### Tuesday, July 8, 2025, 6:00 p.m. McCloskey Conference Room — City Hall

1. Call to Order: Justin Vasel called the meeting to order at 6:01 PM

### 2. Roll Call

### 3. Approval of Agenda

ACTION: The agenda was approved by voice vote.

### 4. Approval of Minutes: April 8, May 13, June 10 2025

The Chair noted that none of the minutes were ready for approval. The next meeting is anticipated to have four sets of minutes ready for approval.

### 5. Public Comment

None.

### 6. Report from Commissioners

### a. Chair Report (Justin Vasel)

The Chair provided an organizational update, noting that two vacancies remain (Monroe County Commissioners and a Mayoral M-1 appointment). The Commission bid farewell to Hunter Hawley (M-1) and welcomed two new members, Annalise Janke (M-5) and Diana Ogrodowski (M-6), bringing the total number of filled seats to 12.

### **New Commissioner Introductions:**

Annalise Janke stated her background is in project management at the Center for Rural Engagement at IU, focusing on taking community projects to reality, and noted her future goal is to attend law school to work on compliance law related to sustainability.

Diana Ogrodowski shared her background in the non-profit sector, specifically housing, homeless services, and case management for low-income families. She hopes to bring a perspective of economic sustainability and accessibility for vulnerable community members to the Commission.

<u>Upcoming Events:</u> The IU Economic Development Summit (Aug 12) and the Earth Charter Indiana Climate Leadership Summit 10 (Sept 5, Indianapolis) were announced. Commissioner Matt Austin endorsed the Climate Leadership Summit.

<u>Funding & Awards:</u> The current working group grant funding available is \$10,000, with \$0 spent to date. The deadline for final approval of working group grant proposals is the November meeting.

News & Updates (Hopewell Strategy Shift): The City rejected all previous developer proposals for Hopewell South Blocks 9 & 10 (June 2025) and shifted strategy toward a "by locals for locals" approach with Flintlock LAB, focusing on pre-approved designs and community-centered development. The Chair noted this presents an opportunity to address housing affordability but involves a risk that the urgency for "shovels in the ground" might compromise deeper sustainability goals. Commissioners discussed existing issues with high vacancy rates in new market-rate developments and the need for BCOS oversight on permanent affordability and measurable sustainability outcomes. The Chair committed to finding a speaker to discuss the Hopewell project in more detail at the next meeting.

New Legal Obligations: Effective July 1, 2025, new Indiana law requires Commissioners' terms and appointing authorities on all notices, and all Commission meetings, including working groups and work sessions, must be recorded and posted on the City's website. Additionally, formal statements of opinion (e.g., resolutions) must include a disclaimer stating that the Commission does not speak on behalf of the City.

<u>Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs)</u>: The Chair introduced SOPs as non-binding guidance/best practices to streamline internal processes. BCOS-SOP-5: "How to Submit An Agenda Item" was presented as the first SOP, intended to guide Commissioners through defining action, preparing materials, estimating time, and submitting requests no later than 7 days before the meeting.

<u>Resolution Adoption Process</u>: The Chair reviewed the BCOS two-reading process for policy resolutions: the First Reading is for introduction and discussion only, followed by a voice vote to advance. The Second Reading includes full discussion, amendments, and a final adoption via roll-call vote.

### b. Waste Management Working Group (Matt Austin)

Commissioner Austin reported on the Bokashi food waste fermentation project.

- i. An interest meeting was held at a Unitarian Universalist church, confirming that faith groups are valuable partners.
- ii. Bokashi is an anaerobic, cold fermentation process that retains 90–95% of minerals and nutrients, unlike traditional composting, and can handle meats, dairy, and oils.
- iii. The group has partnerships with the Bloomington Community Orchard and the Taste of Bloomington. Fermented food waste from the Taste of Bloomington will be utilized at the Will Demer Community Garden.
- iv. Pilot programs are underway at four local schools (Harmony, Templeton, Marlin, and discussions with The Project School).
- v. Austin encouraged Commissioners to attend the Plan Commission meeting (July 14 and August 11, 5:30 p.m.) to support proposed UDO changes for Urban Agriculture Commercial, which would allow teaching gardening on private farms.
- vi. Austin reported on a meeting regarding MakeSoil.org, a promising application and platform that pairs residents who want to compost their food waste with

those who already compost, recommending that community members sign up for the free service to show demand for potential City or Waste Reduction District funding.

c. Ad-Hoc Committee: Sustainability Assessment Report (Tara Dunderdale) Vice Chair Dunderdale reported that Commissioner Evan Nix had shared his section of the assessment. The plan is to consolidate the documents and use the upcoming work session (July 29th) for tweaking and refining, aiming for an August or September agenda item.

