BLOOMINGTON BOARD OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Bloomington Board of Public Safety held a Regular Session on **Thursday, June 18, 2026, at 10:30am**, in the McCloskey Room, Room 135, City of Bloomington located at 401 N. Morton Street, Bloomington, Indiana.

CALL TO ORDER

Board Member Timothy Brinson called the meeting to order at 10:34 a.m. Board Members Charles Cohen, Barbara McKinney and Patrick Galm were also present.

Also in attendance were:

- Police: Police Captain Mick Williams, Police Captain Ryan Pedigo; and
- Fire: Assistant Fire Chief Tania Daffron; and
- Staff: Assistant City Attorney Chris Wheeler and Police Department Office Assistant and Outreach Specialist Sarah Shahnava.

APPROVAL OF CONSENT AGENDA

Board Member Timothy Brinson asked if any members of the board wanted to discuss or object to any items on the consent agenda. These items included the minutes from the May 21, 2026 Regular Session, claims registers dated 5/22/26, 6/5/26, and 6/18/26 and payroll registers dated 5/15/26, 5/29/26, and 6/12/26. None of the board members had questions or objections. All items were approved.

POLICE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS**Report on Monthly Statistics and Training:**

Police Captain Ryan Pedigo reported on monthly statistics for May. Call volume and crime totals were down slightly compared to this time last year, while traffic stops held relatively consistent compared to this time last year. Crimes involving weapons also continue to trend down compared to previous years. Adult arrests are up compared to this time last year, while juvenile arrests remain fairly consistent compared to previous years.

Captain Pedigo reported on training hours for the month of May. BPD personnel logged a total of 677 training hours in May, which consisted of the following. Nine officers completed 27 hours each of low light firearms instructor training. 29 officers completed ½ hour of BMV driver's license forfeiture training. 14 officers completed 21 hours of annual in-service training. Two officers completed 40 hours each of certified ILEA instructor training. Two officers attended a 12 hour ICAP technology conference. Two officers attended a seven hour drug facilitated sexual assault investigation training. K9s trained for a total of 15 hours.

Captain Pedigo reported on prior and upcoming community engagement events. BPD personnel logged a total of 34 community engagement hours in May. Prior events include the following. The 10th annual Pack the Cruiser Food Drive, where BPD helped collect 1,135 lbs of food for the Hoosier Hills Food Bank. An elopement drill and instruction at Bell Trace Nursing Home, helping staff prepare for if/when a patient/resident absconds from the facility. Community Safety Event at Old Navy in the College Mall. A local girl scout troop visited BPD headquarters to earn their junior detective badge by completing an activity where they worked with detectives to solve a (staged) vandalism case. Upcoming events include forever friends outreach with the Bloomington Animal Shelter and Critical Incident Debriefing with Owen County first responders.

Captain Pedigo reported on Police Social Worker activity for the month of May. The team received a total number of 172 referrals and made 319 contacts. A summary of their work is as follows. A Police Mental Health

Professional (MHP) assisted an elderly couple with creating a budget and getting bill due dates extended to avoid late payment penalties. The Dispatch MHP created training for new dispatchers to complete that explains the role of the Police Social Support Services (PSSS) Team, the Dispatch MHP role, and overall wellness. A Police MHP assisted a family with getting a teen scheduled for counseling at the Youth Services Bureau. A Police MHP presented at both Habitat for Humanity and the IUPA. PSSS team hosted Terre Haute PD so they could learn about the program and improve their new Police Social Work program. Outreach and Resource Specialists (OARS) coordinated with heading home to assist a client with touring and accepting housing at Kinser Flats. OARS partnered with Community Kitchen to provide resources for a client who was facing eviction. OARS continue to check-in with a client that they helped secure housing last year. That client is set to renew their lease for a second year.

Letters of Appreciation

None were presented.

General Business

Captains Pedigo and Williams informed the Board of classification designation updates to the FOP collective bargaining agreement for 2027-2030: the previous order of promotion for officers (1) probationary police officer, (2) officer first class, (3) senior police officer. Starting in 2027, the order of promotion is updated to (1) probationary police officer, (2) officer second class, (3) officer first class. The reason for this designation change is due to the language in the 1977 pension fund, where certified pension salary is based on the pay rate for officer first class, which, up until this change in classification designation, was not reflective of the highest promotional class for police officers (before supervisory positions).

Personnel Issues:

Captain Pedigo reported that BPD is currently at 94 sworn officers, and that the Pension Secretary just received word that applicant Olivia Crose, whom the Board voted for an official offer of employment in the 5/21/26 Regular Session, was approved to enter into the 1977 Fund. The official offer of employment is now to be extended.

Captain Pedigo stated that the department plans to have an open hiring process in July, for both sworn and non-sworn applicants.

Purchases: Expenditures/Procurements:

Captain Pedigo reported that the only major expenditures coming up are routine vehicle purchases.

CIRT/ARV REPORT

Captain Williams reported that there were no CIRT/ARV deployments in May.

