Re: Bloomington Arts Commission recommendations for BUEA 2024 Zone Art Grants

This year, the BUEA has allocated \$50,000 for Zone Arts Grants, which the Bloomington Arts Commission has been entrusted to allot as part of its annual Arts Project Grant Cycle. The BUEA Zone Arts Grants are meant to support arts activities within the boundaries of the Bloomington Urban Enterprise Zone.

Funded projects must do one or more of the following for residents and businesses within the Urban Enterprise Zone:

- Facilitate involvement in arts and cultural activities
- Provide an opportunity to participate in the creative process
- Advance the quality and availability of the arts in the Zone
- Celebrate or enhance the identity of the Zone

As part of its annual Arts Project Grant Cycle, members of the Bloomington Arts Commission, along with community readers working locally in the arts, evaluate applications according to the following criteria:

- Capacity Does the project have a clear plan and outcomes and a plan to achieve them? Does
 the artist/arts group have financial resources committed to the project outside of this grant?
- Community Impact Is the project addressing a community need? Does it engage in larger community dialogues? Does it reach out to or connect with the various communities that exist in Bloomington? Is the artist/arts group partnering with other organizations?
- Equity and inclusion How does the project employ principles of equity, inclusion, and diversity?

The BAC received a total of 49 Arts Project grant applications during 2024. Based on our evaluation, we recommend that the BUEA fund the following 17 Zone Arts Grants for a total of \$21,950:





Nichols & Son, of Bloomington, \$59,982. This last bid being the lowest, the contract was awarded Nichols & Son, and they were given till the lat of April to make their bond and close their contract. The buildings are both to be completed by the 1st of December next.
