BLOOMINGTON BOARD OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Bloomington Board of Public Safety held a Regular Session on **Tuesday, May 16, 2023, at 6:00 p.m.**, in the McCloskey Room, Room 135, City of Bloomington located at 401 N. Morton Street, Bloomington, Indiana.

CALL TO ORDER

Board President Kim Gray called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Board Members Rachel Guglielmo, Natalia Galvan, Shruti Rana, and Isak Asare Nti were present.

Also in attendance were Board Secretaries Jazmyn Forte Plunkett and Ashley Sparks, Acting Fire Chief Jayme Washel, Fire Assistant Chief Tania Daffron, Police Captain Myrick Williams, Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham and Assistant City Attorney Heather Lacy. Members of the Public, including Fire Chauffers Jacelen "Jax" Rosebrock, Jordan Reeves, and Kody Waggoner were also present. See sign-in sheet for full list of attendees.

CERTIFICATION OF EXECUTIVE SESSION

Board President Kim Gray certified the executive session held earlier that evening.

APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MEETING MINUTES

Board Member Isak Nti Asare moved to approve the meeting minutes from the April 18, 2023, regular session. Board Member Natalia Galvan seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously, 5-0.

VERBAL CERTIFICATION OF PAYROLL

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham and Acting Fire Chief Jayme Washel both affirmed the payroll claims for May 5, 2023.

POLICE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS

Report on Monthly Statistics, Training and Incident Reports:

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham presented the monthly statistics and training. Board President Kim Gray asked about the formatting of statistics. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked if the uptick in April calls was due to Little 5 weekend. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered.

Board Member Rachel Guglielmo asked if this uptick was consistent with prior years at this time. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked if May is appearing to be consistent with prior years at this time. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered.

Board President Kim Gray mentioned taking a ride-along during Little 5 weekend.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on the uptick in arrests and juvenile referrals when compared to last April.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on the April to June metric in regards to hate crime reporting periods.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on the increase in domestic violence case increases in relativity to the uptick in calls overall.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on the decreased effectiveness of Narcan and the increased need due to increased overdoses.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on area shootings from prior events and the consistency in location with shots fired recently.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on a decrease in training hours due to an increase in community responsibilities in April.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on a decrease in the number of community engagements in April with the exception of Pre-school visits and explained that the decrease is due to a staffing shortage.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on upcoming community events, including the presence of a cruiser for the public to explore in the College Mall food court and Pack the Cruiser at Kroger West to benefit the Food Drive. Board Member Natalia Galvan responded to this conversation with a confirmation that she has seen the Food Court event advertised on social media.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on the impact of Social Workers and specific services they have provided.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on Community Service Specialists. Board Member Isak Nti Asare asked if the 2051 calls represented YTD. Board President Kim Gray clarified the number being a cumulative report. Police Deputy Chief answered.

General Business:

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on upcoming expenses related to renewed service contracts for things such as computer programs and body/vehicle cameras.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked if very many officers are taking advantage of the housing programs and other incentives. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham and Police Captain Myrick Williams answered.

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham spoke on new vehicles being purchased and customized.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked for the delivery/completion date of the new vehicles. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered.

Board President Kim Gray asked if the undercover Dodge Chargers were being phased out. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered.

Board Member Natalia Galvan asked about an officer who was in an accident this month. Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham answered.

The promotion of Taylor Jurgeto to Senior Police Officer was voted on. Board Member Isak Nti Asare moved to promote, Board Member Natalia Galvan seconded the motion. Motion passed with a vote of 5-0.

CIRT/ARV REPORT

Police Deputy Chief Scott Oldham presented CIRT Deployment Report. There was deployment this month for a person who escaped from custody; after forcible entry, there were no issues.

FIRE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS

Report on Monthly Statistics, Training and Incident Reports:

Board President Kim Gray asked if the PowerPoint was showing correct information. Acting Fire Chief Jayme Washel answered.

Board Member Isak Nti Asare addressed Chauffeur Jordan Reeves, commenting on the level of excitement felt when promoting someone, thanking Chauffeur Jordan Reeves for his service to the community and for his quick succession in promotions. The motion passed unanimously with a vote 5-0.

