One Resolution Ready for Final Action and One Ordinance Ready for Introduction at the Regular Session on Wednesday, March 21st

The agenda for the Regular Session next week includes a resolution ready for final action, which can be found in the *Legislative Packet* prepared for March 7th, and an ordinance ready for introduction, which can be found in this packet.

First Readings

Ord 07-07 – Amending Title 15 (Vehicles and Traffic)

Ord 07-07 amends Title 15 of the Bloomington Municipal Code (entitled Vehicles and Traffic) by modifying regulations regarding stop intersections, speed limits and zones, various parking restrictions, and pedestrian crosswalks. These changes are briefly summarized in the below table:

Multi-Stop Intersections

Location

Action & Rationale

ADAMS STREET/COUNTRYSIDE LANE

Ord 07-07 - Section 1 Map # 1

This codifies the existing multi-way stop at the newlyaccepted intersection just south of Summit Elementary School.

Speed Limits and Speed Zones

Location

Action & Rationale

SEVENTEENTH STREET 300 feet east and west of LINDBERG AVENUE (about 900 feet west of Arlington Road)

Ord 07-07 - Section 2 Map # 2

This reduces the speed limit on 17th Street at the intersection with Lindberg Drive from 30 mph to 20 mph because of the road crest to the west.

LEONARD SPRINGS ROAD from FLEENER AVE TO BLOOMFIELD ROAD

Ord 07-07 - Section 3 Map # 3

This removes a school speed zone on Leonard Springs Road that served the former Grandview School (which is now the site of the new Wal-Mart).

Angle Parking

SEVENTH STREET from MORTON to MADISON STREETS

(south side)

Ord 07-07 - Section 4

Map # 4

This codifies the existing angle parking on the south side of the street for the block by the Antique Mall and Boomerang.

Location	Action & Rationale
FIRST STREET from 177' to 208' east of MITCHELL STREET (north side) Ord 07-07 - Section 5 & 6 Map # 5	This provides for about 31' feet of pull-off parking on the north side of First Street starting 177' east of Mitchell Street. This pull-off space had been used as resident-only parking and now will be available for others to park.
TWENTIETH STREET from WASHINGTON TO LINCOLN (south side) Ord 07-07 - Section 5 Map # 7	This will allow parallel parking on the south side of the street to accommodate a new residential project.
HILLSDALE COURT (both sides) Ord 07-07 - Section 5 & 6 Map # 8	This prohibits parking on the cul-de-sac because the road is too narrow to accommodate parking and the required 12' travel lane.
ROSE AVENUE from HUNTER to ATWATER AVENUES (east side) Ord 07-07 - Section 6 Map # 10	This prohibits parking on the east side of this narrow street in order to preserve the required 12' travel lane.
WOODBURN AVENUE from BROOKDALE to RILEY DRIVES (north and south sides) Ord 07-07 - Section 6 Map # 11	This would remove parking on both sides of the street at the request of the neighbors who have experienced spill-over parking from people who are visiting the newly constructed apartments to the east.
WYLIE FARM ROAD east from BAYBERRY DRIVE for 70' (north side) Ord 07-07 - Section 6 Map # 12	This would prohibit parking on Wylie Farm Road for 70' east of Bayberry Drive in order to improve safety and sight-distance at that intersection.

WASHINGTON STREET south from SMITH AVENUE for 125'

(west side)

Ord 07-07 - Section 6 & 7

Map # 13

This would remove one 2-hour parking space and prohibit parking along this 125' stretch of South Washington which has no room for parking since a driveway was constructed a few years ago.

THIRTEENTH from FESS TO FEE LANE

This corrects a reference to Fee Lane rather than Fess Lane.