### d. Council Ex-Officio (Dave Rollo)

Council Member Rollo reported that the City Council was currently on break. He detailed the upcoming budget hearings, which he stressed will be important due to state legislation (SB1) restricting taxation and influencing the city's revenue stream. Budget hearings are scheduled for August 18, 19, 20, 25, and 27, from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

### 7. Discussions of Topics Not the Subject of Resolutions

 Local Food Resilience Strategy (Jami Scholl)
 Commissioner Jami Scholl presented the core points of her comprehensive Local Food Resilience Strategy.

<u>Background</u>: The strategy is informed by vulnerabilities (e.g., 3 days of grocery inventory, reliance on "just-in-time" supply chains) and volatile national conditions (e.g., federal food program cuts, AI displacement in various industries, and climate disasters).

<u>Goals</u>: Bloomington has failed to meet the previously set goal of 20% self-provisioning. The strategy aims to build resiliency and aligns with UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

<u>Strategic Priorities</u>: Included Regional Food System Cooperation (with Monroe County), expanding Urban Agriculture (e.g., designated urban farm at RCA Park, zoning updates), establishing Neighborhood Food Hubs for access and emergency preparedness, and developing a Local Seed Bank Network.

<u>Actionable Steps</u>: Scholl noted immediate opportunities through available grant funding (like USDA Urban Agriculture Grants closing August 15th) and policy changes, such as the proposed Scalable Poultry Flock Size Model.

# 8. Resolutions for Second Reading and Discussion None.

### 9. Resolutions for First Reading and Discussion

a. Resolution 2025-01: To Adopt a Scalable Poultry Flock Size Model (Jami Scholl) Commissioner Scholl explained that the resolution aims to amend the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) and Animal Ordinance to allow poultry flock sizes scaled to lot area. The proposed model is:

<sup>\*</sup>  $\leq$  5,000 sq ft lots: up to 5 hens (current standard)

\* 5,001–10,000 sq ft lots: up to 8 hens \* 10,001–20,000 sq ft lots: up to 12 hens

The resolution also recommends allowing flocks in mobile home parks and agri-villages. The flock sizes are based on the entire lot size. Council Member Rollo, the original sponsor of the 2006 chicken ordinance, endorsed the update.

The Chair reminded the Commission that a vote to advance is not a vote in favor of the resolution and that amendments should be reserved for the Second Reading.

ACTION: Zero Rose moved to advance Resolution 2025-01 for first reading, and Matt Austin seconded. The motion was approved by voice vote.

### **10**. **Report from Staff Liaison** (Shawn Miya)

Staff Liaison Shawn Miya announced that the City of Bloomington was selected to move forward on a Municipal Investment Fund grant proposal, anticipating an award of \$250,000.

<u>Use of Funds</u>: The funding will be used to hire an engineering design firm and financial consultant to provide free technical assistance (design and financial analysis) to building owners and developers for solar or energy efficiency projects. It will also establish an Energy Navigator program utilizing community volunteers.

EV Charging Study: A portion of the grant will fund a consulting firm to conduct an EV charging study for the community.

Equity Focus: 50% of the planned projects identified by the program must be located within Low-Income and Disadvantaged Communities (LADCs) census tracts.

<u>Timeline</u>: The goal is to develop a list of projects to attract up to \$2 million in low-cost private capital, but all work must be completed within a short time frame of six months. The announcement is preliminary, as the contract has not yet been signed.

There will be a virtual option and streamed on CATS. ESD has the list of restaurants that participated in composting with Earth Keepers that can be shared.



