of heating devices that use a flame, glow or spark (particularly gas furnaces and gas water heaters) so that they cannot be placed in one or two family dwellings where flamable vapors can be stored. (See chapters II, I3, and I9 of Code)

Note: The matter of water heaters requires special attention because the code is very vague on their location, etc.

This past year at least four Bloomington fires were caused in one family homes by gas vapors in garages with gas hot water heaters!!!

Dear Sir:

I am interested Asubmitting some sort of an addendum to the One and Two Family Dealling Code that will codify the setting of gas fired furnaces or water heaters, incinerators perhaps, and the like in domestic garages or other spaces where combustibles might be stored.

Our City Fire Department has recorded several fires due to "improper" setting of gas fired units in house, and want something done.

I suggest this addendum, in essence:

"All gas fired units that are to be installed in any garage or storage shall be enclosed in a one hour enclosure, with clearances according to N-1303, and shall receive outside combustion air with quantities as required by Chapter 12 of this Code."

In the meantime with your approval, I wish to establish this, or something very similar for use in the Blownington City Code.

Déar Rasoul:

I appreciated your letter advising me of Dale Gatlin's response to your letter of September 4. I have the impression that Mr. Gatlin supports our position that single family dwellings should have restrictions placed on the location of appliances that can cause fires. Particularly where gas and other highly combustible materials are stored.

The fact that Mr. Gatlin will consider our proposal sometime in the future does not lead me to feel encouraged. The definition of sometime in the future is very vague.

I would urge you to consider proceeding with our original plan. That is, to have our City Council pass a new ordinance preventing dangerous appliances being placed in new homes in places where gas and other highly inflamable materials are stored. We are literally playing with peoples lives here. As I pointed out in previous correspondence, this is a terribly dangerous situation.

Please call me at your earliest convenience so that we can plan a campaign to have legislation passed locally.

Enclosed is a draft of an ordinance concerning the location of heating devices as requested by you. You will note that I have taken the liberty of changing the language of your proposal and hope it meets with your approval.

I would emphasize that this is merely a draft and probably will have to be changed further. I have several questions about it myself. The way it is written, it could apply to present locations; do we want to limit it to future construction? The way it is written, it is not limited to dwellings; do we want this? No reference is made to size or location of the enclosure. I am sure you will have further questions and/or observations. Let's get together and discuss it further.