FIRE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS

Fire Report on Monthly Statistics and Training:

Assistant Fire Chief Tania Daffron reported on monthly statistics for May. Year-to-date calls for service in the city are at 2647, and 342 of those calls were to IU's campus. 220 individuals were educated during commercial fire inspections, bringing the year-to-date total to 1523 individuals reached for fire inspector's educational outreach. The department has completed 57 smoke detector/battery installations out of their annual goal of 100. The department has completed 17% of their annual goal of 2250, fire inspections at highest risk occupancies within the City of Bloomington.

Assistant Chief Daffron reported that BFD's training for May included 3855 total hours, and included the following. Recruit academy with Monroe Fire took their EMT course at Ivy Tech, which included a meet and greet luncheon. Gold and red shifts had flashover training and operations had 'Mega-code' (cardiac arrest) training. Martin attended surface water and swiftwater rescue training. Stags attended structural collapse training. Lobosky attended advanced pump operations training.

Assistant Chief Daffron reported that the Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) team installed 8 car seats, completed an average of 9.3 visits per client, engaged 18 different services, engaged 9 different agencies and had a total of 12 referrals in May. Notable accomplishments of the MIH team in May include the following. The team helped a patient transition from being bed-confined and facing imminent death to being free of infection from bed sores and able to walk with a cane. The team was able to assist a patient in replacing essential medical and household items after all was lost in a house fire. Wound care was also provided for injuries sustained in the fire. The team facilitated the process of getting a ramp installed at no cost to a homebound patient. A patient has had no falls since implementing home safety measures that were recommended by the MIH team.

Assistant Chief Daffron reported that the department received a letter of appreciation from Fairview's Brownie Troop #3000 for their visit and safety merit badge opportunity at Station 1.

General Business:

Assistant Chief Daffron reported that a new deputy fire marshal starts on June 22nd.

Personnel Issues

Assistant Chief Daffron reported that two firefighters are on light duty and seven are off on intermittent baby bonding time.

Purchases: Expenditures/Procurements:

Assistant Chief Daffron reported that the training and logistics building on South Walnut is still on track to be open in September.

OLD BUSINESS

There was no old business discussed.

NEW BUSINESS

New Business From Staff: Assistant City Attorney Chris Wheeler requests that the Board consider rescheduling 2026, meetings for August through December to accommodate a change to his schedule. The Board tentatively plans to meet at 11:30am on the third Thursday of each month in the McCloskey Conference Room, as opposed to the current schedule of meeting at 10:30am on the third Thursday of each month in the McCloskey Conference Room.

New Business From Staff: The July 16, 2026, Regular Session must be rescheduled due to the APWA Accreditation Committee having reserved the McCloskey Conference Room for July 14-16, 2026. The Board tentatively plans to meet at 10:30am on Friday July 17, 2026, in the McCloskey Conference Room.

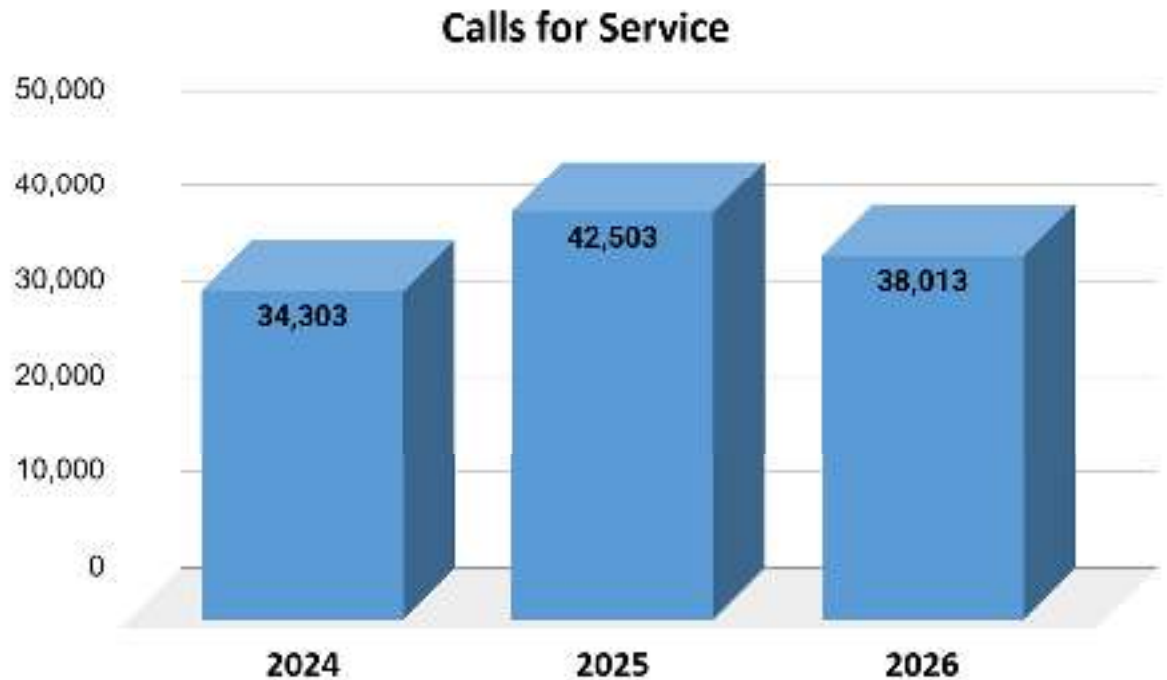

This figure represents a 10.6% decrease in 2026.

