Ordinance 23-16

Amendments to Title 7



Dangerous Animal Ordinances

- Joint recommendation by the Bloomington Animal Control Commission and the Monroe County Animal Management Commission
- Simplifies the Dangerous levels down to three.
- Utilizes Ian Dunbar's bite classifications that are accepted by behaviorists and trainers
- Allows a dangerous declaration to be made in the event of a severe mauling or death of another dog.

THE DUNBAR DOG BITE SCALE The Five Levels of Dog Bite Severity At Least Two Punctures Deeper than One Canine Puncture Teeth **One-to-Four** Deeper than Punctures Teeth **Skin Contact** from Single with No. Level 5 Bite **Punctures** Aggressive Level 4 Behavior Level 3 Level 2 Level 1

Potentially Dangerous

- (1) Causes injury to a person for a single unjustified bite with no punctures deeper than ¹/₂ the canine tooth and with little to no bruising or abrasions; or
- (2) Causes an unjustified severe injury, or causes injuries leading to the death of a domestic pet or domestic livestock.

Dangerous

- (1) Causes an unjustified single bite with at least one deep puncture to a person; or
- (2) Causes an unjustified severe injury or injuries leading to the death of a domestic pet or domestic livestock, where the situation or injuries are particularly egregious.

Vicious

Any animal which has bitten a person causing severe injury or causing wounds that are potentially dangerous to the person's health or life; or that result in permanent scarring or disfiguring to a person.

- Requires animals to be microchipped at any level for proper identification
- If declared Dangerous or Vicious, the animal is required to wear a muzzle when off property.
- Proper containment and leash handling at all levels

Deer Feeding Ban

- Address a source of human/ deer conflict
- Looks out for the health and welfare of our wild deer population
- The Deer Task force put a lot of thought and care into the language of this ordinance.

Why?

 Deer can become used to human presence, leading to dangerous interactions between deer and humans. 3

- Damage to the natural habitat. Deer being fed also eat vegetation in the surrounding area, which can lead to overbrowsing. Plants in that area can be damaged or destroyed by the deer. The result is a habitat that supports fewer animals.
- Decreased nutrition for deer during winter. Deer are ruminants similar to cows and have a multichambered stomach with a complicated digestive process. If the type of food the deer consume is suddenly changed through feeding by humans, it can take considerable time for the digestive process to adapt to the new food. The animal receives little nutrition when it needs it most.
- Negatively affect deer behavior, leading to increased conflict among deer.
- Alter the migratory movements of deer to critical wintering areas.
- Increase the number of deer-vehicle collisions.

- Specific as to what constitutes feeding:
 - food on ground or a low structure under 5 feet.
 - Food: corn, fruit, oats, hay, nuts, wheat, alfalfa, salt blocks, grain, vegetables, wildlife and livestock feed.
- Exempts activities by authorized individuals
- Exempts bird feeders and gardening or raising crops

Costs for the care of animals have increased significantly since last update.

- Small increase for animals surrendered from outside of Monroe County.
 - Dogs or cats over six months of age \$30
 - Litters with 5 or fewer animals \$35
 - Litters over 5 animals \$45
- Increase in adoption fees (not to exceed)
 - \$120 cats and dogs
 - \$75 for rabbits
- Increasing fees for monitoring dangerous (\$25) and vicious animals (\$50)

Habitual Offender

Two instances for requesting a declaration of Habitual Offender

- 1) The Owner/guardian is found to have violated any provisions of the Bloomington Municipal Code Title 7 on at least 3 separate occasions in a 24 month period; or
- 2) The Owner/guardian of an animal which has been declared potentially dangerous or vicious fails to comply with the terms and conditions required by Title 7 and the Animal Control Commission for maintaining such and animal.

Requirements:

- Make additional changes to rectify situation
- Additional Fines
- Removal of animals from care
- Prohibit the individual from acquiring new animals for a period of time
- Responsible pet owner class

Proposed Amendment: (additions are shown in **bold** and deletions in strikethrough)

1. <u>Ordinance 23-16</u>, Section 7 shall be amended to replace gendered "his or her" pronouns referencing a single person with the gender neutral pronoun "their," as follows:

Section 7.26.020, entitled "Hearing on declaration," shall be amended by adding the word "dangerous" set off by commas in the last sentence after the words "potentially dangerous" in Subsection (f) so that the subsection reads:

The findings of fact shall be given to the owner/guardian, or his or her their legal counsel, by certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the owner/guardian's address, or his or her their legal counsel's address. Immediately upon the mailing of the commission's findings of fact, the animal shall be classified as potentially dangerous, dangerous, or vicious. Concurrently, the director shall notify the owner/guardian of the declaration in person or by phone.

2. <u>Ordinance 23-16</u> shall be amended by inserting a new Section 22 and renumbering subsequent sections accordingly. The new Section 22 shall read as follows:

SECTION 22. All instances of "his or her" or "his/her" appearing in Title 7, Chapters 01, 26, 40, 54, and 56 shall be replaced in their entirety with the word "their." The words "he or she" in Section 7.54.110 shall be replaced with the word "they."

Synopsis

This amendment is sponsored by Cm. Piedmont-Smith. It replaces instances of gendered pronouns with the gender neutral pronoun "they" or "their."
