New law that prevents local governments from enacting

regulations more stringent than those of IDEM. Projects involving less than 1 acre no longer requires permitting. Disallows prevention of runoff / pollution issues, can only react after the fact. Encouraging reporting of issues like illicit discharge. EC could help with outreach.