- C. Cob Bench Project Update (Evan Nix, Zero Rose) Evan is relocating and will resign seat and needs a new project manager for the bench project. Current grant project needs to be completed by December 31, 2025. A no cost extension could be applied for there would need to be a new project manager before the no cost extension could be sought. The remaining work is coordinating the scheduling with Redbud books and communicating with volunteers. 811 call has been completed.
  - Bench would be built over 3 sessions, digging and setting foundation and roof, then build the cob needs to sit and cure, then plastering.

If another commissioner wants to take over the city needs the no cost extension by December 1 and a reconfirmation from all the partners, with the new project manager in place.

Build likely needs to wait until spring. April at the earliest. Midnovember would be the latest this year it could be built and cure properly.

Justin will send the proposal for commissioners to review. Anyone wanting to take it on should respond to Justin by October 21, 2025 to begin the no cost extension application otherwise steps will be taken to return the funds.

The following Bloomington Commission on Sustainability (BCOS) Working Group Grant proposal is an amended version of what has already been submitted to the City of Bloomington for review and approval prior to a vote by the Commission.

This revised proposal is being submitted based on the guidance provided by ESD on October 31, 2025. While we requested additional clarification on October 31, November 3, and November 6 regarding any requirements beyond the removal of labor costs, we have not yet received that information.

To meet the November 18 BCOS meeting deadline and allow adequate time for City review, we are proceeding with revisions that address all known concerns. We remain available to make any additional modifications that may be required.

### **Substantive Changes**

- Project team restructured to address conflict of interest concerns: Justin Vasel now serves as Lead/Sponsor; Matt Austin moves to Advisory role
- All labor costs eliminated per ESD requirements: Removed \$3,800 in hourly wages from budget
- Budget reduced by 54%: Total request decreased from \$6,999 to \$3,199 (supplies only)
- Festival component now optional: Core project objectives fully achievable without Taste
  of Bloomington collection; festival activities contingent on securing external labor funding
- **Title refocused:** Changed from "Community & Festival Food Waste Pilot Project 2.0" to "Community Food Waste Education & Network Development" to reflect primary education/network-building mission

### Non-substantive Changes

- Reformatted to comply with grant SOP template requirements
- Clarified language throughout for concision and impact
- Restructured goals to reflect core vs. optional components

I appreciate ESD's continued review and look forward to bringing this proposal before the Commission on November 18.

### **BCOS Working Group Grant Application**

Proposal Title: Community Food Waste Education & Network Development

Date: November 9, 2025

### **Project Team:**

Project Lead: Justin Vasel, BCOS Commissioner Project Advisor: Matt Austin, BCOS Commissioner

Primary Vendor: GardenQuest

### **Project Description**

The Community Food Waste Education & Network Development Project will establish Bloomington's first decentralized bokashi fermentation network, providing residents with training, equipment, and support to divert food waste from landfills. Working groups will deploy 36 bokashi fermentation systems through a "Try-It Program," conduct community workshops, develop partnerships with faith-based organizations and neighborhood associations, and train Bokashi Community Captains to support neighborhood-level networks.

This project directly addresses Bloomington's lack of organic waste diversion infrastructure following EarthKeepers' 2023 closure. Building on GardenQuest's existing pilot that has already diverted 6,000+ pounds of food waste across 20 households and 4 neighborhoods, this expansion will create sustainable, community-led food waste solutions that transform waste into soil amendments for local gardens.

Optional Enhancement: Should additional sponsorship be secured for labor costs, the project will expand to include festival food waste collection at Taste of Bloomington 2026.

This is a 12-month project with five goals:

<u>Goal 1: Establish new community partnerships.</u> Identify and present to interested groups and organizations, including neighborhood associations, non-profits, businesses, and faith-based organizations; develop additional partnerships through training and consultation.

Goal 2: Develop education materials, demos, and trainings. Create educational materials; recruit and train volunteers; run an educational demonstration booth at Taste of Bloomington 2026; host community bokashi workshops; market and manage a "Try-It" program, where residents can borrow fermentation buckets.

<u>Goal 3: Grow community networks and recruit community captains.</u> Recruit Bloomington residents to become Bokashi Community Captains who manage and support a small network of participating households; provide on-going support as needed to Bokashi Community Captains.

