Two Items Ready for Discussion at the Committee of the Whole on Wednesday, February 23rd

There are two items ready to be discussed at the Committee of the Whole next week. The first item is <u>App Ord 09-01</u> which can be found in the <u>18 February 2009</u> <u>Council Legislative Packet</u> and the second item is <u>Res 09-03</u> which can be found in this packet and is summarized herein.

Res 09-03 - CDBG Allocations for 2009

<u>Res 09-03</u> approves the Mayor's recommendations for allocating the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for 2009. This memo is based upon material provided by Lisa Abbott, Director of the HAND department, who was also kind enough to read and improve it.

Amount of Funds and HUD Regulations

We receive CDBG funds from the U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Department. As an "entitlement" city, our portion is largely determined by several objective measures of community need, including: level of poverty, age of housing stock, over-crowded housing and population growth. Although it's typically too early for HUD to let us know the exact amount the City will receive, we are estimating it at \$744,000, which is about 10% less than the City eventually received last year.

In the Event of a Increase or Decrease in Funding

Since it's possible that HUD may send us more or less than the expected amount of funds, the resolution directs the surplus or shortfall to be allocated in the following manner as recommended by the two Citizen Advisory Committees (CACs) (*See* Section II of the resolution):

Physical Improvements: If HAND receives less than 10% more than expected, the additional funds will be split evenly between the Housing Authority and the Department of Public Works. If HAND receives more

than 10%, the first \$48,360 will be split evenly between the Housing Authority and Public Works and the remaining funds will be equally divided between the other applications up to their requested amounts. If HAND receives less than expected, the amounts will be equally deducted from all applications except Monroe County United Ministries.

Social Services: If HAND receives more than expected, the top three scoring applications will receive an increase proportionally to their allocation. The remaining three applications will get an equal share of the remainder of the funds. If HAND receives less than expected, the reduction will made proportionately over all allocations.

Eligible Activities and Projects

HUD administers these monies and regulates their use. HUD regulations require that we use at least 70% of these funds for the benefit of low- and moderateincome persons. The remaining funds may be used to prevent or eliminate blighted areas or to address community development needs arising from serious and immediate threats to the health or welfare of the community. Please note that currently all our funds are leveraged to address low- and moderate-income populations. Please also note that these funds may not be used to purchase equipment or maintain property.

The HUD regulations allocate funds among three categories according to the following formula:

- no more than 15% of the funds may be spent for social service programs and, as has been the City's long-standing practice, the full amount (or \$111,600) will be used for this purpose;
- no more than 20% may be used for administrative costs and, as has been the case for the past term, the legal maximum (amounting to \$148,800) will be used for that purpose; and
- at least the remaining 65% (or \$483,600) must be used for physical improvements.

Citizen Advisory Committees, Applicant Agencies and Schedules

The CDBG regulations require us to develop a "Citizen Participation Plan." For decades, the City has used two Citizen Advisory Sub-Committees (CACs) to make recommendations regarding the allocation of these funds – one dedicated to the review of applications for social services funding, the other devoted to reviewing

applications for physical improvements. These CACs are composed of members from the Common Council (2), Redevelopment Commission (2), Community and Family Resource Commission (4), as well as Mayoral appointees (11 this year). This year, Mike Satterfield served as the Council representative to the Social Services CAC and Tim Mayer served on the Physical Improvements CAC.

The two CACs typically work from November through January to make these recommendations. In the fall they hold an organizational meeting, may make site visits to the agencies, and review the ranking system and funding criteria. In January, they hold public hearings (carried on CATS) to consider and make recommendations regarding the applications that were submitted to the Housing and Neighborhood Development (HAND) Department in early December. In February, the Redevelopment Commission reviews the recommendations and forwards its decision to the Mayor, who then forwards them to the Council. The recommendations this year, as in past years, have come forward without change.

The agencies interested in applying for funds are on a schedule that begins in September, when the applications become available. They then have an opportunity to attend a general information meeting to ask questions about CDBG and must submit a letter of intent outlining their proposal and attend a mandatory training session if they are still interested in moving forward. Completed applications are due in early December.

