BLOOMINGTON BOARD OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Bloomington Board of Public Safety held its regular monthly meeting on **Tuesday, June 19, 2018, at 5:00 p.m.**, in the City of Bloomington City Hall McCloskey Conference Room located at 401 N. Morton Street, Bloomington, Indiana.

CALL TO ORDER

Vice Chairperson Kimberly Gray called the meeting to order. Board members present were Luis Fuentes-Rohwer and Martin McCrory. Others attending are listed on the attached sheet.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Fuentes-Rohwer made a motion to approve the May 15, 2018, BPS meeting minutes. McCrory seconded the motion. The motion carried. Fuentes-Rohwer moved to approve the May 22, 2018 Special Meeting Minutes. McCrory seconded the motion. The motion carried.

POLICE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS

Training and Incident Reports and Statistics; Letters of Appreciation and Commendation

Deputy Chief Joe Qualters reported on the monthly statistics, training and letters of appreciation and commendation.

Gray asked for a motion to add to the agenda to look at surplus property to be placed in the City Auction from the Police and Fire Departments. Fuentes-Rohwer made the motion and McCrory seconded the motion. After clarification, the motion carried.

General Business

Chief Mike Diekhoff stated that he was starting the 2019 budget process. Details could not be given since the process just started. Diekhoff talked about the Bloomington Police Department (BPD) has joined the Law Enforcement Immigration Task Force. This happened after he and Mary Catherine Carmichael the Director of Community Engagement attended the U.S. Conference of Mayors in Washington D.C. last month. The conference focused on immigration and how local police departments are involved with that group. This is an organization that we will receive information from about how to deal with local immigration issues. This particular conference was not focused on doing any kind of federal enforcement regarding immigration laws. We will focus on working more closely with the different communities so that relationships and trust can be built and the communities are more comfortable with local law enforcement. Many times crimes are not reported because immigrants feel like they will be caught up in some kind of "deportation" situation. We want to make sure we can work with them so that they feel safe and so that they will trust law enforcement. This topic was discussed in some detail.

Purchases: Expenditures/Procurements

19 vehicles are being bought to replace older vehicles.

Personnel Issues

There is one employee on light duty and six openings. Interviews were finished last week. Background investigations are being done on the candidates that were interviewed.

Review of the CIRT General Orders Policies and Procedures

Michael Rouker, City Attorney/Attorney for Police and Fire Departments lead this discussion. He explained the CIRT General Orders Policies and Procedures document that was gone over in a former meeting, has the corrections and additions that were added to it during that meeting and was provided to the Board Members for their review. Questions were asked by the Board Members. Gray asked for a motion to approve the Resolution 18-02. A member from the public chimed in wanting to know if the public saw this document. Christopher Wheeler, Assistant City Attorney and Attorney for the Board of Public Safety, responded that there isn't any public comments right now. Public comments will be held at the end of the meeting. Other members of the public began chiming in. Rouker made a suggestion to make a motion to move the public comments up on the agenda to allow the public to speak and possibly give a time limit on the comments. Gray asked for a motion to amend the agenda and move Public Comments up to this point with up to five minutes each. Fuentes-Rohwer made the motion and McCrory seconded the motion. The motion carried. Gray also asked for a motion to approve Resolution 2018-02. Fuentes-Rohwer made the motion. Board Member Maqubé Reese arrived at this time. McCrory seconded the motion.

Public Comment

There were guests that were attending the meeting for the Review of the CIRT General Orders Policies and Procedures. After Diekhoff's comments, the following people made comments:

After Ms. Crabtree's comments, Rouker interjected to explain the process a little better. A number of people from the public may have comments. Those comments may sometimes come in the form of a question. Typically, we might record those questions and then when Public Comment has closed, at that point, if the Board has additional questions or comments for staff, at that point, the Board might relay those to staff for answer.

All present Board members asked questions. Once all of the questions were asked and answered. Fuentes-Rohwer withdrew his original motion to approve Resolution 18-02.

FIRE DEPARTMENT BUSINESS

Training and Incident Reports and Statistics; Letters of Appreciation and Commendation

Chief Jason Moore reported on the monthly statistics, training, and letters of appreciation and commendation.

General Business

BFD (Bloomington Fire Department) will begin installing new equipment. A brief discussion was held. One of the Community Activities is "Touch A Truck" that will be held on July 2, 2018. This gives the public an opportunity to see a fire truck up close and learn a little about how it operates.

