RESOLUTION 99-18

ALLOCATION OF 1999 DISCRETIONARY SOCIAL SERVICES FUNDS

- WHEREAS, the Mayor and the Common Council budgeted one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for discretionary social services funds in 1999; and
- WHEREAS, the Social Services Funding Committee of the Common Council (Committee) was established to make recommendations to the full Council regarding the allocation of these funds; and
- WHEREAS, The Committee includes council members Patricia Cole, Tim Mayer, Tony Pizzo, L. David Sabbagh, and Jim Sherman, and Community and Family Resource Commission members Regina Moore and Michael Shermis; and
- WHEREAS, the Committee invited agencies to apply for these funds and applied the following criteria in making their recommendations:
 - 1. The program should address a previously identified priority for social services funds (as indicated in the SPAN/MC or another community-wide survey of social service needs); and
 - 2. The funds should provide a one-time investment that, through matching funds or other fiscal leveraging, makes a significant contribution to the program; and
 - 3. This investment in the program should lead to broad and long lasting benefits to the community;
 - and
- WHEREAS, on May 20, 1999 the Committee reviewed the twenty-three applications submitted, rated them on a scale of 0 to 5, and recommended funding three proposals with a rating of 5, without hearing presentations, as well as hearing presentations from eleven other agencies regarding their applications, which had ratings from 2.8 to 3.5; and
- WHEREAS, the three proposals with a perfect rating include:
 - 1. the Community Kitchen of Monroe County, Inc, which requested \$4,650 for food cooling equipment,
 - 2. Hoosier Hills Food Bank, which requested \$14,394 for a refrigeration box and condensing unit, and
 - 3. Stone Belt, which requested \$4,000 for two industrial sewing machines; and
- WHEREAS, on May 27, 1999 the Committee heard presentations from eleven agencies and recommended allocating the following amounts to the following nine agency proposals:
 - 1. \$10,000 to Amethyst House for a van,
 - 2. \$17,1444 to the Dental Care Clinic for two dental chairs and related equipment,
 - 3. \$ 8,208 to The Evergreen Institute on Elder Environments to be used towards the construction of a residential facility on South Washington Street,
 - 4. \$ 9,300 to the Housing Authority to replace roofs on three buildings at the Reverend Butler and Walnut Woods complexes,
 - 5. \$11,850 to Monroe County United Ministries to purchase furniture and equip their expanded food service area,
 - 6. \$ 1,029 to Mother Hubbard's Cupboard to fund their incorporation as a nonprofit, to install a refrigeration unit, and, if any funds remain, to acquire food for their clients,
 - 7. \$ 5,000 to Planned Parenthood of Central Indiana to purchase one handicap accessible examination table for their South College facility,
 - 8. \$10,125 to South Central Community Action Program Head Start to purchase equipment for a full-day, full-year classroom and related playground area at the Adams Bend development, and
 - 9. \$ 4,300 to Shelter, Inc., to allow three staff members to travel and attend two Parents as Teachers (PAT) sessions; and

V/HEREAS, the Committee decided not to recommend funding to Girls, Inc., which requested \$4,969 for an automatic door, and Family Services Association, which withdrew their request this year for a \$25,000 contribution towards a new facility; and

V/HEREAS, the twelve agencies receiving funds understand the terms of the funding agreements which have been prepared for each grant and agree to abide by the terms of those agreements;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, THAT:

1. The Common Council allocates the one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) set aside for social services funds in 1999 in the following manner: Amethyst House (\$10,000), Community Fitchen of Monroe County (\$4,650); Dental Care Clinic (\$17,144), The Evergreen Institute on Elder Environments (\$8,208); Hoosier Hills Food Bank (\$14,394), Housing Authority (\$9,300); Monroe County United Ministries (\$11,850); Mother Hubbard's Cupboard (\$1,029), Planned Farenthood of Central Indiana (\$5,000), Shelter, Inc. (\$4,300), South Central Community Action Frogram – Head Start (\$10,125), and, Stone Belt Center (\$4,000).

2. The Council approves the funding agreements for these allocations, which are attached and made a part of this resolution, and directs the Office of the Controller to issue checks in the ordinary course of business once a copy of the signed agreement is submitted along with the appropriate purchase order.

3. The Council authorizes its President to resolve any questions regarding the implementation c f the funding agreements.
