## ORDINANCE 76-53

#### SYNOPSIS

# ORDINANCE 76-<u>53</u>

When money is budgeted for use by the City departments, it is broken into "line items," such as services personal, equipment, etc. State law requires that money from one item cannot be used for something covered by another line item without a budget transfer by ordinance of the Common Council.

City Court would like to be able to reimburse the bailiff for automobile expenses. Court does not have money in Services Contractual to reimburse the Bailiff for using his own car when a police car is not available for City Court business. The Court now has a Bailiff paid by the Police Department so there is money left in Services Personal for the Bailiff's Salary which is available for transfer to Services Contractual for travel expenses.

The Controller's Office is overspending its postage budget because of increased cost of a first-class stamp and because they must mail a heavy health insurance report once a month. In the past this report was hand delivered to a local office. The phone account is also drawn down because the bill was unusually high at the first of the year due to frequent calls to the health insurance billing office which is in Illinois. At present there is just enough money in Office Supplies to cover the remainder of the year plus this transfer.
