In the Common Council Chambers of the Municipal Building held on June 1, 1983, 7:30 P.M., with Council President Pro-Tem Pam Service presiding over a Regular Session of the Common Council.

Councilmembers Present: Porter, Service, Murphy, Gross, Olcott, Hogan. Absent: Towell, Dilcher, Morrison (vacation).

Council President Pro-Tem Service gave the agenda summation.

Councilmember Gross read an Encomium for John Freeman, thanking him for his many years of service to the City of Bloomington. and wishing him the best of luck in his new position with the REPS company here in Bloomington.

Service commended the Friends of Griffy for the rain dated clean-up for Lake Griffy on Sunday, May 29. That is the type of volunteer activity that our city should be proud of. It was a great success and Service thanked all who participated in this effort. The Service family adopted an Animal Shelter dog over the weekend and she urged people to consider the shelter if they were looking for a pet. Many pets are available for adoption and just waiting for a home. Porter asked if it was a snake eating dog.

Mayor Allison also expressed thanks to John Freeman for his contributions to the City and was sure that he would take many memorable experiences with him. Allison also said that the new home rule legislation would take away the control cities need for determinating cable uses and rates. Please contact your senators regarding S.B. 66. As a community, we have come to rely on the cable TV as a public media information system and the local cable coverage may not be able to continue as we know it.

The nominations were approved by a voice vote.

David Cole and Rick Hays of Channel 3 expressed concern over the recent TCI decisions regarding the funding for access television and said that they would continue to keep the council informed as would the Telecommunications Council. Olcott also was concerned about Channel 3 saying that if we lose control over what is a community access media, all of Bloomington will lose.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to introduce and read Ordinance 83-26 by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to adopt Ordinance 83-26. Porter read the committee report.

Olcott asked Freeman if the City was comfortable with the appraised price and Freeman said that it was. The building will probably be torn down and the property listed for sale.

The amendment, pertaining to the \$133,000 for land acquisition received a roll call vote of Ayes: 6, Nays: 0.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to introduce and read Ordinance 83-24 by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance by title only.

ORD. 83-24 TO AMEND TITLE 15 LIMITED PARKING ON FOURTH ST.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to adopt Ordinance 83-24. Porter gave the committee report.

Service said that there have been several letters of concern from tenants and I.U. employees who park on fourth Street.

Hogan said that he understood the concerns of these citizens but that it really wasn't up to the city to provide storage parking for university employees.

Artie D'Antonio, a postal employee, conducted a short tour of the area and found that almost every address on Fourth St. provided, or had available if the owner wished it to be available, parking in the rear of businesses and shops along Fourth St. He felt that more than accomodated resident and shopper needs for parking. Approximately 100 persons are employed by the Post Office who have to be at work by 6:30 A.M. and this ordinance is creating a hardship for these employees. There is no other place to park that is free. Olcott suggested that perhaps the postal employees might move their cars into the post office lot as the rural vehicles leave for their routes.

Hogan said that the entire City faces similar problems in some respects and wondered how why the City should be obliged to provide parking for everyone. Businesses should provide parking for their employees and that includes the post office. If business is to develop, you do not get that without a turnover in parking. The Council must consider what is the greatest use for the greatest number of people. He continued by saying that the City is more obligated to property owners and businesses than persons who simply need a place to park a car.

D'Antonio asked that the ordinance be amended to read between Dunn and Grant Street. There is only a real estate business and a doctor's office between Lincoln and Grant and why tie up that area in restricted parking.

Olcott suggested that the postal employees petition the post office for on-site parking. Alan Turner, vice-president of the postal union, said that the signs are posted "government parking only" and the designated space is necessary for the large tractor trailers that must turn around in the lot.

Hogan said that in time there would be limited parking in many parts of the city; that we must concern ourselves with turnover rather that storage.

D'AntoniQ said there were 17 metered spots and 52 spaces in the city lot and did the city intend to meter them also. Hogan responded that the city built a building and also built a parking lot to accomodate the employees of that building. The city is caught in the middle of the university's parking problem as well as the post office's.

Murphy moved and Service seconded that Ordinance 83-24 be amended to include only the area from Grant to Dunn St.

The amendment received a roll call vote of Ayes: 3 (Porter, Service, Murphy), Nays: 3 (Olcott, Gross, Hogan). The amendment failed.

The ordinance, as originally presented, received a roll call vote of Ayes: 6, Nays: 0.

Mayor Allison offered the suggestion that the Old Library lot be considered by the postal workers for all day parking.

Porter urges the Mayor to continue working with the Office to resolve this problem

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Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to introduce and read Ordinance 83-25 by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to adopt Ordinance 83-25. Porter read the committee report.

The ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes: 6, Nays: 0.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to introduce and read Ordinance 83-26 by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to adopt Ord. 83-26. Porter read the committee report.

The ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes: 6, Nays:0.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to introduce and read Ordinance 83-27 by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved, Porter seconded a motion to adopt Ord. 83-27. Porter read the committee report.

Tim Mueller said there was little to add to what had already been said. Olcott asked if there was any remonstrance by neighbors. Mueller said no. Hogan stated that this seemed to be a very good use for this property.

Service did not agree with the other councilmembers' statements and expressed concern that a zoning change would alter the neighborhood in a manner that might not be desirable in five or ten years.

The ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes: 5, Nays:1 (Service).

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion to introduce and read Appropriation Ordinance 83-5 by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved and Porter seconded a motion tomadopt Appropriaton Ordinance 83-5. Porter gave the committee report.

Dick Martin, a resident of the Griffy area, thanked the council for their involvement and interest in the Lake Griffy controversy. He said that it is now possible to get around the curves on Hinkle Rd.; that people are still using the area but in a manner that is more in keeping with the fragile nature of the area; that things are better than they have been for the last flew years; and hoped that data would be gathered to identify and solve the problems of the area.

Gross thanked Mr. Martin for the many hours of his time that he has devoted to wonking out compromise and overall agreement as to what should be done with the Griffy area.

The ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes: 6, Nays: 0.

Murphy moved and Porter seconded a motion to suspend the first reading for Ordinance 83-12. (Ordinance 83-12 was passed by the Council on April 21, 1983 and signed by the Mayor. The ordinance was not published in time so as to comply with the statute that dictates publication deadlines, so it is being re-adopted by the Council) ORD. 83-25 TO VACATE PUBLIC PARCEL (KEN NUNN)