(south side)

Ord 07-07 - Section 5 & 6 Map # (none)

*** Potentially Controversial - Neighbors Disagree ***

MAXWELL STREET south from HILLSIDE DRIVE for 160'

(east and west side)

Ord 07-07 - Section 6 Map # 9 This would prohibit parking on both sides of Maxwell Street for 160' south of Hillside Drive at the request of one resident who lives near the corner. The street is 26' wide and does not have two 12' travel lanes when a car is parked at the curb. This causes difficulties when motorists are turning south onto Maxwell Street from Hillside and encounter an on-coming vehicle. Engineering and the Traffic Commission supported this change in the face of opposition from a day care center on the corner and one rental property. Parking is constrained as well by the numerous driveways.

Accessible Parking for Persons with Disabilities

Location

Action & Rationale

400 BLOCK OF NORTH COLLEGE

First Space on west side

Ord 07-07 - Section 7, 8 & 13

Map # 4

This adds one accessible parking space on the west side of College between 8th and 9th Streets. The remaining parking on that side will include the existing two 30-minute spaces and one less 2-hour space at the north end of the block. The new accessible space will accommodate a resident who is unable to access the public and private garages.

321 NORTH ROGERS/WEST EIGHTH STREET (SECOND BAPTIST CHURCH) First space on the south side

Ord 07-07 - Section 13 Map # 4 This adds an accessible parking space in front of the Second Baptist Church on West Eighth Street at the request of the church.

City Hall Visitor Parking/Official Vehicle Zones

Location

Action & Rationale

MORTON STREET South of Entrance to City Hall Lot (west side)

Ord 07-07 - Section 11, 12, 15 & 16 Map # 4 This switches the parking space occupied by the Hoosier Hills Food Bank truck from the spot closest (first space) to the spot farthest (fifth space) from the entrance to the City Hall Lot 11 (south of City Hall). The move will improve visibility for motorists entering and leaving the lot.

Loading Zones

Location

LIBERTY DRIVE from 150' to 215' south of THIRD STREET

(west side)

Ord 07-07 - Section 5, 6 & 10

Map # 6

These changes provide for a 65' loading zone on a street that offers no other parking. It is located next to Buccetto's and was approved in order to keep delivery vehicles from backing out onto this busy street.

EAST SIXTH STREET

One space east of WASHINGTON STREET (south side)

Ord 07-07 - Section 9

Map # 14

This removes a loading zone next to the Monroe County Museum at the request of the museum who has adequate loading space elsewhere.

Pedestrian Crosswalks

828 NORTH DYER DRIVE

Near Monroe County United Ministries

Ord 07-07 - Section 17

Map # 15

This adds a mid-block crosswalk to provide children at the Monroe County United Ministries a safe way to be guided

to Dyer Park and the pool area.

