

RESOLUTION 96-13

ALLOCATION OF 1996 DISCRETIONARY SOCIAL SERVICES FUNDS

WHEREAS, the Mayor and the Common Council budgeted fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for discretionary social services in 1996; and

WHEREAS, the Social Services Funding Committee of the Common Council, which included council members Patricia Cole, Tony Pizzo, L. David Sabbagh, Pam Service and Jim Sherman, and two Human Resource Commission appointees, Jack Harlow and Wendy Perry, invited agencies to apply for these funds and fifteen applications for funding were received; and

WHEREAS, the following criteria were given to these agencies and guided the Committee in making their recommendation:

- 1) The program should address a previously identified priority for social services funds (as indicated in the COMPASS or another community wide survey of social service needs); and
- 2) The funds should provide a one-time investment that, through matching funds or other fiscal leveraging, makes a significant contribution to the program; and
- 3) This investment in the program should lead to broad and long lasting benefits to the community;

and

WHEREAS, after reviewing the applications, the Committee invited six agencies to make presentations about their proposals and discussed alternate funding with the Mayor's Office regarding a seventh; and

WHEREAS, the six agencies were: Boys and Girls Club of Monroe County, Inc.; Dental Care Clinic; Girls, Inc., Head Start; Middle Way House; and Shelter, Inc.; and

WHEREAS, after listening to the presentations and questioning the staff of these agencies, the Committee recommended that these six programs receive funds; and

WHEREAS, the Boys and Girls Club of Bloomington requested \$6,338 to equip the new quarters for their Crestmont Satellite Center and the Committee recommended \$3,000 in funding to be used for central air-conditioning; and

WHEREAS, the Dental Care Clinic requested \$1,450 to purchase a machine (Triad 6000) that makes and relines dentures and to upgrade a second, donated computer, to help process insurance claims and the Committee recommended funding their entire request; and

WHEREAS, Girls, Inc. requested alternate proposals ranging from \$15,500 to \$28,600 for a 15 passenger van that will be available for transporting children for Girls, Inc. and other social services agencies, and the Committee recommended funding \$10,000 towards a van; and

WHEREAS, Head Start requested \$11,036 for Summer Start, a pilot day-long child care program, and the Committee recommended funding \$4,400 for building improvements, program materials and insurance; and

WHEREAS, Middle Way House requested all \$50,000 for the Child Care Facility in their proposed Transitional Housing Center and the Committee recommended funding

\$17,350 for this purpose; and

WHEREAS, Shelter, Inc. requested \$13,225 for the Moving Ahead Project, which will help provide transitional housing for homeless families who are seeking to become self-sufficient and the Committee recommended funding \$10,000 toward this project; and


WHEREAS, along with recommending funds for these six agencies the Committee also considered a request from a seventh agency, Hoosier Hills Food Bank, for the funding of a prior commitment made by the City to pay \$15,200 over 1996 and 1997 for a refrigerated truck; and

WHEREAS, after hearing an offer from the Mayor's Office whereby half of the funding of \$7,600 to be paid in 1996 would come from discretionary social services funds and half would come from other funds, and all of the \$7,600 to be in 1997 would come from other funds, the Committee recommended funding \$3,800 for the refrigerated truck;


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, THAT:

The Common Council allocates the fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) set aside for social services funds in 1996 in the following manner: Boys and Girls Club of Monroe County, Inc. (\$3,000); Dental Care Clinic (\$1,450); Girls, Inc. (\$10,000), Head Start (\$4,400); Hoosier Hills Food Bank (\$3,800), Middle Way House (\$17,350); and Shelter, Inc. (\$10,000).


