Special Session and Committee of the Whole on September 8th

There are two meetings next Wednesday. The first is a Special Session which is being held in order to take final action on the 2005 budget, which includes two appropriation ordinances, four salary ordinances, and a transit ordinance.

(Please note that all 7 of these ordinances can be found in the 2005 Budget Packet which was distributed on August 27th for the September 1st meetings.)

You are also scheduled to take final action on two items that directly relate to the budget including an ordinance (**Ord 04-23**) which increases sanitation fees, flattens fines, and makes other minor changes to Title 6 (Health and Sanitation) and a

resolution (**Res 04-15**) which petitions for an increase in our maximum tax levy. In addition, you are also scheduled to take final action on an ordinance (**Ord 04-24**) which broadens and codifies the Special Non-Reverting Improvement Fund and the Telecommunications Fund and which authorizes expenditures from the Mayor's promotion of business line. *(Please note that these 3 items can be found in the Weekly Packet that was distributed on August 27th for the September 1st meetings.)*

Along with those items, you will also commence action on the annexation of three areas by considering approval of three fiscal plans and introducing three annexation ordinances, which will need a public hearing in November before you can consider final action on them at the last meeting of the year. Res 04-14 - Authorizing the Expenditure of \$850,000 from the Industrial Development Fund for Road and Water Improvements at the Indiana Enterprise Center

Res 04-14 authorizes the expenditure of \$850,000 from the Industrial Development Fund for road and water line improvements at the Indiana Enterprise Center. As Ron Walker, Director of Economic Development, recounts in his memo, the Indiana Enterprise Center has been the focus of concerted redevelopment and economic development efforts at a state and local level since Thomson Consumer Electronics left the site in 1998.

Some of those efforts led to the establishment of a Community Revitalization Enhancement District (CRED) for the site which captures a certain amount of the increase in sales and income taxes generated in the district which is then available to help revitalize it. These monies along with other revenues must be deposited in Industrial Development Fund and may be expended upon the recommendation of the Bloomington Industrial Advisory Commission and approval of the Common Council. The CRED also allows the City to enter into financial agreements with developers to receive some of these funds if agreed upon benchmarks have been met. It also provides generous tax credits for certain private improvements within the district.

In the last few months both Cook Pharmica and Schulte Corporation have announced plans to invest over \$65 million in real estate improvements, machinery, and technology here which is expected to create over 400 new jobs. Their announcement follows the acceptance of an incentive package offered by state and local entities where the City's portion will leverage \$250,000 from the state and \$50,000 from the county.

Part of City's commitment was the investment of public funds for constructing a road from Allen Street to the southern end of the site near the proposed Juvenile Detention facility and for extending a water main east from South Rogers to the western end of the site. The total cost of these improvements is approximately \$997,000. This resolution would provide \$850,000 of that amount from the Industrial Development Fund and the Redevelopment Commission has already agreed to provide the remaining \$150,000 from the Thomson TIF Fund. The balance sheet for the IDF (see packet) indicates that it will drop to \$30,257 by the end of this year and then rise to \$234,000 by the end of next year. And, the balance sheet for the TIF Fund indicates that expenditure will occur in 2005 and leave a balance of about \$686,000 at the end of that year.

RESOLUTION 04-14

TO AUTHORIZE EXPENDITURES FROM THE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT FUND FOR PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENTS TO SUPPORT DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS (COOK PHARMICA, LLC AND SCHULTE CORPORATION) AT THE INDIANA ENTERPRISE CENTER