Purchases: Expenditures/Procurements

Station Alerting Equipment is being installed in all the stations. \$275K was budgeted for that. Looks like it's going to come in around \$300K. Things have been moved around to cover the cost. Extraction Equipment that was approved by the Board that was purchased from Fire Serves Extraction Services for around \$26K was placed in all of the Fire Engines and has been used in several accidents this summer with successful outcomes. Carbon Monoxide Gas Detector RAD57 (Pulse CO-Oximeter) Equipment is being purchased for around \$6K. Six Gas Detectors were purchased as well. These are used to be able to detect four types of hazards gas as well as oxygen, for operational vehicles and will be purchased for around \$1,200.00 each. Two Prevention Replacement Vehicles (fully equipped) will be purchased for the cost of around \$37K - \$38K each. A Fire Detection Sprinkler System for Station 2 went out so there will be an emergency "temporary" fix of \$600.00. The "real" purchased for Sprinkler System will be for approximately \$4,300.00 later into the summer.

Personnel Issues

There are two employees on light duty; one on Administrative Leave without pay. One Firefighter awaiting appeal in Special Session. We are down one Firefighter for staffing with a retirement last month. Currently working with Human Resources (HR) to develop the on-line application system. Finally finalized the "external" version and now we are creating an "internal" version.

Surplus Property (added to agenda)

A discussed was held in regards to the vehicle/equipment on the list that they were given. After a brief discussion, Gray read the Resolution for the Surplus Property out loud. Reese made a motion to approve the Surplus Property Resolution. Fuentes-Rohwer seconded the motion and the motion carried.

CIRT General Order Policies and Procedure cont.

The updated Resolution was handed out. Gray agreed to read it out loud but before she started, Reese asked what was added. Rouker explained all the changes that were made. Gray read the Resolution and then Reese made a motion to approve the revised amended Resolution 18-02 for the CIRT vehicle. Fuentes-Rohwer seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Review of BPS Payroll

- a. Chief Diekhoff and Chief Moore agreed the payrolls were correct.

