BLOOMINGTON BOARD OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Bloomington Board of Public Safety held a Regular Session on **Tuesday, November 21, 2023, at 6:00 p.m.,** in the McCloskey Room, Room 135, City of Bloomington located at 401 N. Morton Street, Bloomington, Indiana.

CALL TO ORDER

Board Member Isak Nti Asare called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Board Members Barbara McKinney and Rachel Guglielmo were present in person and Board Member Natalia Galvan was present via Zoom.

Also in attendance were Fire Interim Deputy Chief Max Litwin, Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham, Police Captian Ryan Pedigo, and Board Secretary Ashley Sparks. See sign-in sheet for full list of attendees.

CERTIFICATION OF EXECUTIVE SESSION

Board Member Isak Nti Asare certified the executive session held earlier that evening.

APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MEETING MINUTES

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo moved to approve the meeting minutes from the October 17, 2023, regular session. Board Member Barbara McKinney seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

VERBAL CERTIFICATION OF PAYROLL

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham and Interim Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin both affirmed the payroll claims for October 20 and November 3, both in the year of 2023.

POLICE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS

Report on Monthly Statistics, Training and Incident Reports:

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham presented the monthly statistics and training.

Board Member Isak Nti Asare asked if the Police Social Worker statistics were year-to-date or only for the current month. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham indicated that statistics are only for the current month.

Board Member Barbara McKinney asked why traffic stops have increased. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham indicated that society's return to pre-COVID travel, as well as officer focus in crime-trending areas, have contributed to these statistics.

Board Member Isak Nti Asare asked why crime numbers have gone down while call volume has increased. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered that the reasons for this are indeterminable.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked how the Department's Trunk or Treat event went. Police Captain Ryan Pedigo indicated that it was a success.

Board Member Isak Nti Asare asked for insight regarding the amount of community engagement activities and officer involvement. Police Captain Ryan Pedigo answered that Chief Diekhoff is very passionate about this topic.

Letters of Appreciation/Commendation:

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham presented 2 letters of appreciation.

General Business:

Police Captain Ryan Pedigo discussed the ongoing staffing efforts.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked how many officers will still be needed after the vote on the Conditional Offers of Employment to 5 applicants later in the meeting. Police Captain Ryan Pedigo answered with a total of 92 officers.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked if upcoming retirements within the Department are included in the staffing numbers presented. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered with a number in the mid-70s.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked what the Department's fully staffed number would be. Police Captain Ryan Pedigo answered that full capacity is 105 officers.

Purchases: Expenditures/Procurements:

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham stated that there are still vehicle purchases coming through for insurance replacements after vehicle accidents, as well as mandatory body armor replacements and purchases utilizing a radio system grant.

Personnel:

Board Member Barbara McKinney made a motion to approve the conditional hire of Jessica Oswalt to the Department. Board Member Rachel Guglielmo seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo made a motion to approve the conditional hire of Charles Roderick to the Department. Board Member Barbara McKinney seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

Board Member Barbara McKinney made a motion to approve the conditional hire of Benjamin Miller to the Department. Board Member Rachel Guglielmo seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo made a motion to approve the conditional hire of Casey Breitzman to the Department. Board Member Barbara McKinney seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

Board Member Barbara McKinney made a motion to approve the conditional hire of Jared Pond to the Department. Board Member Rachel Guglielmo seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

Board Member Barbara McKinney made a motion to approve the promotion of Officer Jacob Hunter to Sergeant. Board Member Rachel Guglielmo seconded the motion. Board Member Barbara McKinney read Police Chief Diekhoff's recommendation letter regarding the promotion of Officer Hunter. Motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo made a motion to approve the promotion of Sergeant Michael Baker to Lieutenant. Board Member Barbara McKinney seconded the motion. Board Member Rachel Guglielmo read Police Chief Diekhoff's recommendation letter regarding the promotion of Sergeant Baker. Board Member Isak Nti Asare commented on the respect the community has for Sergeant Baker and thanked him for his dedication to service. Motion passed unanimously via roll call vote, 4-0.

CIRT/ARV REPORT

None.

FIRE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS

Report on Monthly Statistics, Training and Incident Reports:

Fire Interim Deputy Chief Max Litwin presented the monthly statistics.

Board Member Isak Nti Asare asked what the two southernmost locations on the heat map where. Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin answered that these locations are Crawford and College Square.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo asked if one of the heat map locations was the site of a recent shooting. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered negatively.

Board Member Isak Nti Asare asked if the Department could provide a heat map with distinctions between false alarms and real calls. Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin said he would look into the availability of this feature.

Board Member Rachel Gulgielmo asked if the middle of the heat map was the IU Campus. Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin answered affirmatively.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo asked when the MIH program began. Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin said that this program began last year.

Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin presented four letters of appreciation.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo commented on the letters of appreciation and their value. Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin indicated that the letters are on display at fire stations for employees to view as well.

General Business:

Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin presented statistics on staffing, stating that the Department still has 5 vacancies with additional vacancies anticipated in 2024.

Board Member Isak Nti Asare asked if the upcoming vacancies were due to people moving, retiring, or for other reasons. Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin responded that it is a combination of projected retirements and other miscellaneous unpredicted vacancies.

Purchases: Expenditures/Procurements:

Fire Deputy Chief Max Litwin spoke on upcoming costs related to the replacement of a damaged utility vehicle with the utilization of insurance funds. He also stated that the groundbreaking ceremony for Station 1 is anticipated to occur on December 1, with details to be communicated soon. A roof renovation project will begin soon for Station 2 and a few end of the year items will also be coming through.

Personnel:

There were no personnel issues discussed.

OLD BUSINESS

There was no old business presented.

NEW BUSINESS

There was no new business presented.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Recording Secretary Ashley Sparks asked what the public should do if there is a citizen who may benefit from the Police Social Workers. Police Captain Ryan Pedigo stated that referrals can be phoned into the station or communicated directly to him.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo asked how the general public finds out about the Police Social Worker program. Police Captain Ryan Pedigo said that Police Social Workers reach directly out to the referred citizen on the same or next business day after a call comes in.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo asked if there has been an increase in public awareness regarding the Police Social Worker program. Police Captain Ryan Pedigo said that there are many avenues through which citizens are made aware of the program.

Board Member Barbara McKinney made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Board Member Rachel Guglielmo seconded the motion. Meeting adjourned at 6:47 p.m.




CALLS FOR SERVICE

The Department has responded to 68,990 calls for service through November in 2023. That is an increase of 19,240 calls from the same period in 2022.


This figure represents a 38.7% increase in 2023.




TRAFFIC STOP COMPARISON






VIOLENT CRIME INVOLVING WEAPONS

2022-2023 Adult Arrests



- PSW assisted a client with getting connected to Shalom or a housing assessment, tent and other necessities











"SNIM" HIM


With the collaboration of Station 2 Fire Crews (all shifts), MIH was able to identify a gap in care for a patient that had gone under the radar by services already in place!




