Key Programs and Achievements (2025)

Outstanding Leaders of Tomorrow Awards

Held during the City of Bloomington Black History Month Gala, this program recognized individuals for leadership, academic excellence, and community service across youth and adult categories.

Impact & Reach:

- 4 total award recipients recognized in 2025
- 100% of recipients highlighted for demonstrated leadership or academic achievement
- Annual recognition event held in conjunction with Black History Month programming
- Community attendance included local families, educators, and civic leaders (estimated 150+ attendees at gala programming segment)

Black Barbershop Health Initiative (Juneteenth Programming)

In partnership with local health organizations, CSBM supported community-based health screenings and wellness education delivered in trusted barbershop environments.

Impact & Reach:

- 150+ community members engaged in health education and screening activities

- Dozens of preventative screenings conducted (including blood pressure and general wellness checks)

National Million Father March

CSBM supported this annual back-to-school initiative designed to encourage fathers, mentors, and male role models to support students on the first day of school.

Impact & Reach:

- 40+ volunteers and father/mentor participants engaged
- Hosted at Fairview Elementary School
- 80+ students positively impacted through arrival support and school engagement
- Strengthened school-community-family connections during back-to-school transition
- Increased visibility of male role models in early education environments

Black Male Youth Summit

The Black Male Youth Summit continues to serve as a signature youth development program, bringing together students and community leaders for mentorship, leadership development, and inspiration.

2025 Program Highlights:

- 67 student participants from area middle and high schools
- 3 featured speakers/panelists representing leadership in engineering, education, and motivational speaking

Winter Wonderland (Community Partnership Event)

A collaborative holiday engagement event designed to provide family-centered celebration and youth enrichment.

- Holiday gifts, activities, and family programming provided
- Strengthened collaboration among community organizations supporting youth and families

- Expand relationships with regional and state-level partners focused on equity and opportunity

Sustain and Grow Capacity

- Identify and pursue funding opportunities to support long-term sustainability

- Strengthen fundraising and sponsorship strategies
- Build capacity to expand programming reach

The Commission on the Status of Children and Youth (CSCY) works to strengthen connections, resources, and opportunities that support children, youth, and families throughout Bloomington.

In 2025, the Commission focused on increasing community engagement, supporting youth recognition programs, and strengthening partnerships with schools, organizations, and service providers. CSCY also expanded outreach efforts to increase awareness of available youth-focused resources and advocacy opportunities.

The Commission remains committed to creating systems and opportunities that empower Bloomington's next generation to thrive.

Commission Purpose and Mission

The purpose of CSCY is to promote connections in the community that empower, enhance, and nurture children and youth.

The Commission works collaboratively with local organizations, schools, agencies, and residents to:

- Identify needs and gaps in services for children and youth
- Encourage collaboration across the community
- Monitor legislation and policies impacting children and youth
- Support advocacy and positive youth development
- Elevate youth voices and engagement
- Celebrate accomplishments and success stories

CSCY was established under Bloomington Municipal Code 2.23.050 and has served the community since 2004.

2025 S.W.A.G.G.E.R. Awards

The S.W.A.G.G.E.R. Awards recognize Students Who Act Generously, Grow, and Earn Respect. The 2025 program was the Commission's largest awards event to date.

Program Highlights

- 23 student nominations were submitted
- Students were nominated by schools, after-school programs, faith organizations, and community groups
- Winners received prize baskets, gift certificates, and recognition letters
- All nominees received certificates and appreciation gifts

Program Highlight: Read for the Record

In October 2025, CSCY coordinated its annual Read for the Record literacy initiative.

This program encourages early literacy through shared reading experiences and community participation.

2025 Program Impact

- 120 shared reading experiences completed
- Partnership with Monroe County Community School Corporation
- Participation from students, teachers, families, and community volunteers
- Featured book: *Nigel and the Moon*

The initiative supports language development, literacy engagement, and family participation in reading activities.