- WHEREAS, in 1998 Thomson Consumer Electronics closed its television assembly plant in Bloomington, Indiana, eliminating 1200 jobs and leaving vacant a 200 acre, 1.8 million square foot industrial facility; and
- WHEREAS, in 1997 the Common Council created pursuant to Indiana Code 36-7-13-4 an Industrial Development Fund (see Ordinance 97-22), which is a special fund used for the purposes of industrial development and expansion in or serving the City of Bloomington; and
- WHEREAS, at the same time, the Common Council also established the Bloomington Industrial Development Advisory Commission which has the responsibility to make recommendations to the Common Council for expenditures from the Industrial Development Fund; and
- WHEREAS, in 1999 a Community Revitalization Enhancement District (“CRED”) was established pursuant to Indiana Code 36-7-13 upon the former Thomson site (see Resolution 99-15), under which the City may expend monies from the Industrial Development Fund for infrastructure improvements to make land more suitable for industrial use, as approved by the Bloomington Industrial Development Advisory Commission and Common Council; and
- WHEREAS, the Industrial Development Fund has a current balance of \$1,079,117.24; and
- WHEREAS, the former Thomson site is being redeveloped as the Indiana Enterprise Center (IEC); and
- WHEREAS, Cook Pharmica LLC has acquired and intends to renovate the building commonly known as Building Two of the IEC, install new manufacturing equipment and new research and development equipment, and make improvements to the land, to house a new company engaged in pharmaceutical manufacturing that is expected to employ 200 new employees by 2008 (the “Cook Pharmica Project”); and
- WHEREAS, Schulte Corporation intends to acquire and renovate the building commonly known as Building Four of the IEC and install new manufacturing equipment to house its expanded manufacturing operation that is expected to employ 223 new employees and retain 168 current employees by 2009 (the “Schulte Project”); and
- WHEREAS, both the Cook Pharmica and Schulte Projects require construction of waterline improvements and construction of a new road from Allen Street to the south boundary of the IEC to provide access to both Projects, as well as to the Best Beers site, IEC Building Four, the south side of IEC Building Three, Monroe County’s juvenile justice facility site, and other potential sites in the IEC; and
- WHEREAS, the estimated cost of the road construction is \$747,000 and the estimated cost of the water system improvements is \$250,000, for a total estimated cost of \$997,000, as shown on Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference; and
- WHEREAS, the City wishes to use \$850,000 from the Industrial Development Fund and \$150,000 from the Thomson Walnut Winslow TIF fund for construction of the road and water system improvements; and
- WHEREAS, encouraging the development of the Cook Pharmica and Schulte Projects serves an important public purpose, in that the Projects offer significant investments in the area, will create new jobs, will allow Schulte Corporation to remain in

Bloomington, and will allow Cook Pharmica LLC to establish a significant new company in Bloomington;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, THAT:

SECTION 1. Payment of \$850,000 from the IDF for construction of a roadway from Allen Street to the south boundary of the Indiana Enterprise Center and water system improvements as described in Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, should be, and hereby is, authorized.

SYNOPSIS

This resolution authorizes payment of \$850,000 from the City's Industrial Development Fund for road and water system improvements in the Indiana Enterprise Center (IEC), the former Thomson Consumer Electronics site. These improvements will serve new employment-generating businesses and facilities in the IEC, including Cook Pharmica, LLC; Schulte, Inc.; Best Beers, Inc.; and the Monroe County Juvenile Justice facility.

In 1998 Thomson Consumer Electronics closed its television assembly plant, eliminating 1,200 jobs and leaving their 200 acre, 1.8 million square foot industrial facility vacant. In response to Thomson's departure, the community came together to develop a vision for the redevelopment and reuse of the site. This effort involved not only the City of Bloomington and Monroe County, but also the State of Indiana, economic development organizations and the McDoel Gardens Neighborhood Association. This comprehensive planning effort led to the following:

- Development of the Community Revitalization Enhancement District (CRED) legislation and subsequent designation of the entire Thomson site as a CRED district
- Improvement of Patterson Drive
- Approval of the Thomson Area PUD (approved in 1998)
- A marketing plan that included changing the name of the site to the "Indiana Enterprise Center"

Within the past four months, Cook Pharmica and Schulte Corporation announced a commitment to invest at the Indiana Enterprise Center (IEC) and create jobs. Together, the companies will create over 400 new jobs and invest over \$65 million in real estate improvements, new machinery, and research and development equipment. Cook Pharmica purchased the facility located at 1300 S. Patterson Drive (known as Building Two) and Schulte purchased the facility located at 1500 S. Patterson Drive (known as Building Four). Both companies had been engaged in discussions with local and state officials for several months preceding their respective announcements to locate in Bloomington.

