ORDINANCE NO. 24, 1956

An Ordinance to protect the Public Health against Disease and Poisons resulting from insanitary accumulation or dumping of garbage, rubbish or trash, prescribing regulations therefor and providing penalties for violations.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to throw, place or scatter any garbage, rubbish, trash or other refuse, over or upon any premises, street, alley, either public or private, or to suffer or permit any garbage, rubbish, trash or other refuse to be placed or deposited on premises owned, occupied or controlled by such person, firm or corporation, either with or without the intent to later remove, cover or burn the same;

Section 2. This ordinance shall not restrict the filling of low lands within the city with brick, stone, sand, gravel, ashes (cold), or dirt.

Section 3. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or by imprisonment in the County Jail for a periodnot exceeding Thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and each day's continuance in such violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4. All ordinance or parts of ordinances in conflict berewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall be in effect after its passage and publication as provided by law.