Financial Overview

2025 Budget Summary

The Commission on the Status of Children and Youth operated with an annual City budget of \$2,000 in 2025. In addition to City funding, the Commission successfully secured nearly \$4,000 in sponsorships, donations, and in-kind contributions to support youth-focused programming and community engagement efforts.

The Commission’s largest expense in 2025 was the S.W.A.G.G.E.R. Awards program, which totaled approximately \$1,405 in event-related expenses. Additional funding supported the Black History Month Poster Board Contest and other youth engagement initiatives throughout the year.

Through strategic fundraising and community partnerships, CSCY was able to significantly expand the impact of its programming while maintaining a remaining balance of \$925.98 at the close of the reporting period.

Community support played a major role in the success of CSCY initiatives. Cook Medical contributed sponsorship funding, while local organizations and businesses provided additional financial and in-kind support for student prizes, event materials, and recognition efforts.

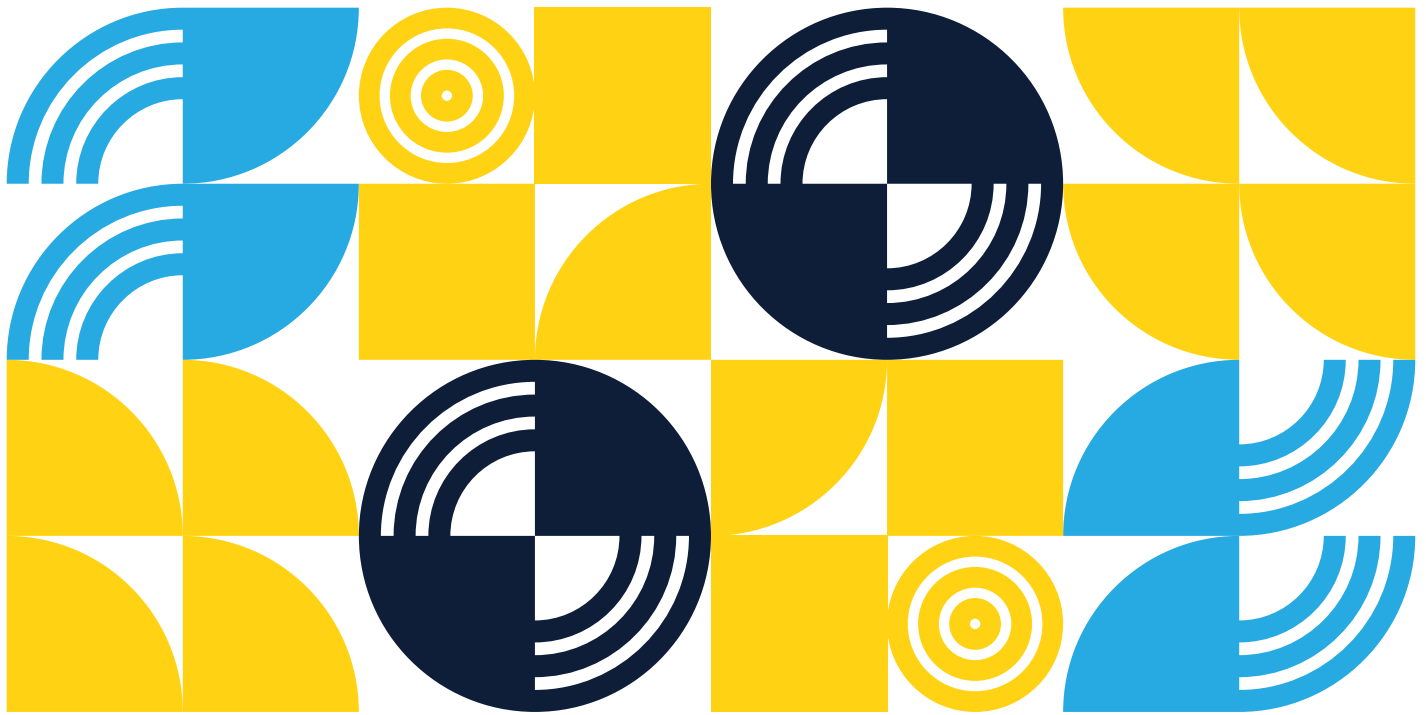

The purpose of the CSCY is to promote connections in our community which empower, enhance, and nurture children and youth. The Commission uses resources and information to make recommendations to people and organizations with authority intending to create and support systems that encourage healthy development of Bloomington's next generation.