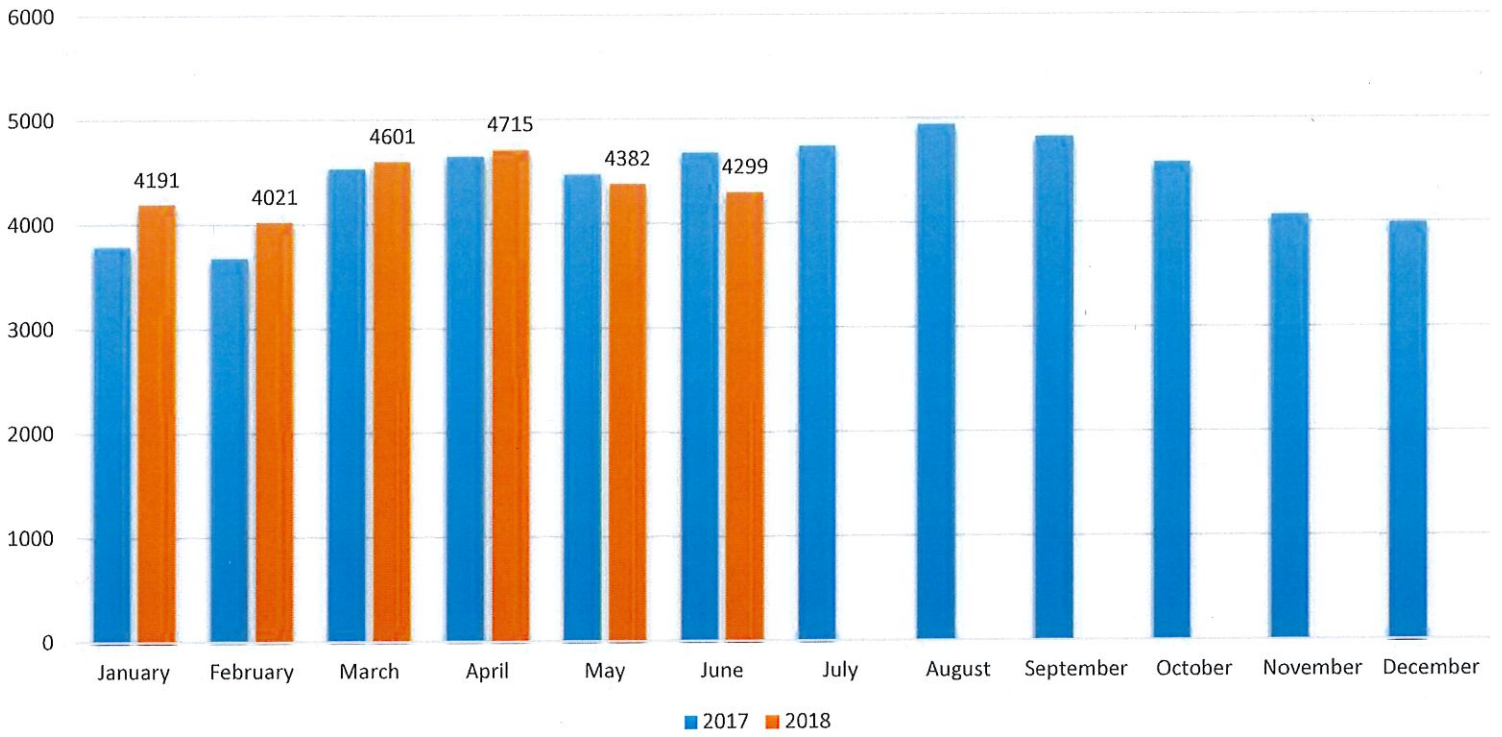

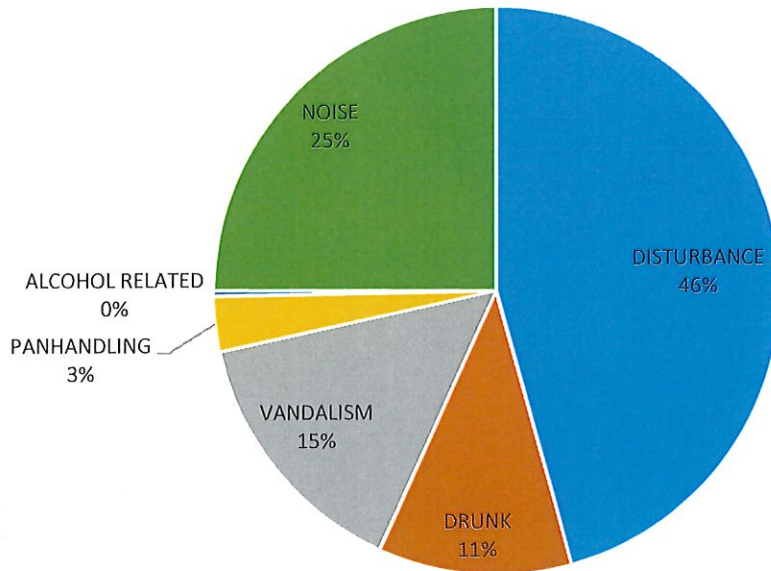

