SECTION 1. 



SYNOPSIS
APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE 76-7

AN ORDINANCE TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FROM THE GENERAL FUND
TO THE PLAN DEPARTMENT

Under state law, no money can be spent by the city without authorization from the Council in the form of an appropriation ordinance. Since the monies covered by this ordinance were not part of the budget for 1976 passed last August, they must now be approved by the Council if they are to be spent.

This ordinance appropriates money to the Plan Department to replenish its budget for printing expenses that were depleted by the printing of the Zoning Ordinance. Since the copies of the Zoning Ordinance are being sold for six dollars each, it is anticipated that the General Fund of the city will be reimbursed for the \$900 that the printing cost. However, the money recovered from the sale of the ordinances will go into the General Fund and not into the Plan Department's budget because of restrictions placed on budgetary procedures by state law.