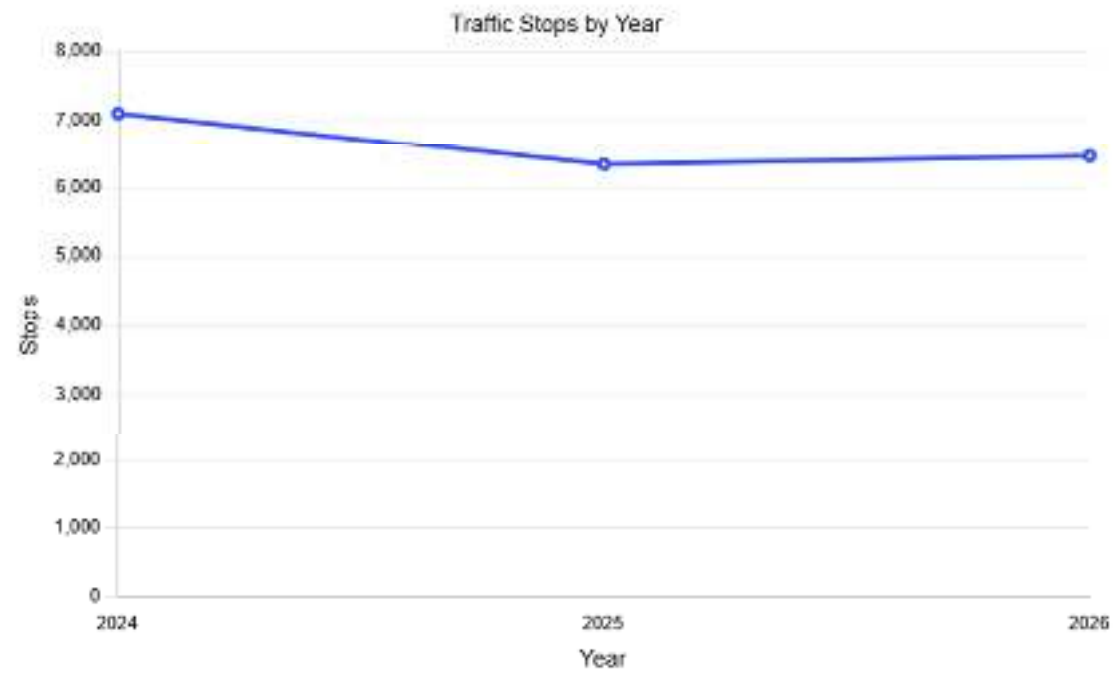

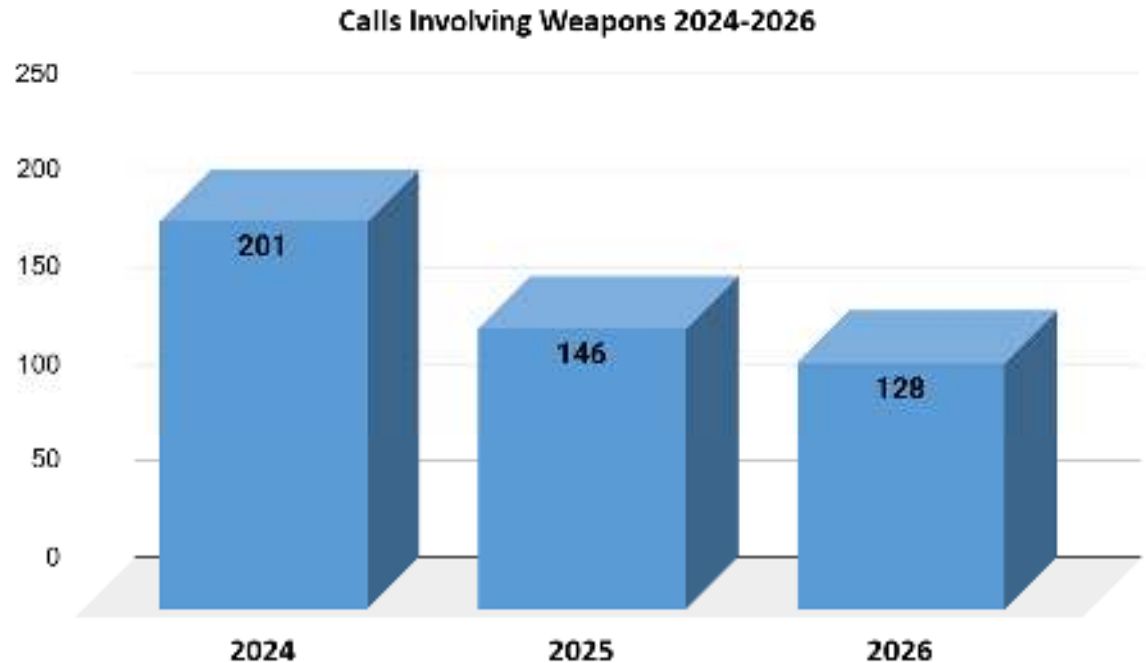
TRAFFIC STOP COMPARISON

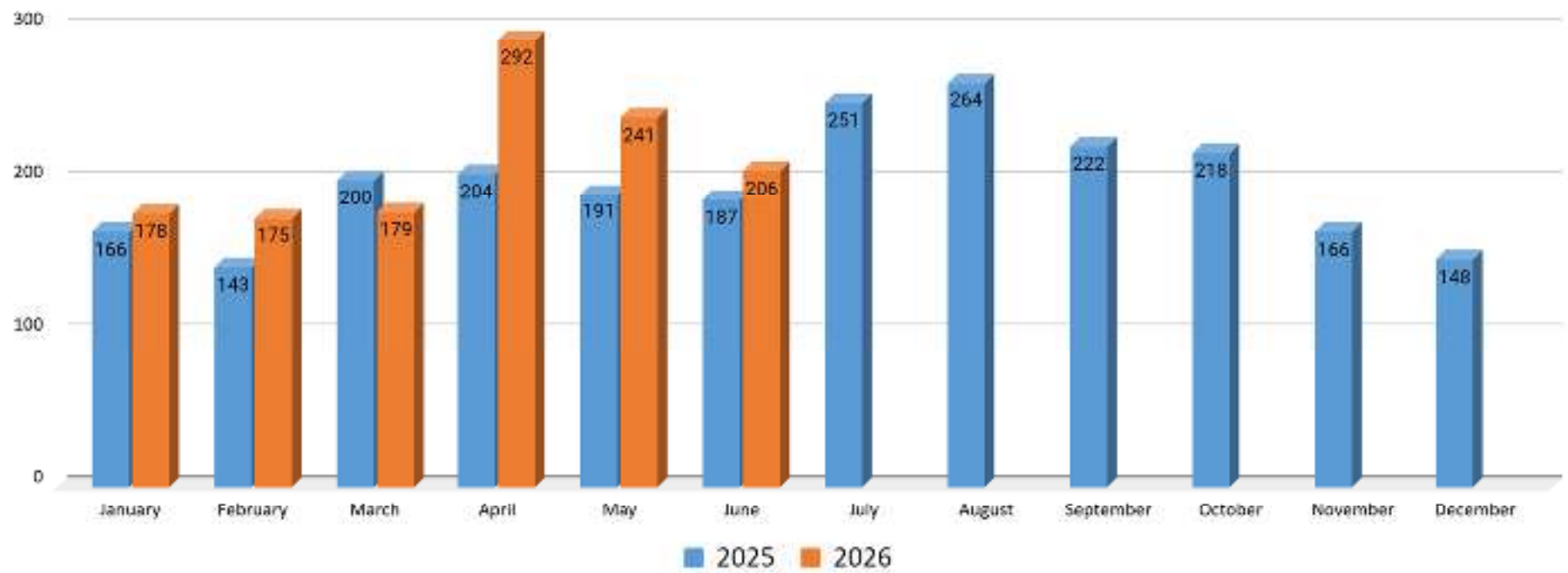