<u>\$111,600 Funding for Social Services</u>

The disparity between the amount of funds available and the amount funds requested is always most evident with social services programs. Nine programs sought approximately \$225,000 (which, at \$25,000 per agency, amounts to about 200% of the available funds) and six were recommended for funding. This year, as in the past, the CAC ranked the applications on a 50-point rating system without knowing the name of the agency and made its decision based this blind rating. As a result, about half of the funds went to emergency services. The ranking was tied to how well the applicant:

- documented the need for the program in this community (15);
- demonstrated that it primarily serves low-income individuals and residents of the City (10);
- demonstrated its ability to evaluate and document the effectiveness of the program (15);
- detailed the use of the funds and demonstrated that at least 50% of the funding comes from other sources (5); and

• were valued by the evaluator of the program (5).

<u>\$483,600 in Funding for Physical Improvements</u>

HUD requires that funding for all projects and programs be tied to HAND's *Consolidated Plan* rather than a general set of criteria. The citations to the *Consolidated Plan* are listed in the packet and the *Consolidated Plan* itself can be found at <u>http://www.bloomington.in.gov/hand/block_grants/con_plan_final.pdf</u>

Of the \$483,600 set aside for physical improvements, the CAC recommended allotting \$275,110 for housing, \$11,116 for improving an agency facility, and \$197,374 for community-wide infrastructure programs. Broken down in a different way, approximately \$290,874 will go to City departments, \$91,610 will go to the Bloomington Housing Authority, and \$101,116 will go to non-profit agencies. The significant role of City departments is explained by the wide-reaching effect of these programs compared to the programs run by non-City agencies. Please also note that most cities allocate *all* of the physical improvement funds to city agencies. The particular projects are set forth below:

RESOLUTION 09-03

TO APPROVE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE MAYOR FOR DISTRIBUTION OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) FUNDS FOR 2009

- WHEREAS, the City of Bloomington, Indiana, is eligible for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds in the amount of \$744,000.00 for Fiscal Year 2009 pursuant to the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended; and
- WHEREAS, the national objectives of the Community Development Program are:

1. first and foremost, the development of viable urban communities, including decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities principally for person of low and moderate income; and

2. the elimination of slums and blight, and the prevention of blighting influences and the deterioration of property and neighborhood and community facilities of importance to the welfare of the community, principally for persons of low and moderate income; and

3. the elimination of conditions which are detrimental to health, safety, and public welfare, through code enforcement, demolition, interim rehabilitation assistance, and related activities; and

4. the conversion and expansion of the nation's housing stock in order to provide a decent home and suitable living environment for all persons, but principally those of low and moderate income; and

5. the expansion and improvement of the quantity and quality of community services, principally for persons of low and moderate income, which are essential for sound community development and for development of viable urban communities; and

6. the integration of income groups throughout the community by spreading persons of lower income into more prosperous neighborhoods and drawing persons of higher income to declining or deteriorated neighborhoods; and

7. the alleviation of physical and economic distress through the stimulation of private investment and community revitalization; and

- WHEREAS, a proposed statement of community development objectives and projected use of the funds has been advertised; and
- WHEREAS, said statement and projected use of funds reflects programs recommended by the Mayor with input from the Citizen's Advisory Committees and the Redevelopment Commission and are consistent with local and national objectives of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended;

SYNOPIS

The City of Bloomington is eligible for a Community Development Block Grant of \$744,000 from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for fiscal year 2009. Re: 2009-2010 Community Development Block Grant Allocations

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines an entitlement community as one that is a metropolitan city with a population of at least 50,000. Bloomington meets that threshold and is therefore eligible for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding. The annual funding is formula based and is based on several objective measures of community need; 1) poverty in the community, 2) housing overcrowding, 3) age of housing stock, and 4) population growth. For fiscal year 2009-2010, we are using the estimate of \$744,000 which is approximately a 10% cut from this fiscal year as we do not have firm numbers yet from HUD.