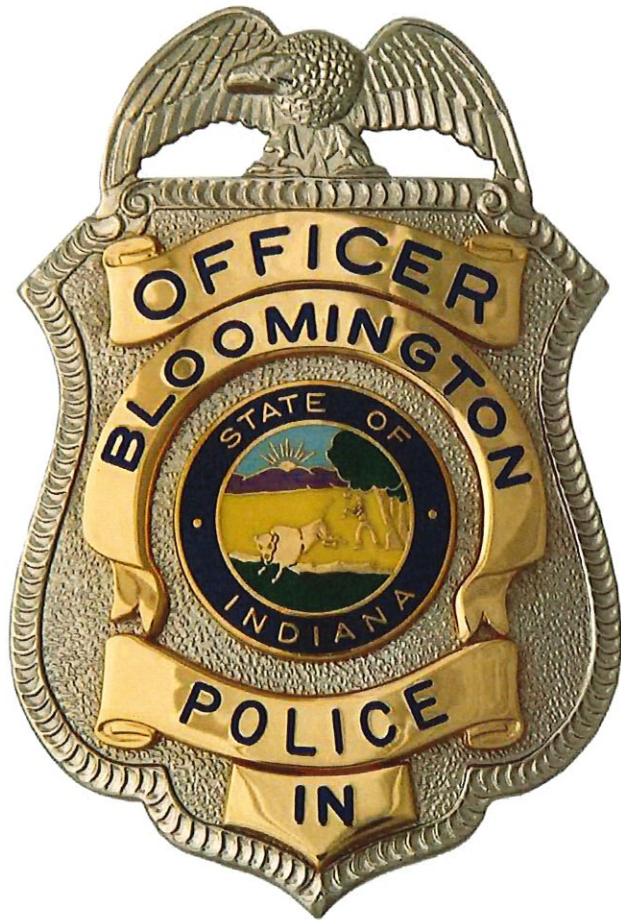

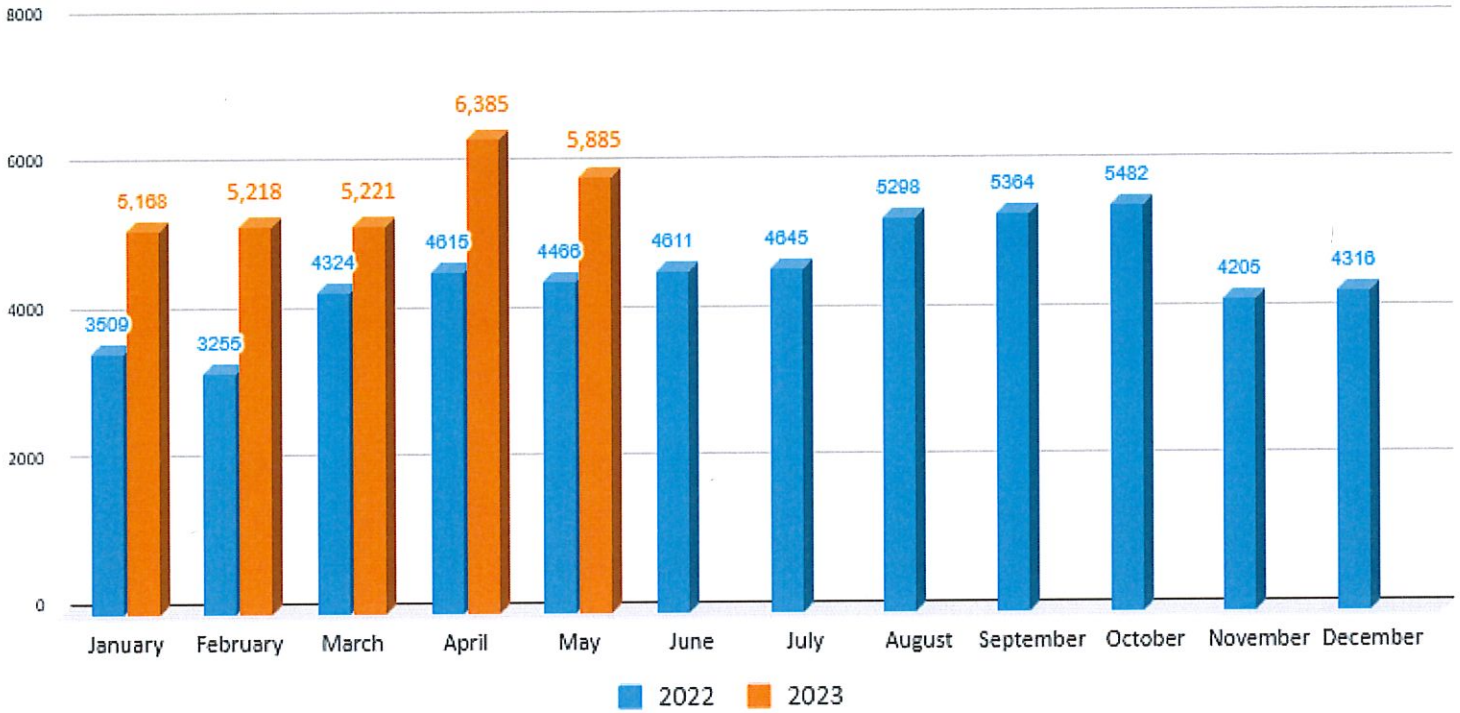

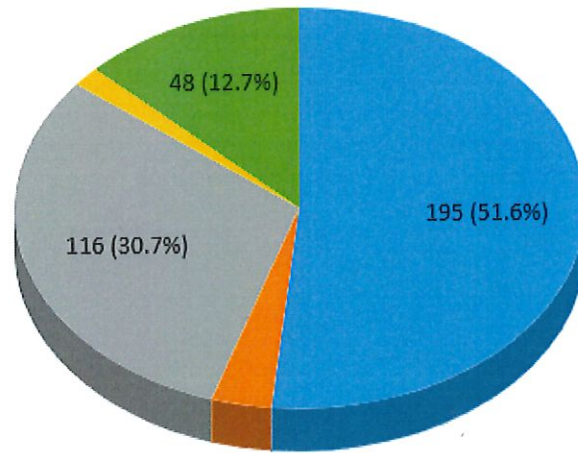