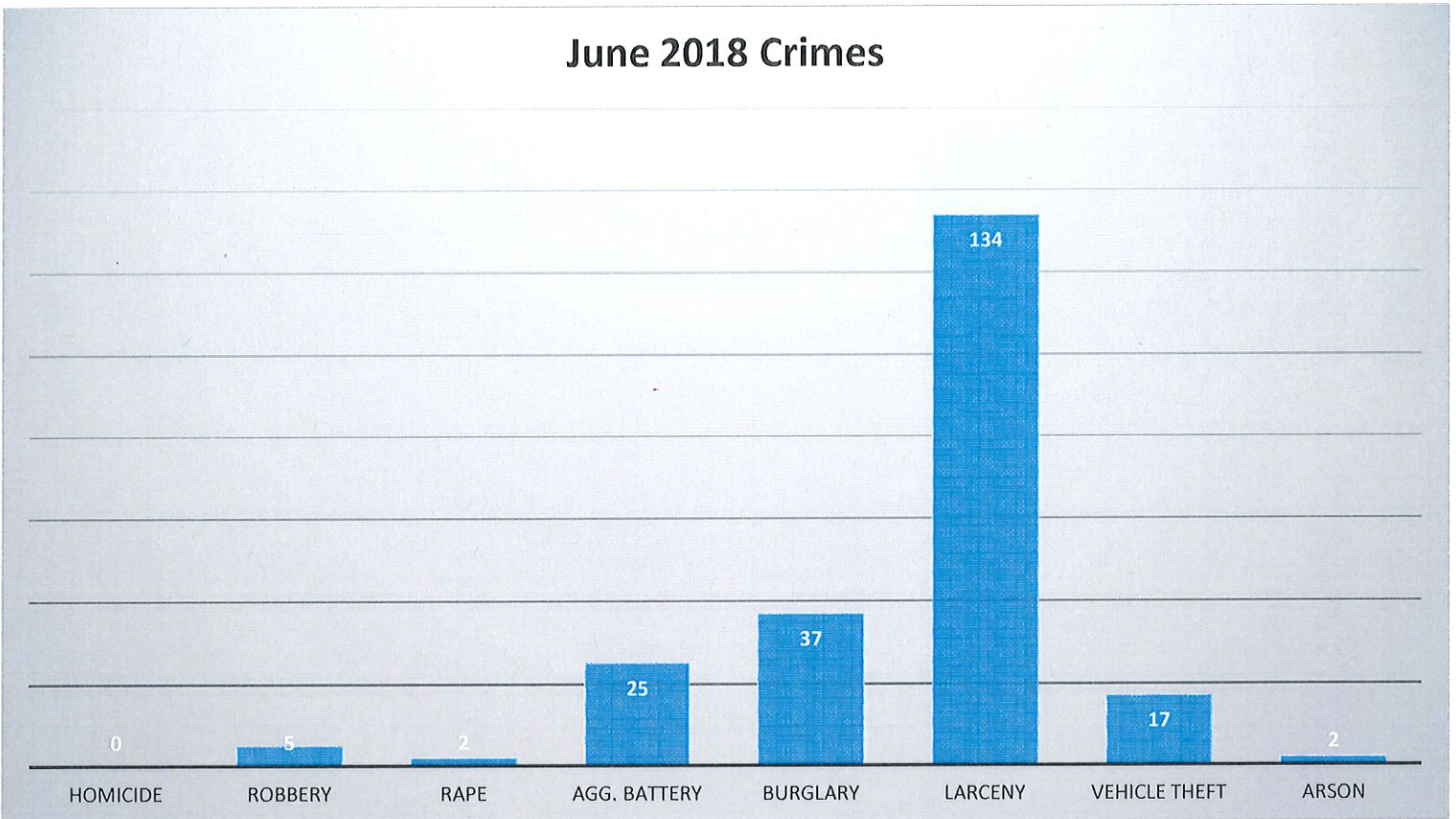
2017-2018 Calls For Service Totals



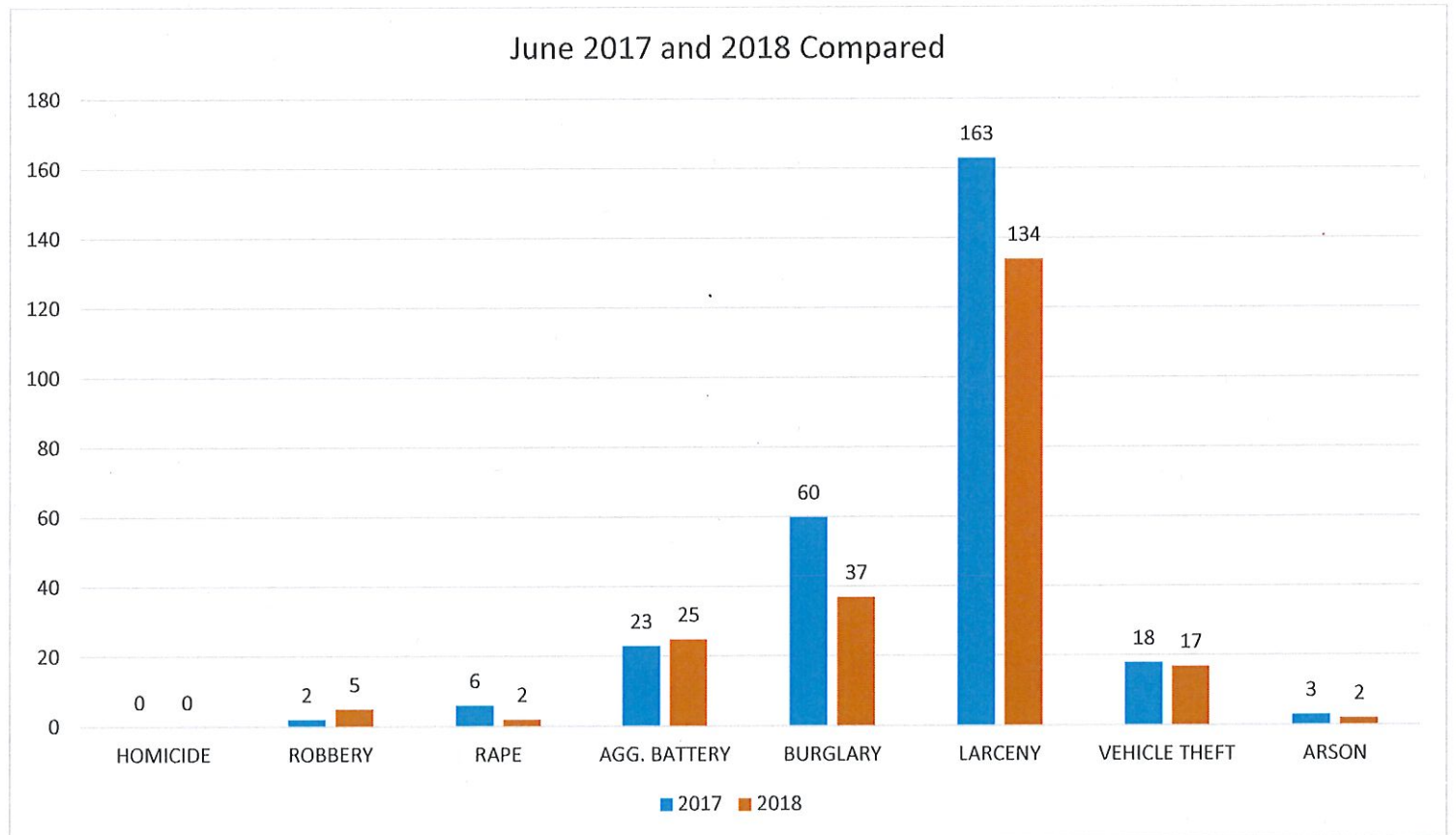
