

ORDINANCE 81-52

To Amend the 1981 Salary Ordinance for Appointed Officers and Employees
to Create Two New Positions in the Human Resources Department

BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON,
MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, THAT:

SECTION I. From and after the eighteenth day of May, 1981, pursuant
to IC 18-2-1-10, the following classified positions, salaries, and pay
schedules for the Human Resources Department be incorporated into Section
I of Ordinance 80-63, Salary Ordinance for Appointed Officers and Employees
of the City of Bloomington:

Section I. Human Resources

Project Director/Training and Referral	\$13,000
Human Resources Specialist/Displaced Homemaker's Project	10,920

SECTION II. From and after the 18th day of May, 1981, pursuant to
IC 18-2-1-10, the following classified position, salary, and pay schedule
for the Human Resources Department be deleted from Section I of Ordinance
80-63, Salary Ordinance for Appointed Officers and Employees of the City
of Bloomington:

Section I. Human Resources

Project Director/Non-Traditional Employment for Women	\$12,254
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
SECTION III. The rate shown as wages and salaries for the positions

and after its passage by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.