2022-2023 Calls For Service Totals



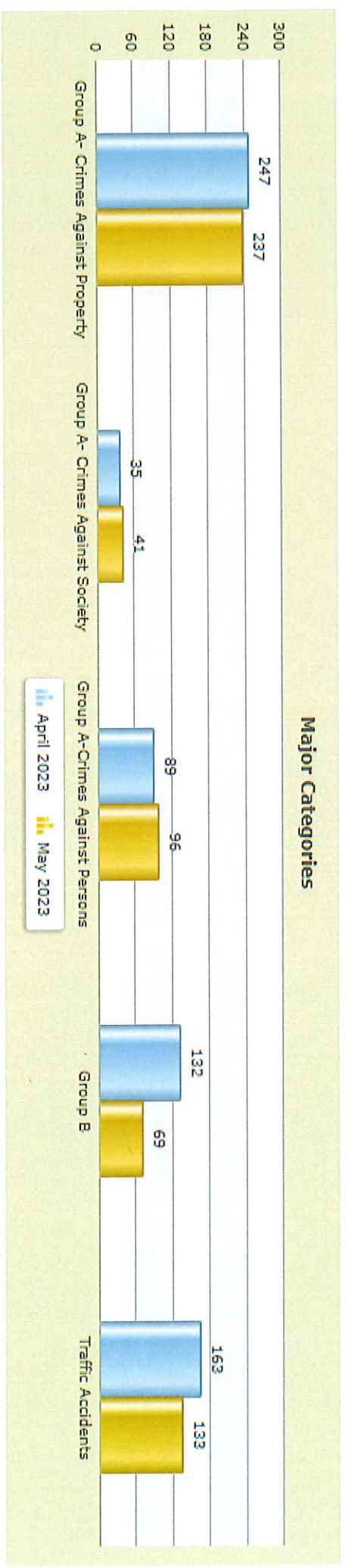
April 2023 Nuisance Calls for Service

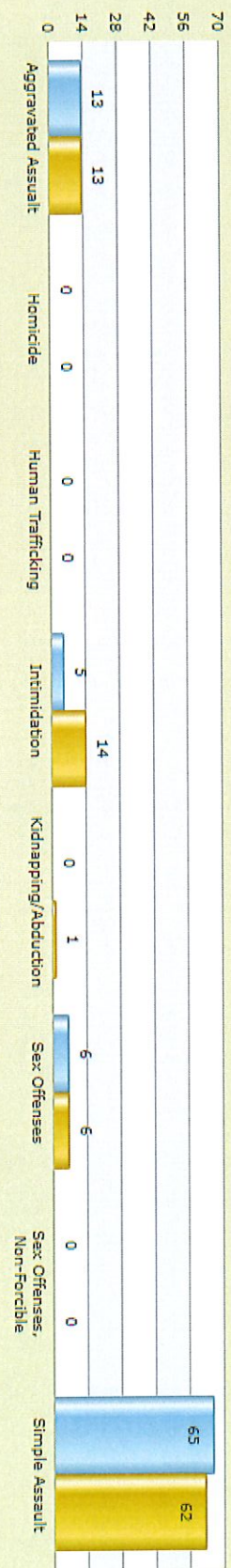