Both companies accepted incentive proposals from the City of Bloomington and the State of Indiana prior to purchasing their buildings. **The City's incentive proposal offered a commitment to partially fund public infrastructure improvements in the IEC. The State of Indiana and Monroe County also agreed to help fund the improvements.**

The specific improvements to be funded include construction of a new street providing access to the south and west portions of the IEC, and improvements to the public water infrastructure (primarily a 12" water main extension from the existing 24" main on South Rogers Street extending through the IEC to the line being extended from Allen Street as a part of the IEC site #5 development).

The new street will begin at Allen Street, just west of the Patterson Drive intersection, and terminate at the south end of the IEC. The street will provide access to Schulte Corporation, the west end of Cook Pharmica and the west end and south side of Building Three. The street will have multiple public uses, including access to Monroe County's property south of the IEC and future connection to additional roadways. **The idea for a new public street at the IEC is not new; construction of a new street was called for in the Thomson Area PUD, approved in August, 1998.** The water improvements will be completed concurrently with the road construction.

Because the IEC was once under common ownership, the property that was purchased by Cook Pharmica contained a common access easement that served Buildings Three and Four. For security reasons, Cook Pharmica cannot allow access through their site and would not purchase Building Two without the removal of the easement. However, without the easement in place, Building Four has no guaranteed access. Therefore, for the owners of Building Four to give up their right to the common access easement, they needed confirmation that access would be provided to their site. The commitment by the City of Bloomington to construct the public street satisfied the property owners that access would be provided, enabling the Cook Pharmica to purchase Building Two and locate their business in Bloomington.

The total cost of all improvements is approximately \$997,000. The majority of the funding will come from the Industrial Development Fund (IDF), which is funded by CRED revenues. Those revenues will fund \$850,000 of the project costs and Thomson-Walnut-Winslow TIF revenues will fund the remaining \$150,000. By committing to make these infrastructure improvements, the City of Bloomington will leverage \$250,000 in funding from the State of Indiana and \$50,000 from Monroe County. The City's commitment to the infrastructure improvements will serve as a local match for the state funding, which comes from the State's Industrial Development Grant Fund.

On July 27, 2004 the Bloomington Industrial Development Advisory Commission voted to recommend that the Common Council authorize payment of \$850,000 from the IDF for the infrastructure improvements. On August 2, 2004 the Redevelopment Commission authorized \$150,000 from the Thomson-Walnut-Winslow TIF for the infrastructure improvements. If approved, we anticipate completing the improvements in late summer of 2005.

WHEREAS, in 1999 a Community Revitalization Enhancement District ("CRED") was established pursuant to Indiana Code 36-7-13 upon the former Thomson site, under which the City may expend monies from the Industrial Development Fund for infrastructure improvements to make land more suitable for industrial use, as approved by the Bloomington Industrial Development Advisory Commission and Common Council; and

WHEREAS, the Industrial Development Fund has a current balance of \$1,079,117.24; and

WHEREAS, the former Thomson site is being redeveloped as the Indiana Enterprise Center (IEC); and

WHEREAS, Cook Pharmica LLC has acquired and intends to renovate the building commonly known as Building Two of the IEC, install new manufacturing equipment and new research and development equipment, and make improvements to the land, to house a new company engaged in pharmaceutical manufacturing that is expected to employ 200 new employees by 2008 (the "Cook Pharmica Project"); and

WHEREAS, Schulte Corporation intends to acquire and renovate the building commonly known as Building Four of the IEC and install new manufacturing equipment to house its expanded manufacturing operation that is expected to employ 223 new employees and retain 168 current employees by 2009 (the "Schulte Project"); and

WHEREAS, both the Cook Pharmica and Schulte Projects require construction of waterline improvements and construction of a new road from Allen Street to the south boundary of the IEC to provide access to both Projects, as well as to the Best Beers site, IEC Building Four, the south side of IEC Building Three, Monroe County's juvenile justice facility site, and other potential sites in the IEC; and

WHEREAS, the estimated cost of the road construction is \$747,000 and the estimated cost of the water system improvements is \$250,000, for a total estimated cost of \$997,000, as shown on Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to use \$850,000 from the Industrial Development Fund and \$150,000 from the Thomson Walnut Winslow TIF fund for construction of the road and water system improvements; and