CRIME INVOLVING WEAPONS

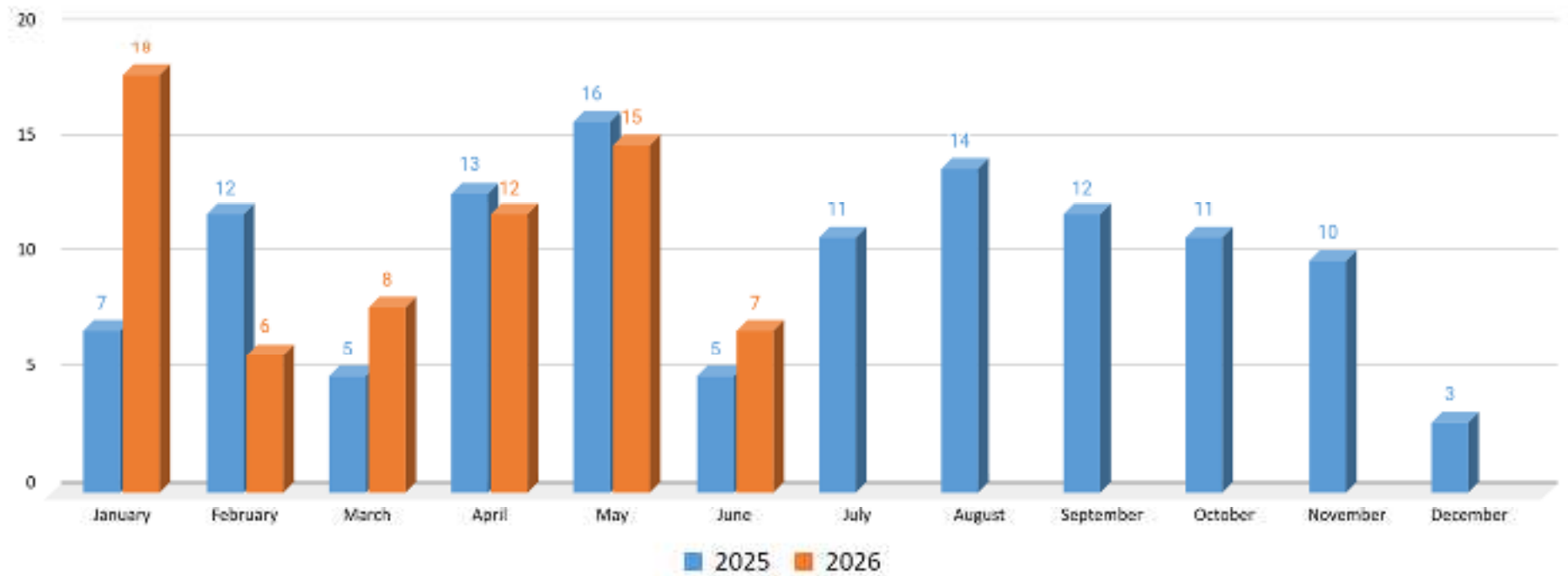
- So far in 2026, there have been 128 incidents where weapons were reportedly involved.