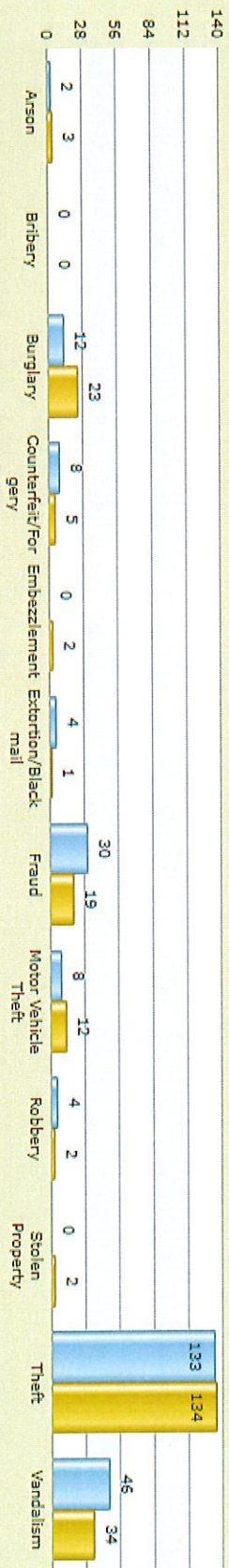

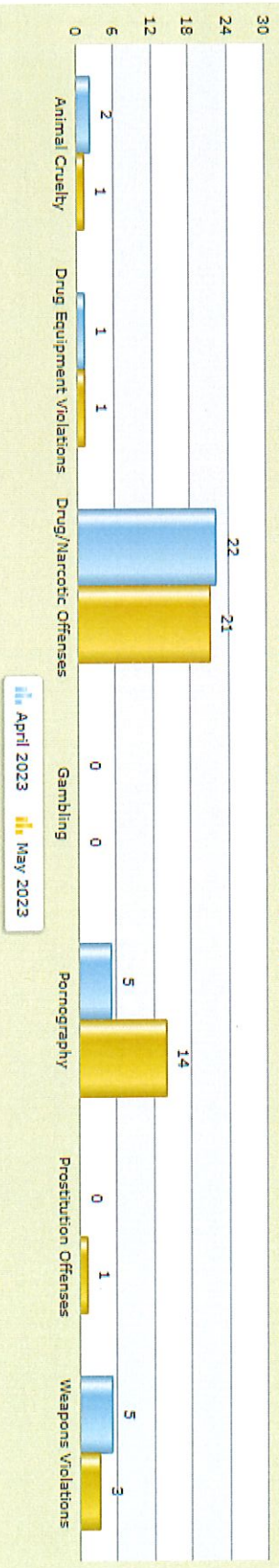
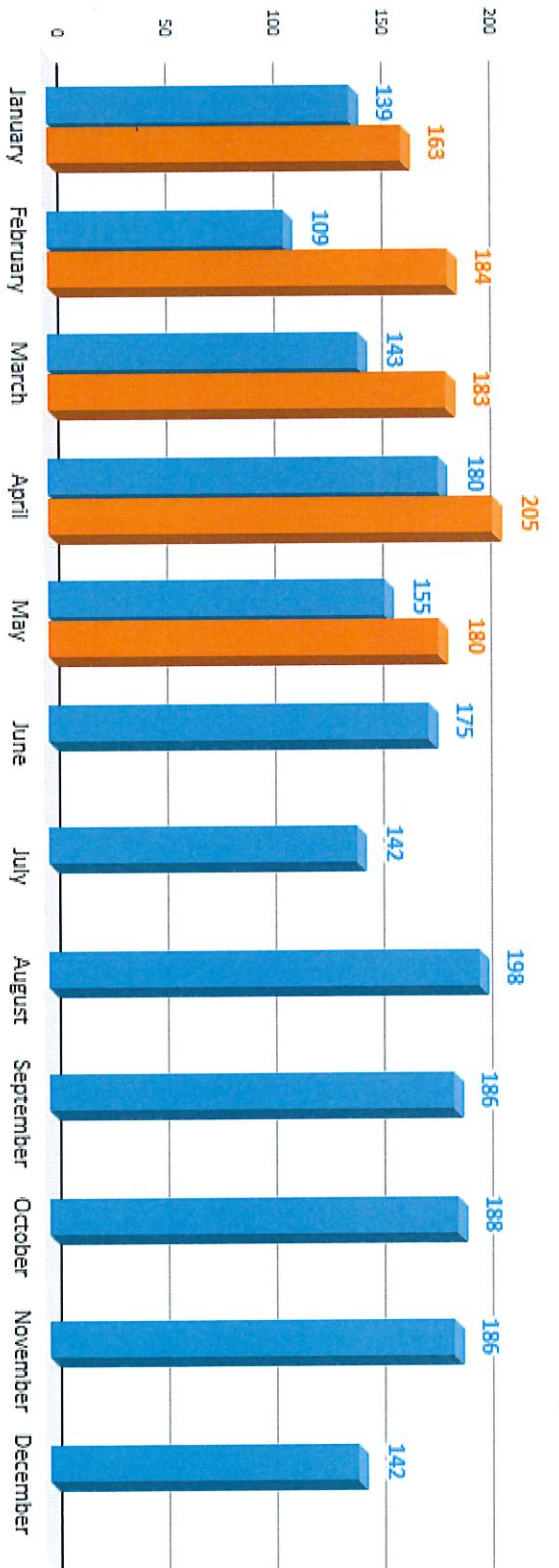