WHEREAS, encouraging the development of the Cook Pharmica and Schulte Projects serves an important public purpose, in that the Projects offer significant investments in the area, will create new jobs, will allow Schulte Corporation to remain in Bloomington, and will allow Cook Pharmica LLC to establish a significant new company in Bloomington;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE BLOOMINGTON INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT ADVISORY COMMISSION THAT:

SECTION 1. The Commission hereby recommends to the Common Council that it:

1. Authorize payment of \$850,000 from the IDF for construction of a roadway from Allen Street to the south boundary of the Indiana Enterprise Center and water system improvements as described in Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.



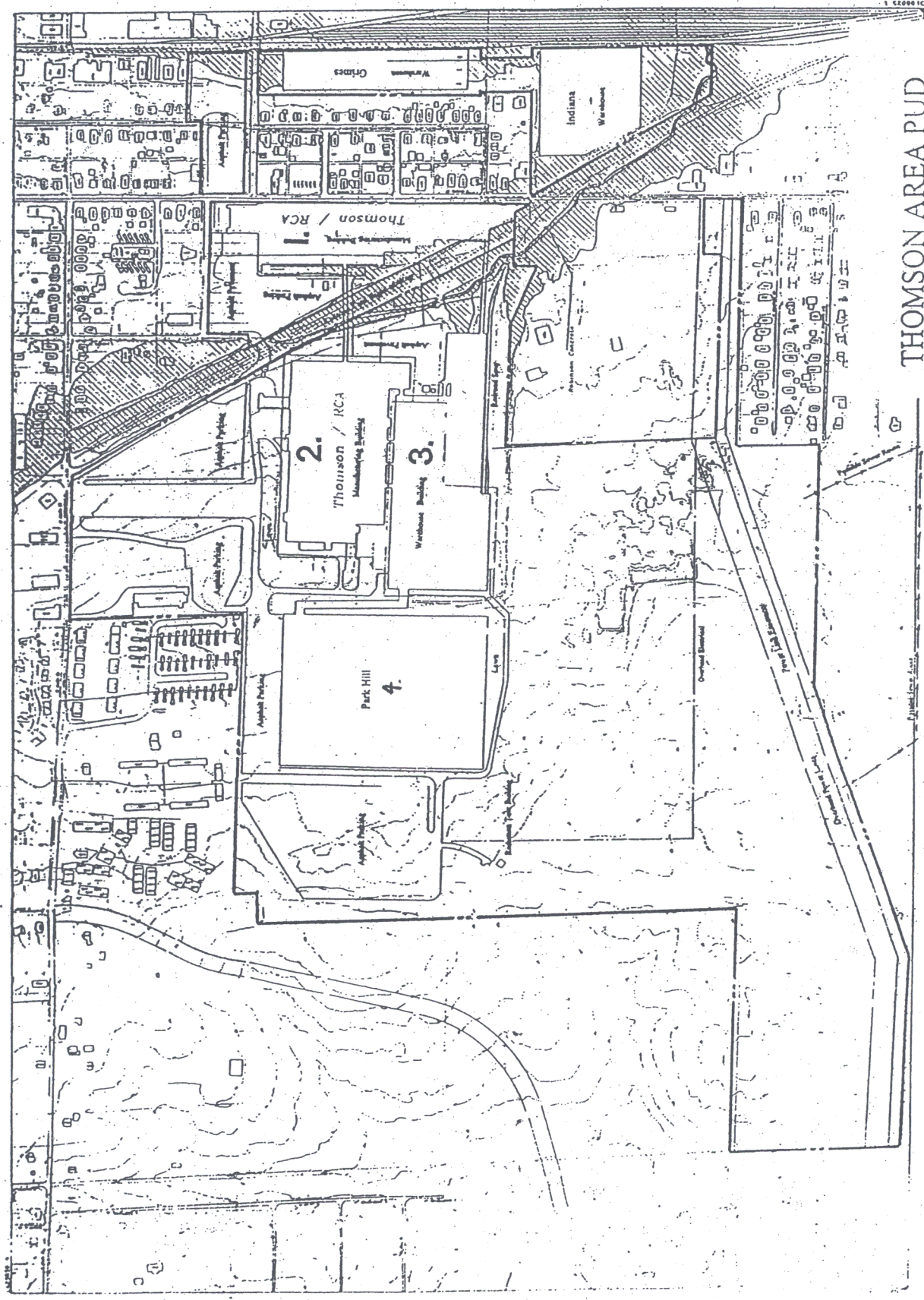

THOMSON AREA PUD

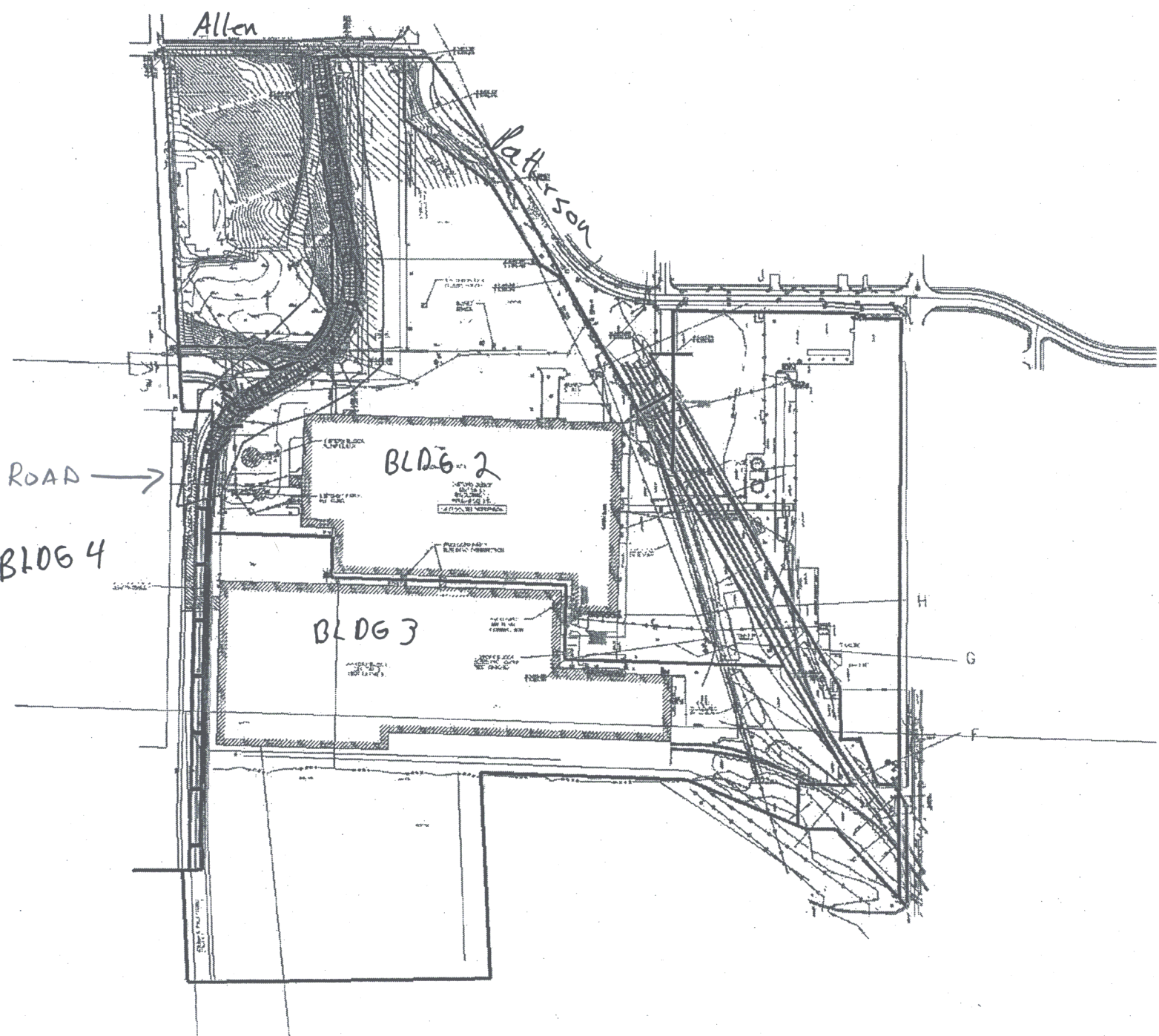
EXISTING FEATURES MAP



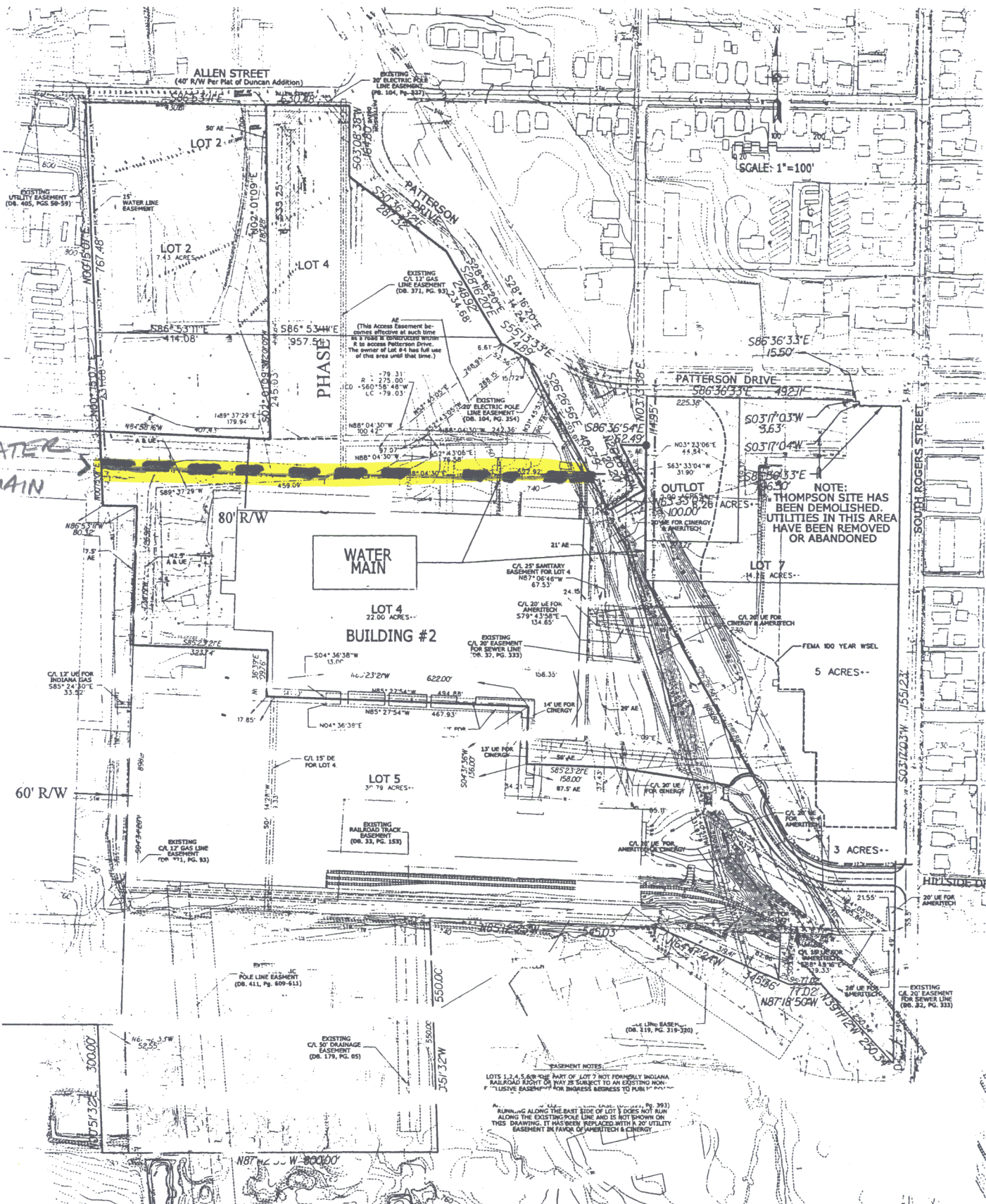
