One resolution will be ready for final action and one appropriation ordinance will be ready for introduction at next Wednesday's Regular Session. A copy of the revised resolution can be found in this packet and the memo, background material, and summary for that legislation can be found in last week's packet (*See link above*). The appropriation ordinance, memo, and background material can be found in this packet and are summarized herein.

First Readings:

<u>App Ord 10-01</u> appropriates \$149,512.38 from the Cumulative Capital Development (CCD) Fund to pay for the City's portion of the costs of improvements to the Atwater/ Henderson Intersection. These improvements are intended to address safety issues and will have a total cost of approximately \$903,037. The bulk of the costs will be paid with a federal Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) grant sought by the Bloomington/Monroe County Metropolitan Planning Organization. Here is a break-down of the costs, matches, and reimbursements:

² The estimate for construction costs includes a 10% contingency.

Project

The Memo to the Council from Justin Wykoff, Manager of Engineering Services, indicates that the project should slow traffic, reduce accidents, and improve conditions for all users in general and for pedestrians in particular. *(See attached site design.)* To that end, the project will:

- Provide a traffic signal with pedestrian crosswalks and signal heads at the intersection of Atwater and Henderson;
- Correct deficiencies in sight distances;
- Reduce pavement areas; and
- Reconfigure the right-turn exit from Atwater onto Dunn and the left-turn exit from Atwater onto Indiana.

In addition the project will improve the collection of stormwater at the intersection.

Project Status

The design work, which "involved extensive public input along the way," has been completed and the acquisition of right-of-way "should be secured" by mid-February. The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will conduct the bidding and oversee the expenditures. The construction should start this summer and extend into the fall. Please note that, because of the 4-5 month schedule, the construction could not be done without interfering with traffic at the end of one school year or the beginning of the next.

RESOLUTION 10-01

TO APPROVE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE MAYOR FOR DISTRIBUTION OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) FUNDS FOR 2010

 WHEREAS, the City of Bloomington, Indiana, is eligible for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds in the approximate amount of \$886,670.00 for Fiscal Year 2010 pursuant to the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended; and

WHEREAS, the national objectives of the Community Development Program are:

1. first and foremost, the development of viable urban communities, including decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities principally for person of low and moderate income; and

2. the elimination of slums and blight, and the prevention of blighting influences and the deterioration of property and neighborhood and community facilities of importance to the welfare of the community, principally for persons of low and moderate income; and

3. the elimination of conditions which are detrimental to health, safety, and public welfare, through code enforcement, demolition, interim rehabilitation assistance, and related activities; and

4. the conversion and expansion of the nation's housing stock in order to provide a decent home and suitable living environment for all persons, but principally those of low and moderate income; and

5. the expansion and improvement of the quantity and quality of community services, principally for persons of low and moderate income, which are essential for sound community development and for development of viable urban communities; and

6. the integration of income groups throughout the community by spreading persons of lower income into more prosperous neighborhoods and drawing persons of higher income to declining or deteriorated neighborhoods; and

7. the alleviation of physical and economic distress through the stimulation of private investment and community revitalization; and

- WHEREAS, federal guidelines set forth a formula for funding where no more than 15% of the total grant may be allocated for social services programs, no more than 20% of the total grant may be allocated for administering these funds, and at least 65% of the total grant must be allocated for physical improvements; and
- WHEREAS, the allocation for administering the grant may be used for a broad range of direct and indirect costs which includes but is not limited to salaries, rent, and fuel; and
- WHEREAS, a proposed statement of community development objectives and projected use of the funds has been advertised; and
- WHEREAS, said statement and projected use of funds reflects programs recommended by the Mayor with input from the Citizen's Advisory Committees and the Redevelopment Commission and are consistent with local and national objectives of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, THAT:

SECTION II. In the event the City of Bloomington receives more or less of the anticipated funding that amount shall be distributed in the following manner:

Physical Improvements: If HAND receives more than expected, the additional funding will be first given to Community Kitchen until they receive their requested amount, then distributed evenly among the other projects. If HAND receives less than expected, the reduction will be evenly deducted from all projects.

Social Services: If HAND receives more than expected, the top three scoring applications will receive an increase proportionally to their allocation. The remaining applications will get an equal share of the remainder of the funds. If HAND receives less than expected, the reduction will made proportionately over all allocations.

SECTION III. This resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.

SYNOPIS

The City of Bloomington is eligible for a Community Development Block Grant of approximately \$886,670 from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for fiscal year 2010. This resolution allocates that funding. It outlines program recommendations by the Mayor with input from the Citizen's Advisory Committee and the Redevelopment Commission. General program areas include: Social Service Programs, Physical Improvements, and Administrative Services.

Note on Revisions: This resolution was revised after it was distributed in the Council Legislative Packet, but before it was introduced at the Committee of the Whole. The revisions were suggested by Council President Piedmont-Smith and inserted two new whereas clauses (#3 and #4) which describe the federal allocation formula and elaborate upon what constitutes administrative costs.

This ordinance appropriates \$149,512.38 from the CCD Fund for the 10% local match and construction inspection portions of the Atwater & Henderson Intersection Improvement Project.

Dear Council Members,

The Atwater Avenue/Henderson Street Intersection Improvement project has been developed to address safety issues at the intersection.

Federal funding for the project has been secured through the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) which is administered through INDOT and the local Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). This funding is eligible for only the Construction and Construction Inspection portions of the project at a rate of 90% (INDOT) / 10% (City). This Appropriation Ordinance is requesting \$149,512.38 to provide the needed funding to complete this project, and a detailed funding breakdown of the costs are attached to this document, and with the understanding that of this appropriation amount; \$74,756.14 will be reimbursed to the City by INDOT.

Project Purpose

The project will provide a traffic signal at the intersection of Atwater Avenue and Henderson Street with pedestrian crosswalks and signal heads. Sight distance deficiencies at the intersection will be corrected. Total pavement areas will be reduced, and the exit to Dunn Street and left turn from Atwater Avenue onto Indiana Avenue will be reconfigured. The addition of a stormwater collection system is another major feature of the project. All of these improvements will serve to slow traffic, improve walkability, and generally improve conditions for all users. It is anticipated that accident rates will decrease following improvements, justifying use of safety funds.

Project Status

Design has been completed with extensive public input along the way. The acquisition of right-of-way is being finalized and is expected be secured by the time Council meets. Bids will be received by the Indiana Department of Transportation, and the award and start of construction will take place this summer. Construction will extend into fall semester, but is estimated to be complete in 4-5 months.