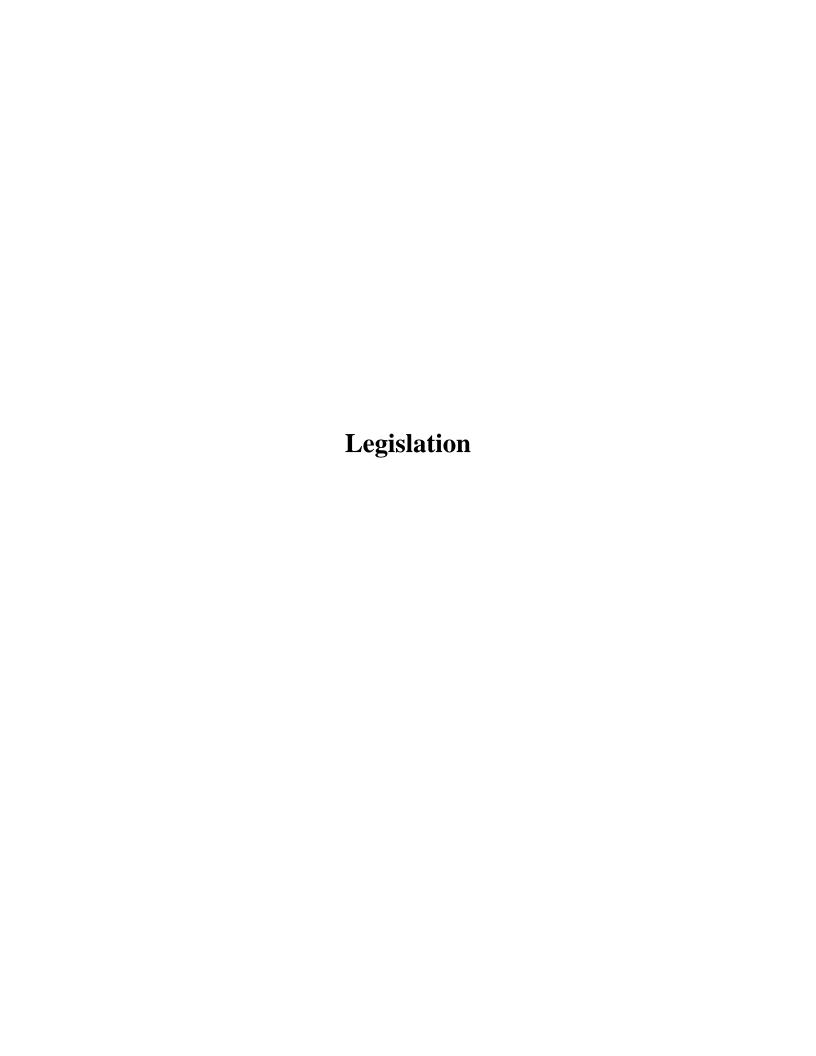

SYNOPSIS

This ordinance makes several changes to the Bloomington Municipal Code. This includes changes to multi-stop intersections, school, park and playground speed zones, angle parking, no parking zones, limited parking zones, loading zones, official vehicle zones, accessible parking for persons with physical disabilities, city hall visitor parking and pedestrian crosswalks.

Ordinance 06-12 is composed of modifications to Title 15 "Vehicles and Traffic" due to recent code corrections, and other requested changes by both City Officials and members of the public. It is my goal with this memo to answer potential questions and explain the variety of changes included with this ordinance.

Section I

Section I adds an existing multi-way stop intersection at Adams Street and Countryside Lane due to the roadway recently being accepted by the City of Bloomington.

Section II

Section II reduces the speed limit near the intersection of 17th Street and Lindberg Drive from 30 m.p.h. to 20 m.p.h. to help improve the safety of travelers by increasing the ability to respond to traffic that crests a hill to the West of the intersection by increasing response time with lower speeds.

Section III

Section II deletes from Schedule J "School Zones" a section of Leonard Springs Road that was formerly adjacent to the old Grandview School, that has since been replaced by the new Super Wal-Mart.

Section IV

Section IV adds angle parking along the South side of 7th Street just West of Morton Street where there has been angle parking in existence for many years. This is a section of the code that did not get updated many years ago when that change was permitted, and is simply codifying the existing situation.

Section V

Section V deletes various 'No Parking Zones' such as First Street where parking was added in the 1000 Block of East First Street which has a designed pull off area that has existed since 1994, Liberty Drive at the location of the new Buccetto's where a loading zone was added and codified in 2006, additionally a correction from the usage of the street name 'Fess Lane' to 'Fee Lane with regard to parking along 13th Street, and the addition of parallel parking along 20th Street in front of a new development.

Section VI

Section VI allows for the parking on first street and redefines the limits of 'no parking' along first street, removes parking on Hillsdale Court where no section of the roadway can accommodate a parked vehicle without also allowing for 12 feet of clearance for traveling vehicles, Liberty Drive to redefine the limits of 'no parking' where the loading zone was added, Rose Avenue where parking was eliminated along one side due to insufficient street width, adding the correction of Fee Lane instead of Fess Lane, codify existing parking on South Washington which already exists at Smith Avenue, eliminate parking on Woodburn Avenue per the request of residents, and upon the approval of the Traffic Commission, and changes to the distance of parking for sight distance improvements along Wylie Farm Road just East of Bayberry Drive that was requested by residents, and approved by the Traffic Commission.