<u>Goal 4: Evaluate impact.</u> Collect, analyze, and disseminate data regarding total waste diversion, fertilizer/compost output, and efficacy of recruitment/training efforts; evaluate program sustainability.

Goal 5 (optional): Taste of Bloomington 2026 collection. Should additional sponsorship be secured for labor costs, this project will include festival food waste collection at Taste of Bloomington 2026 (see Attachment 2: *Taste of Bloomington 2026 MOU*). In that case, some of the fermentation buckets that would be lent to residents will be used for festival waste. No additional expenses or modifications to this proposal will be incurred.

### **Purpose**

This project advances Bloomington's sustainability goals across environmental, social, and economic dimensions by creating community-based infrastructure that ensures future generations inherit effective waste management solutions rather than mounting landfill burdens. The project's objectives directly align with BCOS's mission and multiple UN Sustainable Development Goals:

<u>Environmental Sustainability:</u> Diverts organic waste from landfills, reducing methane emissions and creating nutrient-rich soil amendments (SDG 12: Responsible Consumption and Production; SDG 13: Climate Action)

<u>Social Sustainability:</u> Builds inclusive neighborhood networks through free equipment loans and multilingual workshops, ensuring equitable access regardless of economic status (SDG 10: Reduced Inequalities: SDG 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities)

<u>Economic Sustainability:</u> Provides cost-free alternatives to expensive composting services while creating value from waste through soil enhancement for local food production (SDG 2: Zero Hunger; SDG 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth)

The project also aligns with City Plans:

<u>Climate Action Plan:</u> Directly reduces greenhouse gas emissions through organic waste diversion

<u>Sustainability Action Plan:</u> Establishes decentralized, resilient waste management infrastructure

<u>Comprehensive Plan:</u> Strengthens neighborhood connections and community self-sufficiency

By training Community Captains and establishing permanent neighborhood networks, this project creates self-sustaining systems that will continue serving Bloomington residents long after the grant period, embodying the principle of meeting today's needs without compromising tomorrow's capacity.

The total amount requested for this project is \$3,199.00.

# Addendum A Answers to Questions posed by ESD 10/8/2025

1. Describe the bokashi fermentation system components and how you arrived at the number 36.

We have 14 buckets with spigots purchased through an Indiana Department of Environmental Grant and 50 buckets without spigots purchased through a grant from the Monroe County Waste Reduction District. When buckets are not in use for a festival, they rotate into the Bokashi Try-It program. Currently all spigoted buckets are in use and there is a waiting list of people, neighborhoods, and organizations who would like to experiment with both versions of the fermentation buckets prior to making the decision to incorporate them into their household waste management structure. 36 acquired through the BCOS working group grant will bolster the Try-It Program to have an equal number of buckets with and without spigots so that residents can borrow one of each.

2. What exactly does the "festival food waste pilot" line item represent and how did you determine the \$2,000 cost? Is it operational/staff time or any other components? Please include bill rates and number of hours if it does represent time.

Our 2025 rate is \$40/hour. Our 2026 rate is \$45/hour and estimating 45 hours of work (based on 2025 Taste) equals \$2,025. We are only requesting \$2,000 to keep the grant request at \$7,000. See *Addendum B* for specific # of hours per activity.

This amount of hours does not include any of the volunteer hours as noted on *Addendum B* as 'in-kind' donation.

For the Taste of Bloomington, introductory educational sessions, and bokashi workshops, we spent more time than estimated in the funding agreement with the MCWRD. For details, please see *Addendum B*.



Bokashi bran - We purchase the bokashi bran from www.bokashicycle.com in bulk 50-100 pounds at a time as part of our community cost-sharing program. We store the bran in our commercial walk-in fridge. While the cost of the bran includes the price of electricity, maintenance, and purchasing quart storage containers, the cost is much less than what a household would pay if purchasing individual quarts of bran. We are able to re-sell the bran

with all costs included at \$5.40/pound versus \$15.67 per pound, thus providing savings and community benefit.

