RE: Deliberation Session, March 11, 2026

The goal of this deliberation session is to create a shared list of ranked priority outcomes that can be formatted into a document to be approved by the body at the next regular session meeting and subsequently sent to the mayor's administration.

The Special Fiscal Committee has worked to organize outcomes and rankings from data collected at the December deliberation session and subsequent council surveys. This was done in an attempt to have a more efficient and effective meeting.

Each outcome was scored. First place rankings each earn 3 points, second place rankings earn 2 points, and third place rankings earn 1 point. The maximum score that could be awarded is 27 if all 9 councilmembers chose the same outcome as their first place ranking.

Appendix A includes full data from the December 10, 2025 deliberation session and subsequent council surveys.

Appendix B includes a grouping document that was used to consolidate outcomes from all buckets based on the highest ranking outcomes from each bucket.

Appendix C includes the outcomes that were eliminated from consideration due to receiving zero votes.

Conclusions and Recommendations

The most challenging part of assessing this data was consolidating it into a reasonable number of priorities that could be supported by councilmember votes. Conclusions can be drawn from the data, but due to overlapping outcomes, suggestions that were not really outcomes and the limitations of the survey (councilmembers could only select their top three priorities) there was discretion taken by the Fiscal Committee. Therefore, this is where most of our discussion should be this evening. Below is a draft recommendation of priorities from the Fiscal Committee for Fiscal Year 2027. In conversation with the administration they indicated that keeping this priority list strictly within the original seven “buckets” was not necessary. Since several priority outcomes crossed into several categories, we have removed the specific buckets from this draft recommendation. The list is not in any particular order.

Task: Rank the following top priorities

Things to keep in mind while considering priority outcomes:

- 1) Is this activity/outcome driven by the local government? If not, how can the government support the activity?
- 2) Is the outcome measurable?
- 3) Is the funding allocation for that outcome measurable?
- 4) Does this outcome require direct fiscal investment, staff time, or legislation?
- 5) Is this a priority for 2027? If not, how should the priority be reflected in the 2027 budget?
- 6) Is the outcome important to you (leads to the goal of assessing whether it is important for council as a body)?

Note: There was mention at the Fiscal Committee meeting that it feels weird to not list certain outcomes as priorities even though they did not score highly. The example given was “crime is reduced” under Public Safety. The following outcome tree could be created with the assumption that a reduction in crime is a top layer goal to be accomplished by several programmatic needs that did score highly :

- Crime is reduced (4 points)
 - Early intervention addresses residents’ needs (6 points)
 - Mental health and addiction treatment services meet community needs (10 points)
 - Bloomington residents have options other than uniformed officers for non-violent issues (8 points)
 - Race and class disparities in policing, justice, and public safety systems are reduced. (5 points)
 - Homelessness is brief, rare, and non-repeating (10+ points)

Appendix A

Council Outcome Priority Data Set

Data is accumulated from the December 10, 2025 deliberation set and from surveys sent to council members in February 2026.