2025-2026 Adult Arrests

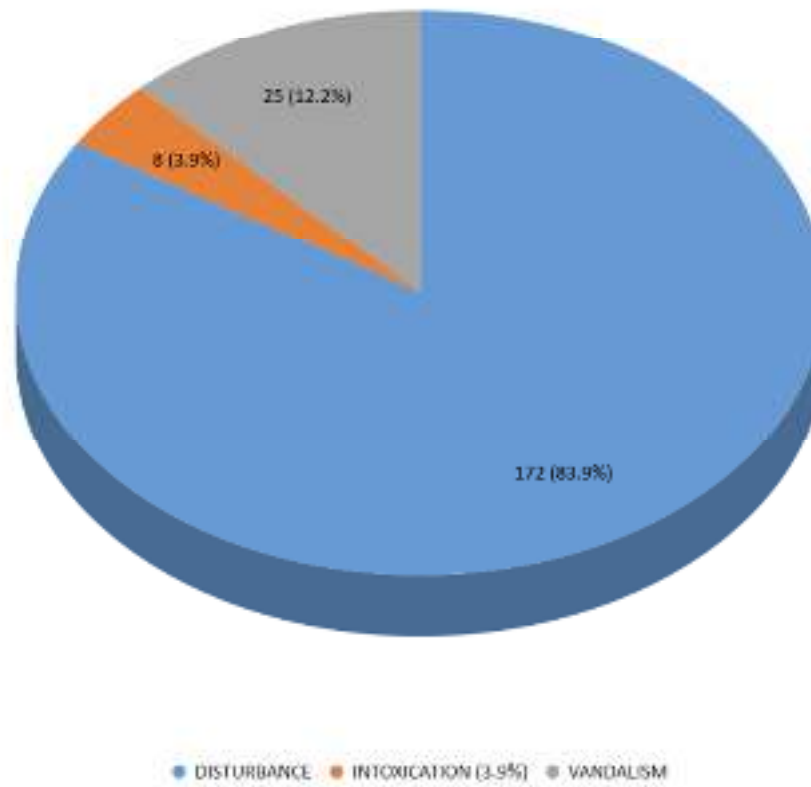


2025-2026 Juvenile Referrals

Dear Chief Dickhoff,

The Santa Clara Police Department extends its sincere appreciation to Sgt. Joe Henry and the Bloomington Police Department for their invaluable assistance during the investigation of the critical incident that occurred in Santa Clara on May 5, 2026. Their prompt support and professionalism played an important role in advancing our investigation.

On Friday, May 5, 2026, at approximately 12:24 p.m., Santa Clara Police Department dispatchers received multiple reports of gunfire in the 600 block of Enright Avenue. Responding officers located an adult male suffering from multiple gunshot wounds outside his residence and immediately began lifesaving efforts while gunfire continued nearby. Officers also encountered an active residential fire, prompting the evacuation of neighboring homes, the establishment of a secure perimeter, and the coordination of a large-scale public safety response. Due to the ongoing threat and uncertainty surrounding the incident, officers deployed armored rescue vehicles, drones, specialized tactical personnel, and regional mutual aid resources to protect the public and first responders. Following an extensive search, the suspect was located deceased inside the involved residence.

During the investigation, Santa Clara Police Department detectives determined that the parents of both the victim and the suspect resided in Bloomington, Indiana. Detectives contacted Sgt. Joe Henry of the Bloomington Police Department, who immediately assisted with locating and notifying the families, coordinating the service of a search warrant at the suspect's residence, and providing critical investigative information that helped detectives establish the likely motive in this tragic case.

The professionalism, responsiveness, and partnership demonstrated by Sgt. Henry and the Bloomington Police Department exemplify the strong collaboration that exists among law enforcement agencies. We are grateful for their assistance and unwavering commitment to public safety.