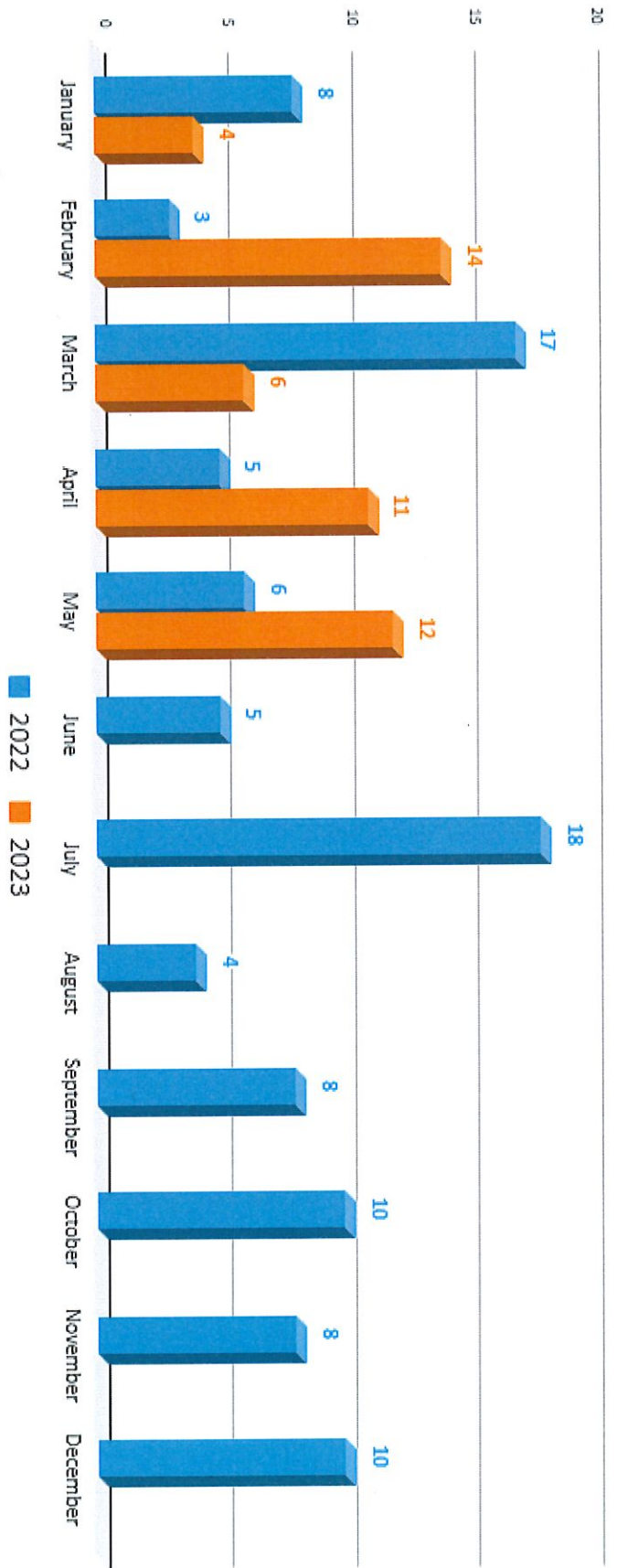

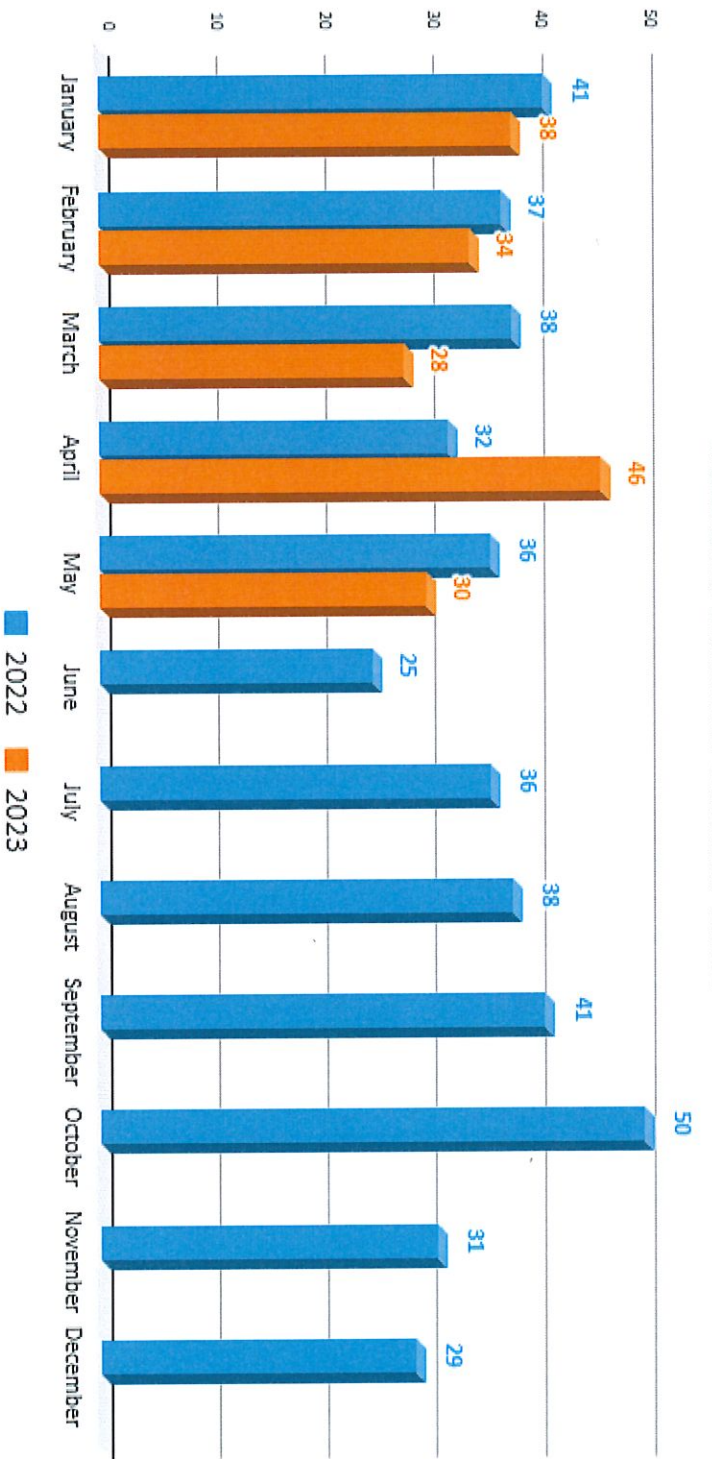
2022-2023 Adult Arrests

Police arrest man with 9mm handgun during College Mall burglary early Friday in Bloomington, Indiana

Police arrested a man trying to flee from the Target store in College Mall after investigating a report of vandalism, according to the Bloomington Police Department. Spent 9mm shells were found near a shattered door into College Mall near Dick's Sporting Goods, and a window inside the mall leading into Target.

