 - Dunn Hill:
 - Site plan is completed
 - Evolve will be the name of the apartments
 - \circ Committing to native plants and extra plantings beyond what the UDO requires; rain gardens; providing recycling; roof with reflective titanium bits; green corridor
 - \circ About 754 beds
 - City Side:
 - \circ On the corner of 3rd and Washington
 - \circ Add on to the bank building upward, and build a new building adjacent to it where the parking lot is, with commercial on bottom
 - \circ No landscaping
 - Potential for green building

City Hall

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- Four stories
- \circ Won't have as many windows as usually required
- \circ 137 beds
- 3rd and Grant:
 - Office building currently set to be demolished
 - Commercial building in the front, then parking behind on the first floor and apartments above
 - Four stories
 - Recycling space; no landscape plan yet
 - Asking for waivers:
 - For height because they want it a story taller than it's allowed to be
 - For more impervious surface than allowed
 - For less than 50% retail
 - \circ Could be interested in green building if the City offers him good enough incentives, according to Jacqui
- Plan Commission
 - West Tapp Rd. next to Woolery Mill
 - Asking for waivers to change the PUD from commercial to residential
 - o Townhomes and apartments up to 2 beds
 - Green features include: LEED-track, karst evaluation, recycling, good amount of greenspace
 - Commissioners asked for solar panels, and expressed concerns about traffic and the LEED-track status as opposed to being fully LEED certified

- Mike has been attending biodiversity meetings to contribute to habitat network