A request was made by a resident on Maxwell Street just South of Hillside Drive to eliminate parking near the intersection to improve the safety of residents. This section of Maxwell Street has curbs that were installed with the improvements of Hillside Drive that were installed in the early 1980's. The pavement width is 26 feet in width, and is sometimes parked with cars along the east side of Maxwell Street, which causes Northbound cars to travel moreso into the Western side of the roadway, which is conflicted with vehicles turning onto Maxwell Street from Hillside Drive, sometimes across a busy eastbound lane of Hillside Drive to only encounter a Northbound vehicle on Maxwell Lane that is in the Western half of the street.

This section of Maxwell Street is compounded by the location of several driveways which prohibit parking within close distances, which severely limits the ability to legally park along a majority of the street. Engineering Staff, and the Traffic Commission supported the removal of parking along this section of Maxwell Street. There is a daycare that operates on this corner at Hillside Drive, that often has a parked car awaiting the pickup of a child, or delivery vehicle located here for short durations, who were opposed to the removal of parking. A rental residence to the East of the daycare was also concerned about parking needs.

Section VII

Secion VII makes changes to the Northwest corner of 8th Street and College Avenue to allow for the addition of an ADA space, as well as the removal of a parking space along the West side of Washington Street that has not existed for several years as a drive was installed during the Washington Street and 2nd Street Project that eliminated the possibility for on street parking at this location.

Section VIII

Section VIII makes the necessary changes to the limited parking to accommodate the ADA space at the corner of 8th Street and College Avenue.

Section IX

Section IX deletes the loading zone that exists between Washington Street and Lincoln Street along the South side of 6^{th} Street.

Section X

Section X adds the loading zone on Liberty Drive near the Bucetto's building, which was installed to prevent delivery vehicles from needing to back out onto Liberty Drive which is a much used and often congested roadway directly adjacent to West Third Street.

Section XI

Section XI deletes the current location where the Hoosier Hills Food Bank vehicle parks which receive complaints regarding the blocking of line of site as you leave the Showers / Farmer's Market Lot onto Morton Street.

Section XII

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

were approved by a voice vote.

REPORTS:

Chris Sturbaum said he was sad to once again comment on the issue of the outsourcing of Indiana University jobs. Alluding to the letter that was sent to IU from the council members, mayor and clerk opposing this outsourcing, he said that there had been no response at this time. He added that the loss of jobs would affect residents in his district the same as closing factories or businesses. He added that what happens at the University also happens to this community. He asked if the trustees were exhibiting good leadership to fire faithful workers to save 15% on benefits. He asked if it set a good example for professors and administrators to be eligible for good health care, but not IU working support staff. He questioned the moral message these actions sent to young people. Sturbaum asked, in the spirit of the recent holiday, what Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. would do.

Timothy Mayer, having not been present at the very first meeting of the year, welcomed Susan Sandberg to the council, and congratulated President Rollo and Vice President Volan on their leadership of the Council.

Mayer spoke about a recent presentation by Mark Lakewood, an architect in "community building" from Portland Oregon. He said the presentation was interesting, and reminded him of the citizen collaborations that have often occurred in Bloomington and gave the inception of neighborhood initiatives, traffic calming and the Environmental Commission as examples. He added that the City of Bloomington's Housing and Neighborhood Development Department has a person on staff whose sole purpose is to work with neighborhood development and neighborhood issues, including how to build a neighborhood association. He thought some of these concepts could be taken back with Mr. Lakewood, and added that one of Bloomington's greatest characteristics is that the city looks for citizen participation at every level of government.

There were no reports from the mayor at this meeting.

Dan Sherman gave the Council Sidewalk Committee report with an overview of committee deliberations with recommendations and a possible motion to consider regarding the report. He noted that this year the committee recommended funding for the design or construction of 31,000 lineal feet of sidewalk, about 13% of the 23800 of the sidewalks and side paths that would be constructed this year by the City of Bloomington.