The man, who possessed a 9mm pistol, and an additional full ammo magazine, was seen inside Target before he tried to get away from police, but was arrested.

Here is the full text of a press release provided to the media by Bloomington Police Department Captain Ryan Pedigo:

On May 2, 2023, at approximately 1:48 a.m., officers responded to the College Mall in the 2800 block of E Third Street in reference to a complaint of vandalism. The caller was a security guard with College Mall who had located a shattered exterior door of the building near Dick's Sporting Goods. Responding officers therefore entered the mall and began checking the building to determine if someone had made entry. A spent 9mm shell casing was located near the shattered door. As officers were searching the mall, another shattered glass door was located at the interior entrance to Target. Officers then saw an individual walking inside the Target store using what appeared to be a cell phone flashlight. Two spent 9mm shell casings were also found near the shattered glass door leading into Target. The interior lights of Target were eventually able to be turned on and shortly thereafter, a man was observed attempting to flee from the store through the north exit doors. The man, later identified as Tyler Miller (22, Bloomington), was immediately taken into custody by an Indiana State Trooper and a Bloomington police officer. When searched incident to arrest, a loaded 9mm pistol, an additional full ammunition magazine, and a backpack with several suspected stolen items were recovered.

After speaking with investigators, Tyler Miller (DOB 11/29/2000) was transported to the Monroe County Jail and remanded for the following charges:

She is a state suicide prevention specialist and provides trainings and consultation in suicide prevention, intervention and postvention, Mental Health First Aid, Cultural Competency and Mental Health, and is a master trainer for the QPR (Question Persuade Refer) Institute.

Alice has worked tirelessly to make suicide prevention and intervention efforts more culturally competent in the African American and Latino communities by promoting and encouraging wellness and resilience through various cultural lenses. Her community involvement includes over 30 years of advising youth from at-risk communities where she founded the Hoosiers of Tomorrow Mentoring Program. Alice was awarded the highest recognition bestowed on an alumnus – the Indiana University Distinguished Alumni Service Award. She has also received the John Ulmer Award for her significant service to first-generation PFW students, Latina Woman of Influence, 21 Alive Women in Leadership, YWCA Women of Distinction, IU Alumni President's Award, Welcoming Fort Wayne Diversity Award, and Latinos Count Amiga of the Year Award. Alice is President of IU's Latino Alumni Association, an IU Groups Recommender, on the St. Joseph Community Health Foundation and Fort Wayne Girlz ROCK boards and has been recognized as one of Fort Wayne's top 50 connectors. Alice is very committed to her family, faith, and community and identifies her greatest accomplishments as her three amazing children: Ross, Emilia, and Gabrielle; and three beautiful granddaughters: Audrina, Sophia and Myla.