The activities that will receive funding are divided into 3 distinct categories: physical improvements, social services and administration. By law, no more than 15% of the total grant may be used for social services and no more than 20% may be used for administration. The other 65% is used for physical improvements. Therefore, for fiscal year 2009-2010, the allocations are as follows:

Physical Improvements	\$483,600
Social Services	\$111,600
Administration	<u>\$148,800</u>
Total	\$744,000

CDBG funds must be used to benefit low and moderate income persons, prevent or eliminate slum and blight and/or to alleviate conditions that pose immediate and serious threat to the health or welfare of the community. I have included in this packet excerpts from the CDBG regulations on eligible and ineligible activities.

HUD requires each entitlement community to develop a citizen participation plan. This plan sets out procedures for public input into the allocation process. The City of Bloomington has an extremely open process for public input. The allocation recommendations are made by the Citizen Advisory Council (CAC) which is made up of citizens from various councils and commissions, as well as interested parties who apply for appointments. See attached membership list. The CAC is divided into two sub-committees, one to review physical improvement applications and one to review social service applications. Attached please find copies of the schedules. In addition to each sub-committee's public hearing, the Redevelopment Commission meeting is also open to public comment.

I have included in this packet, a brief description of each program and recommended allocation amount. Also attached is Redevelopment Commission Resolution 09-02 in which they unanimously forwarded on the CAC recommendations to Mayor Kruzan. Common Council Resolution 09-03 will confirm the recommendations of the CAC, the Redevelopment Commission and the Mayor.

CDBG ELIGIBLE AND INELIGIBLE PROJECTS

(Excerpts from the CDBG regulations)

570.201 - Basic Eligible Activities

- (a) Acquisition of real property.
- (b) Disposition of real property.
- (c) Public facilities and improvements. Acquisition, construction, reconstruction,

rehabilitation or installation of public facilities and improvements.

- (d) Clearance activities.
- (e) Public services: Provision of public services (including labor, supplies, and materials) which are directed toward improving the community's public services and facilities; including, but not limited to those concerned with employment, crime prevention, child care, health, drug abuse, education, fair housing counseling, energy conservation, welfare, or recreational needs.
- (f) Interim assistance. Activities undertaken on an interim basis in areas exhibiting objectively determinable signs of physical deterioration. And activities to alleviate emergency conditions threatening the public health and safety.
- (n) Homeownership assistance. Acquisition, down payment and closing cost assistance to low- or moderate-income homebuyers.
- (o) Microenterprise Assistance.

570.202 – Eligible Rehabilitation and Preservation Activities

- (a) CDBG funds may be used to finance the rehabilitation of :
 - (1) Privately owned buildings and improvements for residential purposes;
 - (2) Low-income public housing and other publicly owned residential buildings and improvements; and
 - (3) Publicly or privately owned commercial or industrial buildings, except that the rehabilitation of such buildings owned by a private for-profit business is limited to improvements to the exterior of the building and the correction of code violations.
 - (4) Nonprofit-owned nonresidential building and improvements not eligible under 570.201 (c).
- (b) Types of assistance. To assist various types of rehabilitation activities, and related cost for buildings and improvements described in paragraph (a) of this section.

- (c) Code enforcement.
- (d) Historic Preservation: CDBG funds my be used for the rehabilitation, preservation or restoration of historic properties, whether publicly or privately owned.
- (f) Lead-based paint hazard evaluation and reduction.

570.203 – Eligible Special Economic Development Activities

(a) The acquisition, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation or installation of commercial or industrial buildings, structures, and other real property equipment and improvements.

570.204 – Special Activities by Community-Based Development Organizations (CDBOs)

(a) Eligible activities.
(1) Neighborhood revitalization projects.
(2) Community economic development projects.
(3) Energy conservation projects.

<u>570.205 – Eligible Planning, Urban Environmental Design and Policy-Planning-</u> <u>Management-Capacity Building Activities</u>

- (a) Costs of data-gathering, studies, analysis, and preparation of plans and identification of actions that will implement such plans.
- (b) Policy-planning-management-capacity building activities.

570.206 – Program Administration Costs

570.207 – Ineligible Activities

(a) The following activities may not be assisted with CDBG funds:
(1) Buildings or portions thereof, used for the general conduct of government;
(2) General government expenses; and
(3) Political activities.

(b) The following activities are generally ineligible for CDBG funds:

- (1) Purchase of equipment;
- (2) Operating and maintenance expenses; and
- (3) Construction of new permanent residential structures.