### **Background & Opportunity**

Bloomington has long been a leader among mid-sized cities in building local food system resilience and advancing sustainability initiatives. However, recent federal policy shifts—including program cuts and changes in how resilience is defined and communicated—create both challenges and opportunities.

This moment provides Bloomington with the chance to reaffirm its leadership by continuing to frame sustainability as inseparable from community resilience. Federal changes are already impacting residents, and local government can play a vital role in helping neighborhoods and the broader community adapt.

Resilience can be understood as *the capacity of a system to withstand change and continue to develop, using shocks and disturbances as catalysts for renewal and innovative thinking.* Sustainability and resilience are intertwined, with resilience serving as a crucial component for achieving sustainability by enabling systems to adapt, withstand, and recover from disruptions, thus ensuring long-term functionality and meeting future needs.

By focusing on robust, adaptable systems and proactive, holistic planning, both concepts contribute to creating durable, environmentally and fiscally responsible infrastructure that can thrive in the face of uncertainty and change. This capacity to include the holistic view of integrated resilient systems is essential for Bloomington's future and is not currently addressed—or could easily be adopted—by any other City board or commission.

### **Core Assessment**

Converging Issues:

- Job loss and food system vulnerabilities
- Peak oil and renewable energy transitions under threat
- Job displacement from AI
- Farmland and water resources at risk from large-scale data centers and other industries
- Shifting political language around "sustainability" and "resilience"
- Potential disruptions to the currency system

These converging pressures highlight the need for Bloomington to adopt a long-term, resilience-focused approach to sustainability. Emergency management, while critical, is oriented toward short-term crises (e.g., tornadoes, fires) and does not fully incorporate local residents in planning for structural change.

Drawing on the insights of Neil Howe (*The Fourth Turning*) and Ray Dalio (*The Big Cycle Theory*), it is clear that society faces dramatic generational and economic shifts. Bloomington's Sustainability & Resilience Commission is uniquely positioned to respond.

### **Opportunity for Action**

By explicitly including resilience within its scope, this Commission can integrate sustainability, equity, economic development, and preparedness into a coherent framework. This positions the City not only to advance practical, near-term policy but also to make long-term community investments that will ensure Bloomington's continued leadership and relevance in a rapidly changing landscape.

WHEREAS, resilience refers to the capacity of this integrated system to absorb disruptions, maintain its core functions and structures, and adapt to and transform in the face of both short-term shocks and long-term uncertainties, making it essential for achieving sustainability; and

The second WHEREAS clause shall be rewritten for clarity and to maintain grammatical and format consistency with the other clauses, such that it reads as follows:

WHEREAS, recent and foreseeable disruptions—including climate-induced droughts and destructive weather events, economic instability, artificial intelligence-driven workforce displacement, food system vulnerabilities, shifts in federal policy, and public health crises—threaten the integrity of community systems and demand resilient infrastructure capable of maintaining essential functions under stress; and

3. The final WHEREAS clause shall be deleted in its entirety because recognizing the need for regular stress testing of current support systems is a broader policy recommendation and not a direct argument in support of renaming the Commission. It shall be replaced by the following two clauses, which reference the fact that Ordinance 2025-05 expanded the Commission's operational philosophy to include community resilience, and that incorporating this concept into its name will facilitate in public education and collaboration:

WHEREAS, <u>Ordinance 2025-05</u> amended Bloomington Municipal Code (BMC) paragraph 2.12.100(8)(B) to integrate "community resilience" into the operational philosophy of the Bloomington Commission on Sustainability; and

WHEREAS, including a more complete definition of the Commission's areas of work will facilitate the Commission's ongoing efforts in public education and identifying mission-aligned community partners.

- 4. Draft ordinance language for effectuating the proposed name change shall be appended as <u>Attachment 1</u>.
- 5. Section 1 shall be reworded to reference Attachment 1 as follows:

SECTION 1. the Common Council consider adopting an ordinance, such as that found in attachment 1, which amends BMC § 2.12.100 to rename the Bloomington Commission on Sustainability as the "Bloomington Commission on Sustainability and Resilience".

If any sections, sentence or provision of this ordinance, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be declared invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any of the other sections, sentences, provisions, or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.
