Councilman Clegg remarked that the announcement the Mayor made this morning regarding his candidacy is the best news that the City of Bloomington has had for some time. Councilman Clegg stated that any small amount of influence or support that he might have he would wholeheartedly throw in the Mayor's direction. Mr. Clegg further stated that he knew there were thousands of other people who appreciate the unparalleled progress that has been made in the last seven years.

Council President Johnson announced that Council Committee appointments for the year 1971 would be discussed at the next Council meeting.

Mayor Hooker congratulated Councilman Johnson upon his election as Council President for the year 1971 and pledged that he and the administrative officers of the city would make every effort, as they have in the past, to work with the Council. Congratulations were, also, extended to Council President Pro Tem Robert Gray with the same pledge of working together.

Mayor Hooker asked the Council to please consider his suggestion of looking into the Councilmanic Districts as they are now established to see if they are in keeping with the spirit and the intent of the law and, if the Council determines that it is advisable to make changes, that they take immediate action. Mayor Hooker feels that the precincts, as now constructed, do not conform to the Councilmanic Districts.

Along with mentioning the recent announcement of his candidacy, Mayor Hooker stated that in the past seven years he has made an effort to reflect the opinion of the councilmen, the department heads and other key officials of the city, crediting these people with being responsible for bringing about the good that has been accomplished in this community. Mayor Hooker stated that a great deal has been done and a great deal remains to be done if we are to meet the needs of the people of the community; and, that he hopes the Council will make a bid to continue to serve the community.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

In reviewing the past seven years, Mayor Hooker stated that they have been a trying and difficult time. Our society has had serious problems to face and as a part of that society we, too, have had problems. The Mayor considered the record of Greater Bloomington, of which Indiana University is a vital part, to be outstanding in comparison with other communities in the United States and the actions they have taken regarding mutual problems.

In speaking of the City of Bloomington, Mayor Hooker stated that we have experienced a greater awareness and a greater concern for the individual and we have shown more compassion for one another - all of which have made Bloomington the community we are pleasured to work and live in today. He feels the future of Bloomington is bright.

Mayor Hooker stated that his gain, if he has had a gain, has been in having the unique privilege of working with the people - especially the Council, the Department Heads and other officials. The thing that the Mayor stated he is the proudest of is the fact that these people have given themselves; they are dedicated people. Mayor Hooker stated that he knew of no personal gain made by these people and he knows that this is something special and something that does not happen in many administrations. Mayor Hooker stated that he hopes to have the privilege of working with these people for another four years.