Sherman reviewed the funding sources for this process, and the mission of this committee to fill in missing links in pedestrian ways. He then explained the following recommendations:

- East 5th Street from Overhill to the Deadend
- Recommend requesting that the Mayor consider reappropriating \$34,000 which reverted to the ATF at the end of 2006 to be used to construct the sidewalk on the north side of Maxwell Lane from the Clifton side path to High Street.
- Recommend, if necessary, that the Mayor consider reappropriating \$94,000 in AF and Greenways monies that may have reverted to various cumulative capital improvement finds at the end of 2006 so that it can be used to construct a sidewalk on the west side of Nancy Street from Ruby Lane to Mark Street.

Sherman noted that the last recommendation was not necessary because of other monies would be used for this project.

Sturbaum asked about Maple and 17th street sidewalk. Sherman noted the project that was suggested there would be built by Public Works and City of Bloomington Utilities. He said that the west side of North Maple Street between 15th Street and 17th Street would have a sidewalk by the end of the year. He noted that ramps would also be included in the appropriate areas.

It was moved and seconded to adopt the Council Sidewalk Committee Report and Recommendations for 2007 with the following amendment: If the Public Works Department decides not to use the \$45,000 for the design of South Henderson in 2007, then those funds may be allocated for any other project listed under The Committee Recommendations as well as the Hillsdale to Overhill segment of the East 5th Street project.

There was no public comment on this motion.

Wisler asked for clarification on the East 5th Street project and its relation to the bypass widening.

Mayer noted that this project was too far west to be impacted by that project and pointed out on the planned bypass underpass for bicycles and pedestrians.

Rollo asked Mayer to talk about the storm water needs in the 5th street area.

Mayer said the problem of storm water collecting in the area had created problems with flooding basements, metal gas lines rusting, and intersection safety issues when water freezes there. He noted because of federal and state regulations, the city was responsible for the quantity and quality of run off into tributaries. He explained the planned containment separator at the end of the street that would catch physical debris and said neighbors were also looking forward to helping with biofilters that could be incorporated.

Sturbaum thanked the mayor, CBU, Public works and HAND for working with this committee. He said that this collaboration allowed for more to be done.

Mayer thanked Sturbaum for pushing for the Utilities monies to be included. He encouraged Public Works to use the money allocated to the Henderson Street project for design. He said it was an important project.

Wisler said that all the projects seemed to be worthy. He said that, in looking back at the history of this council committee, he was unable to find any project in District 2. He said that he would like to be involved in the process next cycle so that the district's sidewalk needs could be addressed.

Mayer noted that Wisler's predecessor, Jason Banach, found out that there were many challenges in proposing sidewalks and side paths along North Dunn Street.

Rollo noted that priorities are linked to priorities plans, connectors to fill gaps, etc, but that if the public felt that there was a need in their neighborhood they should contact the Council by email or by phone. He thanked Sherman and Stacy Jane Rhodes for summarizing, researching and keeping the committee on task. He thanked the mayor for an increase in the committee's budget for the sidewalk projects.

The motion to adopt the Sidewalk Committee Recommendations as amended received a roll call vote of Ayes: 8, Nays: 0.

Dan Starr, student and Boy Scout, said that everyone should state the Pledge Of Allegiance at city meetings, and in fact at all meetings.

Stu Statham, businessman, father of Dan Starr, asked that the Council start their meetings with the Pledge Of Allegiance.

Jeff Allen, Dentist thanked Chris Sturbaum for all his work in historic preservation in Bloomington, and noted that his father's house at Allen and Walnut Streets house has been torn down. Allen said he was present to support Dan Starr's request. He noted that the Pledge is about the American flag and gave a bit of historic information about the protection of the flag in the Civil War. He said that we need to show respect to the flag, to the country, and to those who have bleed on the flag. He added that the federal government had determined that the wording of the Pledge should not be changed. He ended by saying that Dan had the courage to come to ask this simple thing, to give Dan a victory in his lifetime.