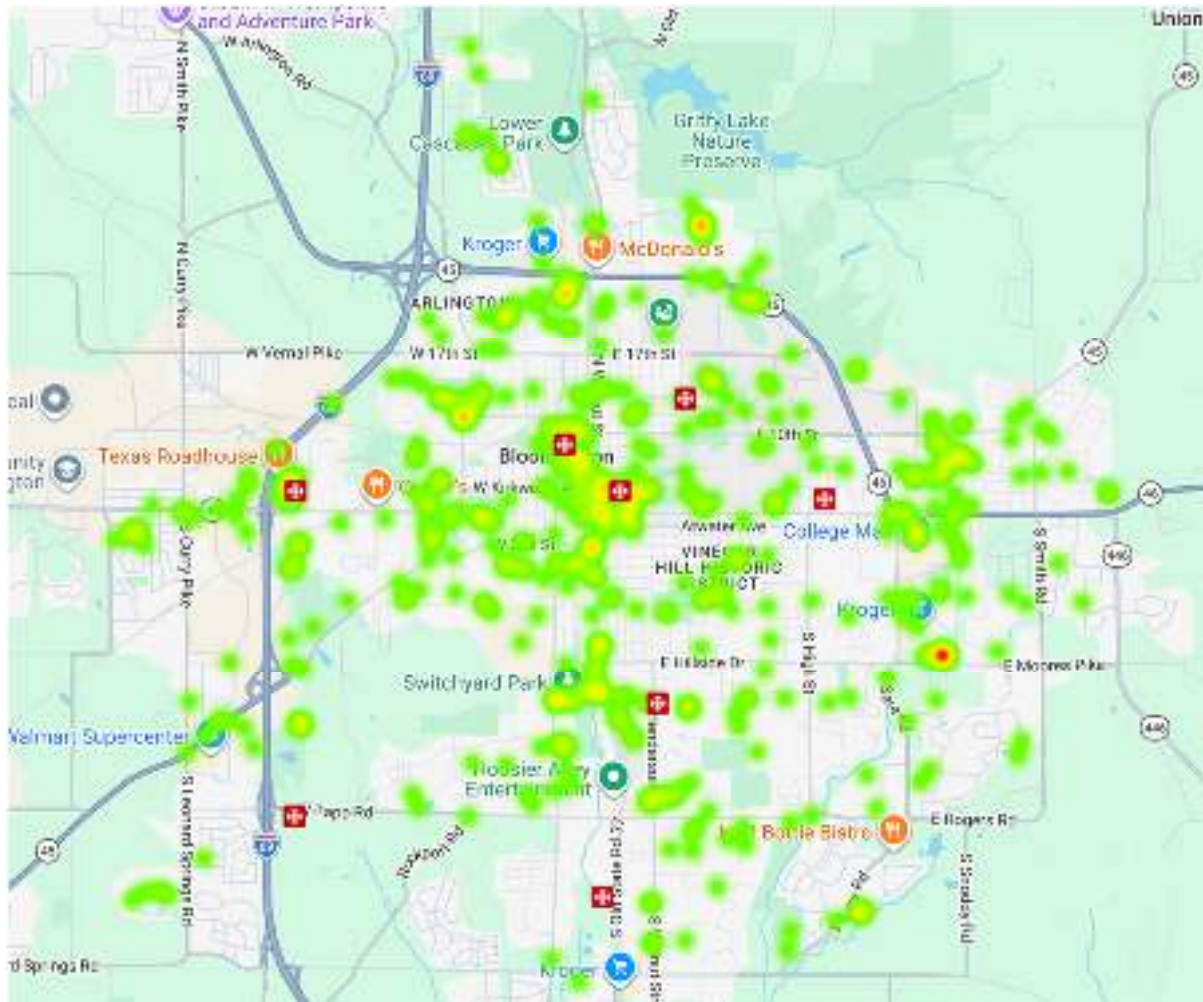

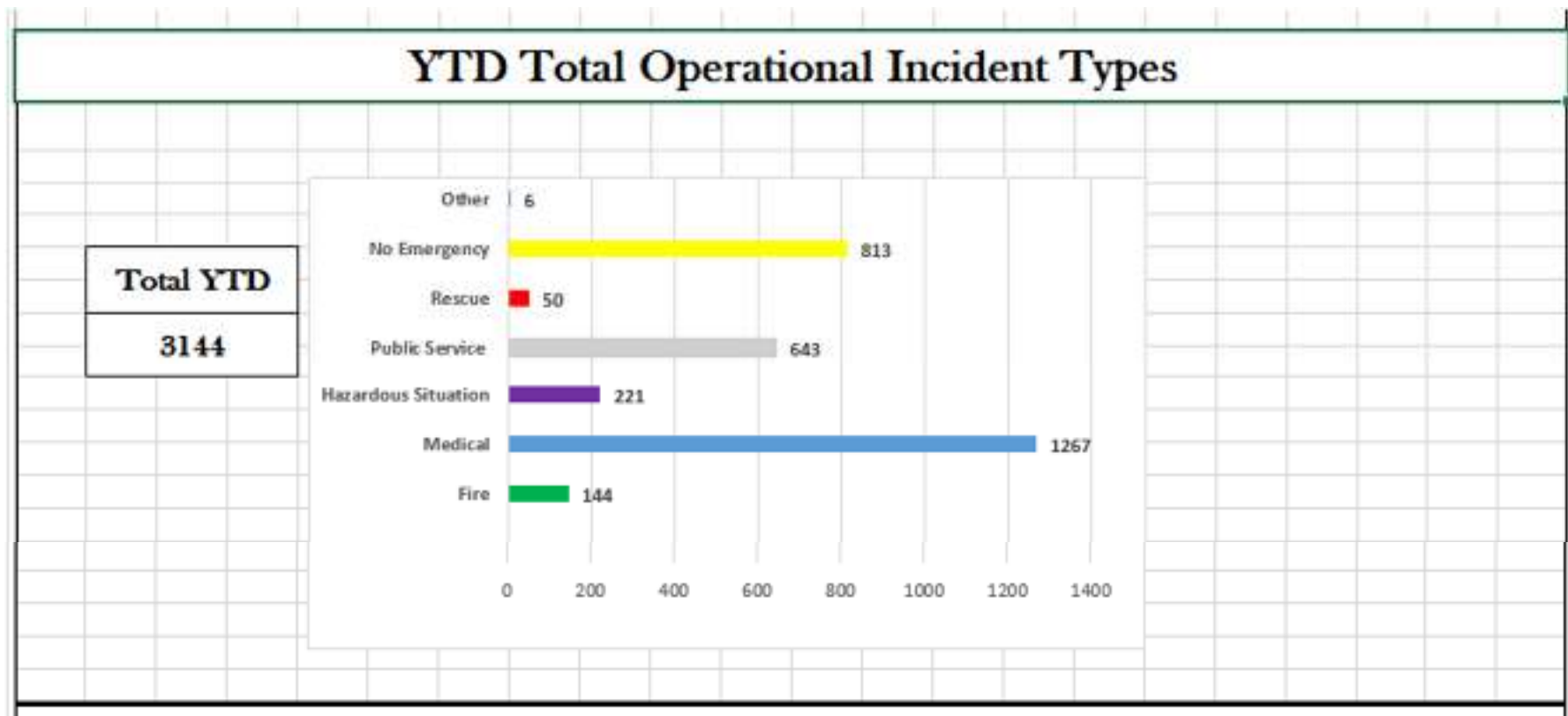

runs in June 2026**

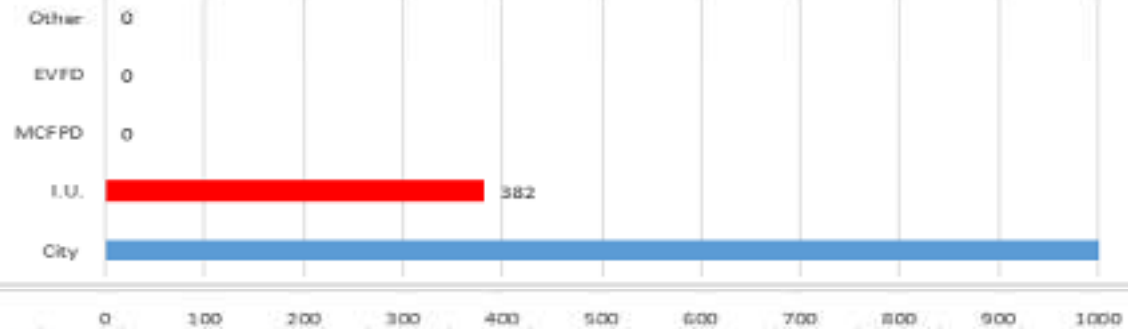
BFD's Breakdown of Emergency Responses

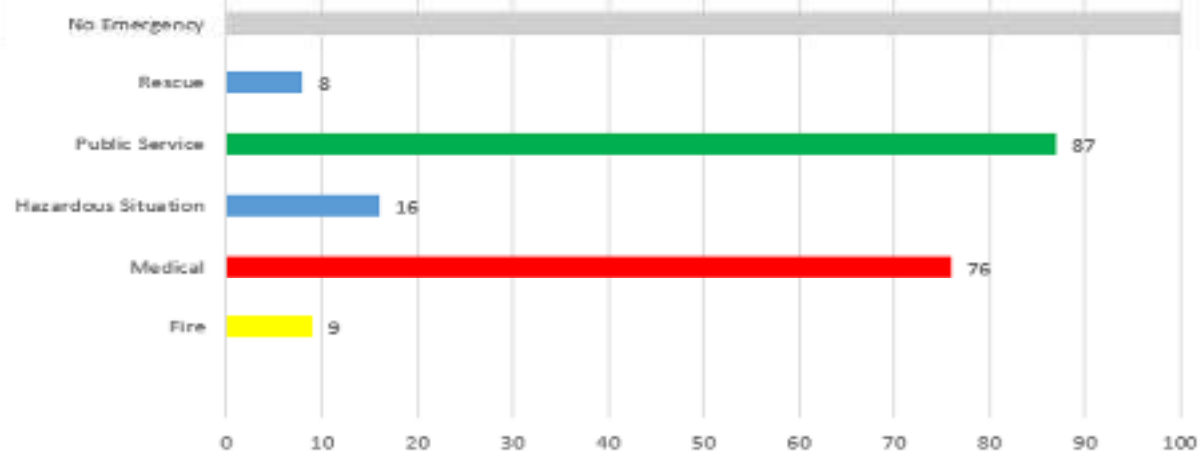


YTD Indiana University Incident Types

TO RECOMMEND AN AMENDMENT TO TITLE 2 OF THE BLOOMINGTON MUNICIPAL
CODE REGARDING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE BLOOMINGTON FIRE MERIT
COMMISSION**