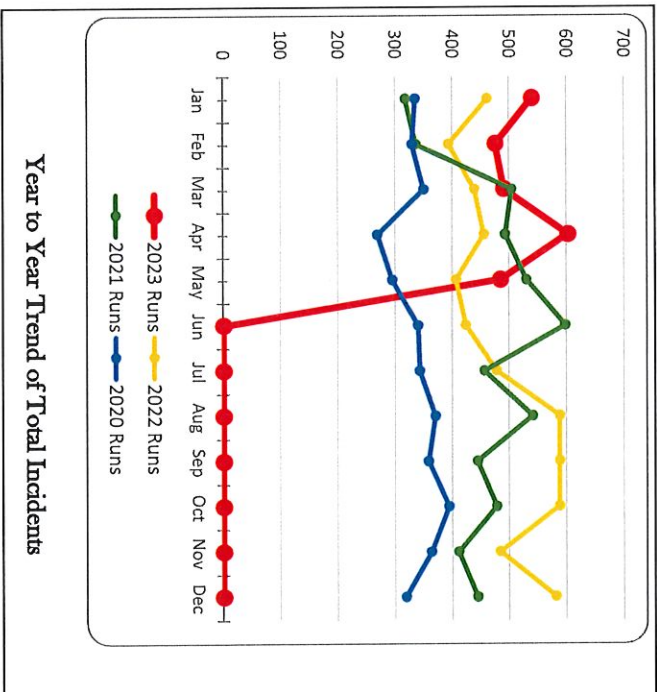

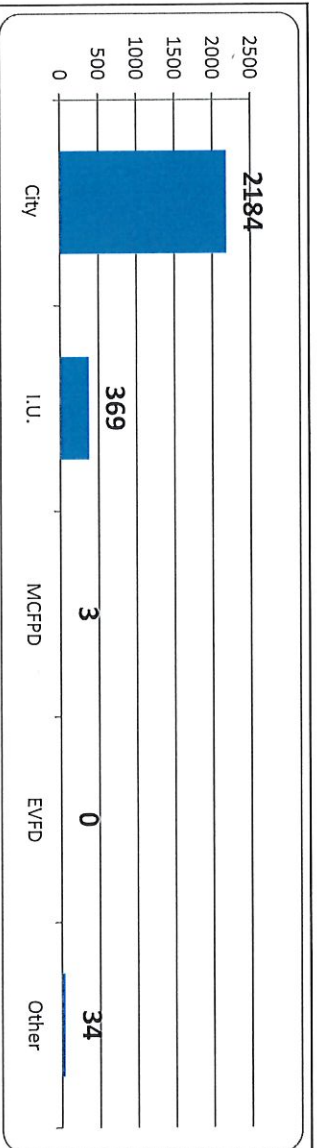
Operational Statistics



YTD Percentage of Incident Types

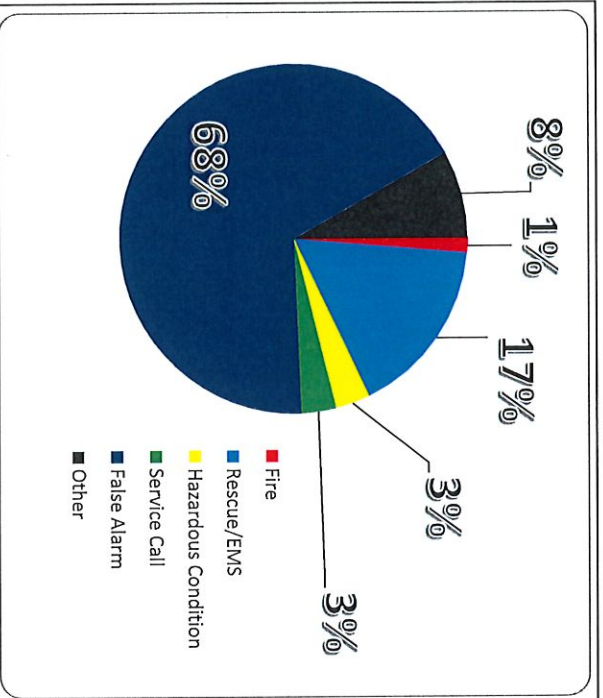


Year to Year Trend of Total Incidents

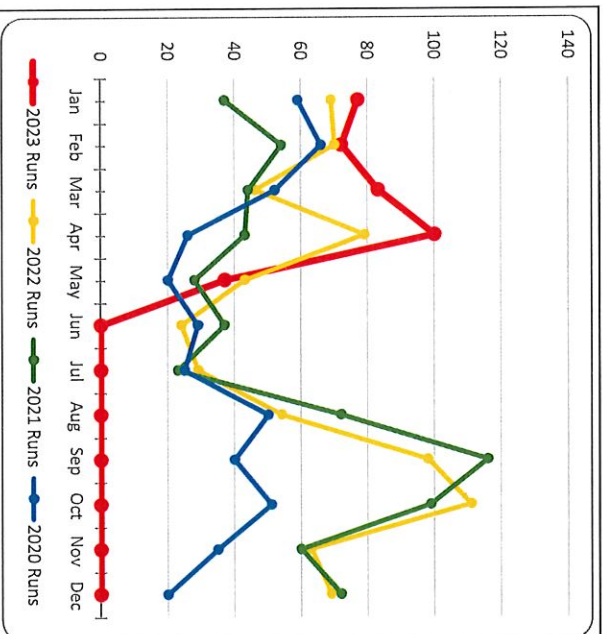


YTD Location of Incident

YTD Percentage of Incident Types (IU)