Isabel Piedmont thanked the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Birthday Celebration committee for such a positive community event held at the Buskirk Chumley Theater earlier that week. She read from one of Dr. King's speeches regarding wealth, poverty, and the structure of a whole society in a call to action.

Dr. Hal Taylor, President of Citizens for Effective Justice and New Leaf, New Life, Inc., a sister organization developed to receive grant funds for CEJ. He reported that they had received a gift of \$171,000 from the Indiana Department of Corrections to work at jail with issues of recidivism. Taylor reported that there are typically 272 people in a jail built for 125 with about thirty people sleeping on mats on the gym floor. He said this overcrowding made it very difficult to bring any programming to the jail to help with the problem of recidivism. He reported that CEJ has applied for another grant of \$500,000 to duplicate their program in 6 other jails in the state. He noted that this program was not costing the City of Bloomington or Monroe County any money, and that volunteers and grants keep this going. Taylor outlined programs in New Leaf initiative, including play reading and writing, recording stories for inmates' children, vocational training in electrical work, Twelve Step programs, and transition programs with Work One.

David Burhkart, physician, said he was a former conscientious objector and had seen all sides of the issues. He said he didn't see the Pledge Of Sidewalk Committee Report (cont'd)

Allegiance as one of blind allegiance, but more for 'the republic for which it stands.' He asked that the council to consider what kind of statement not saying the Pledge would make for children.

David Grubb said he saluted our President, men and women in Iraq, and new sheriff, Jim Kennedy. He said he was worried about our landfill and what it was seeping into Lake Monroe and urged the council to think more about that and less about curbs and sidewalks. Grubb said we should get back to basics, the environment. He said our kids would suffer from this neglect.

Patty Mulvihill, Assistant City Attorney, and Susie Johnson, Director of the Department of Public Works were available for questions on this ordinance.

Sturbaum said this was a good agreement between the City and the Feral Cat Friends and that it is the best interest of the animals. He said that this program had been a proven method of stabilize the feral cat population. He thanked the City for their efforts in understanding the problems and city legal department for working with them, also.

There was no public comment offered from citizens on this item.

Mayer thanked Feral Cat Friends for deliberating with the City. He said it was an exercise in community building and thanked them for doing this important work for the City.

Volan said this process showed what happened when people are willing to engage when they disagree and this shows that the process can work.

Rollo thanked everyone, Animal Control, HAND Department, City Legal, and Feral Cat Friends. He said that they care about the humane treatment of animals and do a great service to the community.

Ordinance 07-01 received a roll call vote of Ayes: 8, Nays: 0.

There was no legislation to introduce at this meeting.

LEGISLATION FOR FIRST READING

It was moved and seconded that the rules be suspended so that the council meeting scheduled for January 24, 2007 be cancelled due to lack of legislation coming forward. This motion and action were both agreed to by a voice vote.

SUSPENSION OF RULES to consider item not on agenda.

Hal Taylor returned to the podium to report that there was no place for the homeless to use a restroom downtown and wouldn't be too difficult for this to be rectified. He said that restaurants are closed and this is a problem for folks who sleep in the street. He added that he heard that folks who used to sleep in the post office were no longer being allowed to stay there, and he wanted the council to know that this needed to be addressed. **PUBLIC INPUT**

Danna Jackson spoke about the closing of Ladyman's Café. She noted it was well used, and that it was a gathering place for a variety of ages of patrons, students, professionals, and elderly. She noted that claim we want variety and diversity in Bloomington, and this was just such a place. Jackson said that she had circulated a petition to the City to not reward any person or company with a tax abatement for any action leading to the closing of Ladyman's. She said she had about 500 signatures and had stood at the restaurant on the day the last dinner was served

Jackson said that historic preservation isn't simply a matter of saving a building or a façade. She said that this was a part of preservation, but what was inside the building is part of the history of the building. She gave an example of two buildings on third street that were designated historic adding that they were still empty. She noted that Ladyman's was just the opposite with an historic business inside a building that was not historically significant. She said that the City should look at the preservation of other things besides buildings and that loss of this building might actually be the tipping point of change on Kirkwood. Finally, she noted that Ladyman's was having its final auction the next day

The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

Council President Rollo gave the Agenda Summation

There were no minutes to be approved.