Whereas, on January 1, 2025, the City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission (the "Commission") was established by operation of law pursuant to I.C. 36-8-3.5-5.5(d); and

Whereas, the Commission has the power and duty of hiring, promoting and disciplining members of the City of Bloomington Fire Department as set out in I.C. 36-8-3.5; and

Whereas, the Board of Public Safety continues to have control of and oversees all other aspects of the City of Bloomington Fire Department; and

Whereas, it is appropriate to identify this delineation of power between the Board of Public Safety and the Commission through an amendment to Chapter 2.17 of Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code; and

Whereas, it is also appropriate to establish a new chapter 2.36 under Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code that sets forth the powers and duties of the City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission following the same or similar format set forth under Chapter 2.17; and

Whereas, the Board of Public Safety has duly considered the proposed amendment to Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code, determined that the amendment is appropriate and necessary and recommends that the same be adopted by the City of Bloomington Common Council.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Public Safety of Bloomington, Indiana, as follows:

1. The Board approves this Resolution and hereby recommends to the Common Council that it adopt the proposed language set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein.
2. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect upon its adoption by the Board.

BLOOMINGTON COMMON COUNCIL ORDINANCE NUMBER 2026-XX - AMENDING TITLE 2 OF THE BLOOMINGTON MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING ESTABLISHMENT OF THE FIRE MERIT COMMISSION

Preamble

Whereas, the City of Bloomington (the “City”), has previously established a Board of Public Safety under Bloomington Municipal Code 2.17; and

Whereas, on January 1, 2025, the City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission (the “Commission”) was established by operation of law pursuant to I.C. 36-8-3.5-5.5(d); and

Whereas, the Commission has the power and duty of hiring, promoting and disciplining members of the City of Bloomington Fire Department as set out in I.C. 36-8-3.5; and

Whereas, the Board of Public Safety continues to have control of and oversees all other aspects of the City of Bloomington Fire Department; and

Whereas, it is appropriate to identify this delineation of power between the Board of Public Safety and the Commission through an amendment to Chapter 2.17 of Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code; and

Whereas, it is also appropriate to establish a new chapter 2.36 under Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code that sets forth the powers and duties of the City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission following the same or similar format set forth under Chapter 2.17; and

Whereas, on June 17, 2026, the Board of Public Safety considered the proposed amendment to Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code, determined that the amendment is appropriate and necessary, and adopted a resolution recommending that the Common Council adopt the amendment in substantially the same form. A copy of the resolution is attached as Exhibit “A”; and

Whereas, the proposed amendments to Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code has been duly considered by the Common Council of the City of Bloomington.

Be It Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Bloomington, Monroe County, Indiana, That:

Section 1: Section 2.17.030 shall be amended in its entirety to read as follows:

“With the exception of the hiring, promoting and discipline of members of the fire department of the city, which shall be overseen by the City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission, the board of public safety shall have control and oversee the police and fire department of the city pursuant to statute, and shall have the authority to allow and approve claims. ”

Section 2: Chapter 2.36 shall be added to Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code, shall be titled Fire Merit Commission, and shall read as follows:

2.36 - Fire Merit Commission.

2.36.000 - Establishment.

On January 1, 2025, pursuant to I.C. 36-8-3.5-5.5(d), by operation of law, a fire merit commission was established for the City of Bloomington Fire Department (the “Department”) and is known as the City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission (the “Commission”).

2.36.010 - Appointments and Elections.

The Commission shall consist of five commissioners. Two commissioners, who shall be of different political parties, shall be appointed by the mayor, and shall serve at the pleasure of the mayor. One commissioner shall be appointed by the common council, and shall serve at the pleasure of the common council. Two commissioners, who shall be of different political parties, shall be elected by the active members of the Department. For purposes of this section, political affiliation shall be determined through the voter’s registration records for the three most recent primary elections.

2.36.020 - Term.

The term of each commissioner shall be four years. However, one of the mayor’s initial selected commissioners and one of the Department’s initial elected commissioners shall initially serve a two year term.

2.36.030 - Qualifications.

Each commissioner shall:

- a. Be at least 21 years of age;
- b. Be a person of good moral character;
- c. Not be an active member of any police or fire department or agency; and
- d. Be a legal resident of the City of Bloomington for three consecutive years immediately preceding the commissioner's term.

Not more than two of the commissioners may be past members of a police or fire department or agency. No commissioners may receive any remuneration as salary from the City.

2.36.040 - Powers and Duties.

The Commission shall have the exclusive power to hire, promote and discipline members of the Department and shall have those powers and duties as are now set forth in I.C. 36-8-3.5, and as may be amended from time to time.

Section 3: Severability.

If any section, sentence, or provision of this ordinance, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall be declared invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any of the other sections, sentences, or provisions or applications of this ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

Section 4: Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.

Synopsis:

This ordinance amends Title 2 of the Bloomington Municipal Code to delineate the duties between the Bloomington Board of Public Safety and the City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission and to create a new chapter which identifies the existence of the statutorily created City of Bloomington Fire Merit Commission.
