## ORDINANCE 76-4

## AN ORDINACNE TO AMEND THE BLOOMINGTON ZONING MAPS, DATED JUNE 22, 1973

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Bloomington, Indiana, passed a Zoning Ordinance amendment and adopted new incorporated zoning maps on June 21, 1973, and

WHEREAS, said Zoning Ordinance and maps are now incorporated in the "Bloomington Municipal Code" as Title 20 of said Code, and

WHEREAS, Section 20.09.03.00 permits the Common Council to officially designate buildings, structures, or districts as "historic", and

WHEREAS, the City Plan Commission, upon advice of the Historic District and Buildings Study Committee, has recommended the designation of certain structures, buildings, or sites as "historic",

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, that under the authority of Chatper 174 of the 1947 Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana as amended that the following described property be designated as an historic building:

SECTION 1. That incorporated map number 7 of June 22, 1973, be amended to designate the building commonly known as Farmer House located at 529 N. College Avenue as an historic building within the City of Bloomington, Indiana, the land on which such building is located described as follows, to-wit:

Abstract - Lot 5, Woodburn's Addition, being a subdivision of Out-Lot #37.

SECTION 2. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor.