Brad Wisler said it was good to be back, hoped everyone was enjoying the snow, and asked citizens to give the council members feedback concerning clearing snow from roads.

David Sabbagh noted the controversy of the contract between Bloomington Hospital and Anthem Insurance. He said that Bloomington Hospital was a community owned not-for-profit hospital which was locally owned and was a major employer of the city. He noted that providing health care for employees was an issue for all levels of employers including the hospital. He said that the hospital was the linchpin of high level medical services in the community, and it should not be impaired. He noted that the contract discussions between the hospital and Anthem were complex, but that the community should come down on the side of a strong medical community and be in support of Bloomington Hospital.

Steve Volan noted his district was the most urban in form of all the city council districts, and noted that while Indiana University campus was in the midst of the city, it did not comply with an urban form. He read portions of an article from the New York Times entitled "Rural Colleges Seek New Edge and Urbanize." It related the task of Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas to attract students of all ages with a more urbanized version of a campus. Volan related this to the IU campus design, noting that Ashton Center, a new residence hall being re-built did not have urban amenities planned.

Andy Ruff noted that in the first week of February, 2003, the Council heard debate and passed a resolution opposing the invasion in Iraq at that time. He noted that what had transpired in the last four years was tremendous destruction and chaos in Iraq. In light of the timing of a possible escalation and even an invasion of Iran, Ruff read <u>Resolution 03-04 Opposing a War in Iraq at This Time</u> as a tool to remember this debate.

Susan Sandberg said that it was a delight to see the artwork in the Atrium in honor of Black History Month. She also noted the upcoming "Arts Week" collaboration between the City and IU in scheduling local and national artists for visual and performing arts events during this upcoming celebration.

Chris Sturbaum thanked Ruff for his reading. Sturbaum noted that the widening of West Second Street was an issue on which the City was taking public comment. He noted that New Urbanism would be a concept that would work nearer to the city core. He cautioned against widening the road instead of something simpler like realigning the traffic lights. He said the proposal of a six lane road in front of the hospital made no sense and that we should question how communities, roads, neighborhoods and cars work for the betterment of the community.

Tim Mayer, Parliamentarian, noting a large group of students in attendance, explained the structure of the council meeting, the procedure for public comment and what would be happening at the evening's meeting.

Mayer thanked the police, firefighters and public works employees who were working outside in the snow and cold weather. He said that utilities workers were working to handle frozen water pipes and water main breaks because of the cold weather and he thanked them publicly.

Rollo announced a lecture sponsored by the Commission on Sustainability to be given on February 15, at 6:30 at the Monroe County Public Library by Professor Ben Brabson. The talk was to focus on innovations in Green Architecture, building sustainable homes that conserve energy and use renewable non-fossil energy sources.

Steve Volan announced that the Council would have a bowling team (Council Commission on Pin Demolition) in the Big Brothers Big Sisters fundraiser, and encouraged citizens to help the organization. Many puns followed this announcement.

Rollo thanked councilmember Ruff for sponsoring the Resolution against the War in Iraq back in 2003. He said that Ruff's action was visionary.

Sara Ollis, Assistant Deputy Mayor, gave an update on Be Bloomington Month focusing on the themes and activities for each month in 2007. She noted that Be Healthy Bloomington (January), Be Compassionate Bloomington (February), and Be Accessible Bloomington (March) events included partners in the community that helped sponsor and promote events to highlight the themes.

Beverly Calendar Anderson gave a brief history of the origins of Black History Month, and an overview of events during Black History Month. She highlighted leadership opportunities for children, a fashion show for me, and a gala event at the Country Club. She also noted that the Women of Color panel had been postponed because of weather and would be rescheduled during March.
