• Understanding Sustainable Pavements in Indiana

- This presentation highlighted concrete pavement and drainage options for a resilient and sustainable infrastructure. - Implementing a New Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Program: The Goals are to Decrease CO2 Emissions, Reduce Traffic, and Improve Parking Availability
 - The City of Bloomington launched its TDM program on September 6, 2022. Prior to its launch, it took eight months to develop the Go Bloomington brand and design its website. Over the last year, Go Bloomington has implemented a marketing campaign to build awareness about the benefits of reducing single occupant vehicle (SOV) use. Go Bloomington has secured federal Carbon Reduction Funding (CRF) by being included in the MPO's 2024-2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

- Creating a Climate Resilience Plan: Prioritizing Climate Risks and Vulnerabilities and Developing Adaptation Strategies with Community Engagement

- The City of Bloomington is currently writing a Climate Resilience Plan as part of the IU Environmental Resilience Institute's 2023 Resilience Cohort. The plan is based on information gathered during two community workshops where community members prioritize climate risks and vulnerabilities across 8 sectors based on a set of specific criteria and develop adaptation strategies that help to reduce the impact from the highest prioritized risks identified.

• Designing for Pedestrians and Inducing Pedestrian Demand (Win-Win!)

- Too often in transportation planning and engineering, walking is not taken seriously as a mode of transportation. The failure to acknowledge walking (or being a pedestrian) as a fundamental form of transportation results in a negative feedback loop, which disproportionately impacts people of color, low-income residents, and people with disabilities. Speakers discussed how to design for pedestrians, how designing for pedestrians relates to climate action, and how induced demand applies to pedestrian and bicyclist infrastructure, too.