The CSCY is enabled under the Bloomington Municipal Code 2.23.050 whose objectives are as follows:

- Identify and assess needs, resources, and services relating to children and youth;
- Encourage collaboration between local agencies, schools, businesses and individuals;
- Monitor legislative developments relating to children and youth;
- Encourage local, state, and federal legislation that will improve the lives of children and youth;
- Empower children and youth to have a stronger voice in our community
- Empower children and youth to reach their full potential
- Report assessments and make recommendations; and
- Celebrate successes.

The CSCY is composed of nine volunteer commissioners. The City of Bloomington supports the Commission with a staff liaison. Commissioners serve two-year terms. Five commissioners are appointed by the mayor, and four are appointed by the City Council. The CSCY has existed since 2004.

The Commission operates on an annual budget of \$2,000, exclusive of monetary and in-kind donations. The S.W.A.G.G.E.R. Award program is the Commission’s largest expense, excluding donations. While the CSCY hosted their largest ever S.W.A.G.G.E.R. Awards this year, it was able to support other community initiatives like the Black History Month Poster Board Contest.

In preparation for the 2025 S.W.A.G.G.E.R. Awards, Commissioners and City staff procured nearly \$4,000 in donations. \$2,795 of that were contributions from local organizations, which helped towards the winner and nominee prizes.

Major Accomplishments: 2025 S.W.A.G.G.E.R. Awards

Coming off a break in 2024 due to Commission attendance, CSCY hosted their largest ever S.W.A.G.G.E.R Awards to date in 2025. Previously hosted in Council chambers during the fall semester, a new venue with intense marketing and resource development made this year's awards one for the books. 179 attendees came together to celebrate Students Who Act Generously, Grow and Earn Respect during the 2024-2025 school year. Of 23 nominations sent in via MCCSC, after school programs, faith groups and more, winners were chosen for the following categories:

- 4th - 6th Grade: Jasiayr Burrus
- 7th - 8th Grade: Haley Hall

Each winner received a congratulatory letter and a prize basket full of gift certificates from local businesses and age appropriate toys. For the Group category, a new laptop computer was donated by MStreet Fiber to My Sister's Closet in the Troop's honor.

Each nominee was awarded a certificate and received a goodie bag with gift cards to local establishments like the Chocolate Moose and Wonderlab.

Major Accomplishments: Community Engagement

The CSCY set out in 2025 to engage more with the community. Learning alongside those advocating for, parenting, teaching, and working with children and youth is how we as a commission understand the status.

The CSCY participated in a fair amount of tabling opportunities with the goal of spreading the awareness of the commission and its initiatives. Commissioners tabled at the annual Children’s Expo as well as Fairview Elementary’s community resource open house. Both opportunities allowed for commissioners to convey that an appointed group of volunteers exist and work to enrich the lives of our community’s youth.

The CSCY heard from 2 community partners in the guest speaker series. Representatives from Exodus Refugee and Tandem both presented to the commission on their role in affecting children and youth in the community.

In 2024, the CSCY set out to with the intention to interact with and support other commissions and their initiatives that involve children and youth. Commissioners supported 3 of the Commission on the Status of Black Males initiatives including the Million Father March and Winter Wonderland.

Program Highlights: Read for the Record

2025 Annual Report

In October 2025, the Commission coordinated its annual Read for the Record initiative. Read for the Record encourages early literacy by creating shared reading experiences for elementary aged children. The book for 2025's Read for the Record was called Nigel and the Moon.

In Bloomington and Monroe County, the City of Bloomington Community and Family Resources (CFRD) and Commission On The Status of Children and Youth (CSCY) partnered with the Monroe County Community School Corporation School administration, faculty, staff, students, teachers, parents and community members with 120 shared reading experiences, celebrating early literacy and supporting children's early language development.