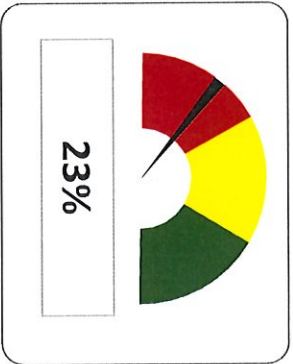

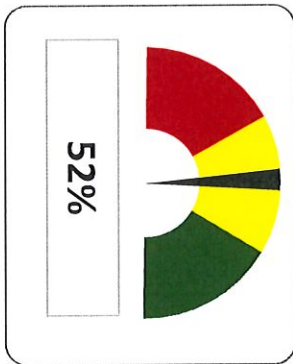

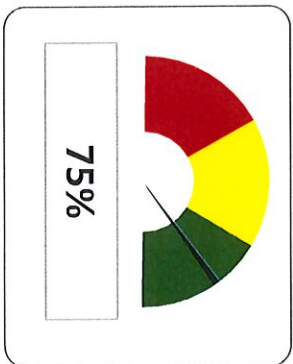

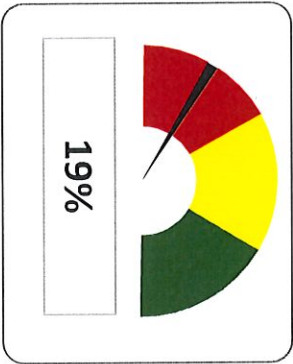
FIRE - Turnout Time



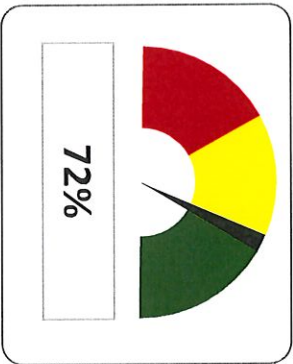
FIRE - 1st Arriving



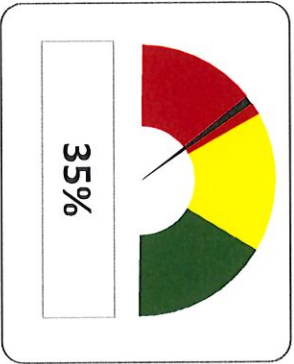
FIRE - Total Response Force



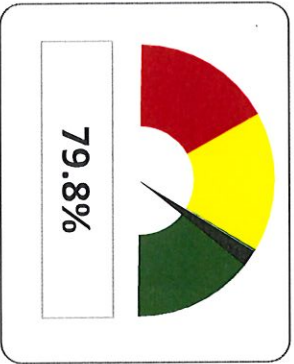
EMS - Turnout Time



EMS - 1st Arriving

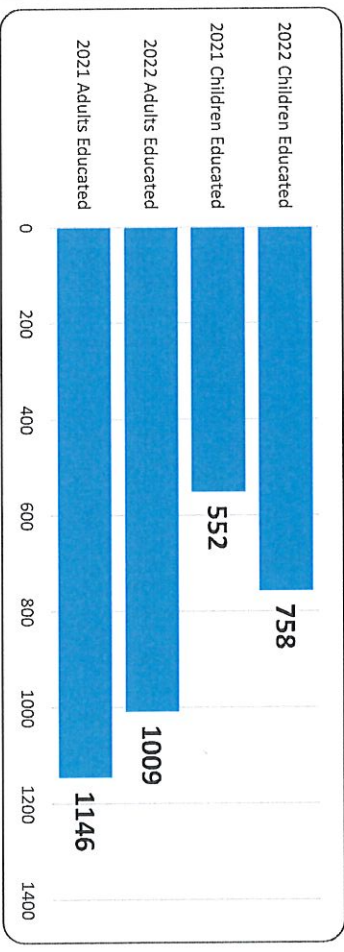


OTHER - Turnout Time

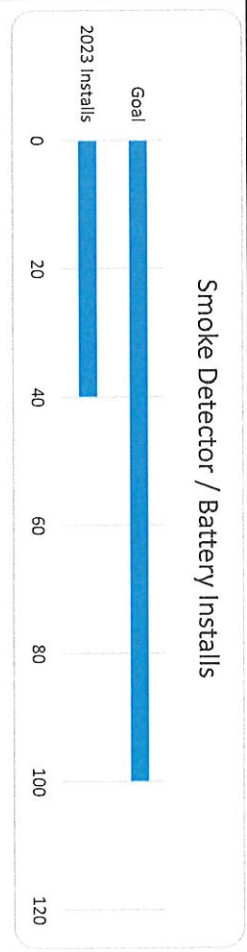

Dear Acting Chief Washel,

I was given your name by Tim Clapp, who was on the scene the day my condo in Windermere Woods was struck by lightning and destroyed in the ensuing fire (April 5). I've never been through an experience like it and I was thunderstruck at the speed and intensity of the fire and the danger inherent in fighting it.

I don't know how many men were called, but Tim Clapp said "pretty near all of 'em," and I was not surprised to hear that. It seemed to me that a great many men materialized in mere minutes and spent what felt like the better part of a day fighting the fire and ensuring that all was safe.

What was remarkable to me was not just their skill and perseverance which, I imagine, is a result of training, professionalism and adherence to the department's core values, but their kindness, compassion and concern. I can't tell you how many asked me whether I was ok, whether I needed anything and then, after the worst was over, whether they could go in and look for anything that was especially important to me. It was not an idle question. Thanks to them I have my wedding rings, a bin of family photos, several pictures and some other items that would have been simply irreplaceable.

I want to thank them, which is why I am writing. I don't know how to do that. A thank you card just doesn't feel like enough, but I wondered whether I might make a contribution -- in their honor -- to an organization, an undertaking, a cause that is important to the entire Fire Department and all of the people who work there.

Is there a fund, say, that provides supplies, assistance or care to the department itself? If not that, does the department support something like mental health counseling, scholarships, food aid or housing or any of the other fine social service projects that are part of Bloomington's fabric? I can't buy you a new truck, or even a new hose, but perhaps there is something that I could do to both express my profound appreciation while recognizing the important role you play in Bloomington?

Above all, I simply want to say thank you to each and every person who was there that day and to the rest of the department personnel who keep things running at top level. Together, you all changed my life and I will never forget it.