June 2018 Nuisance Calls for Service



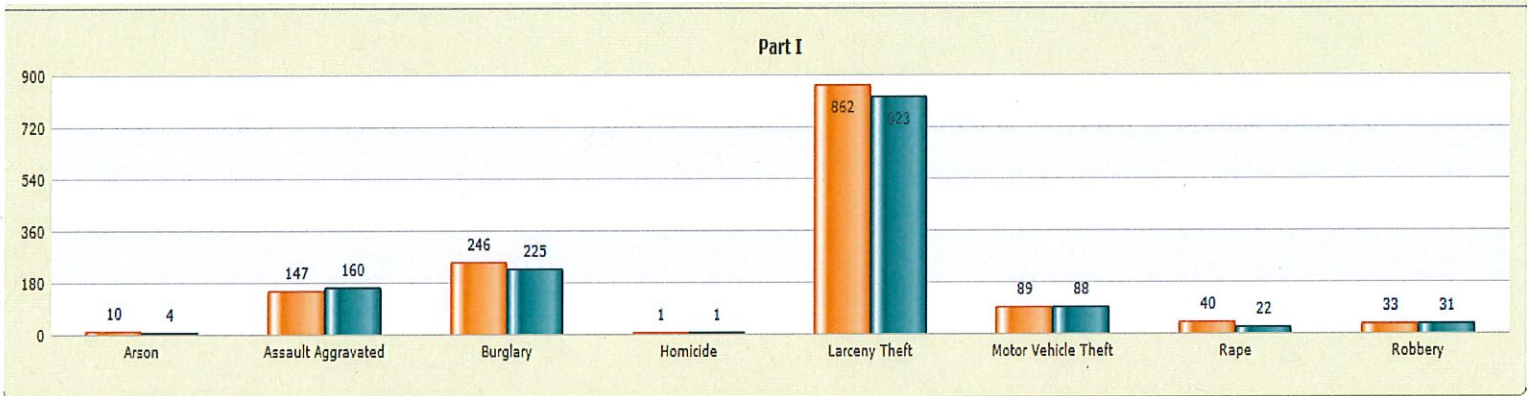
June 2018 Crimes



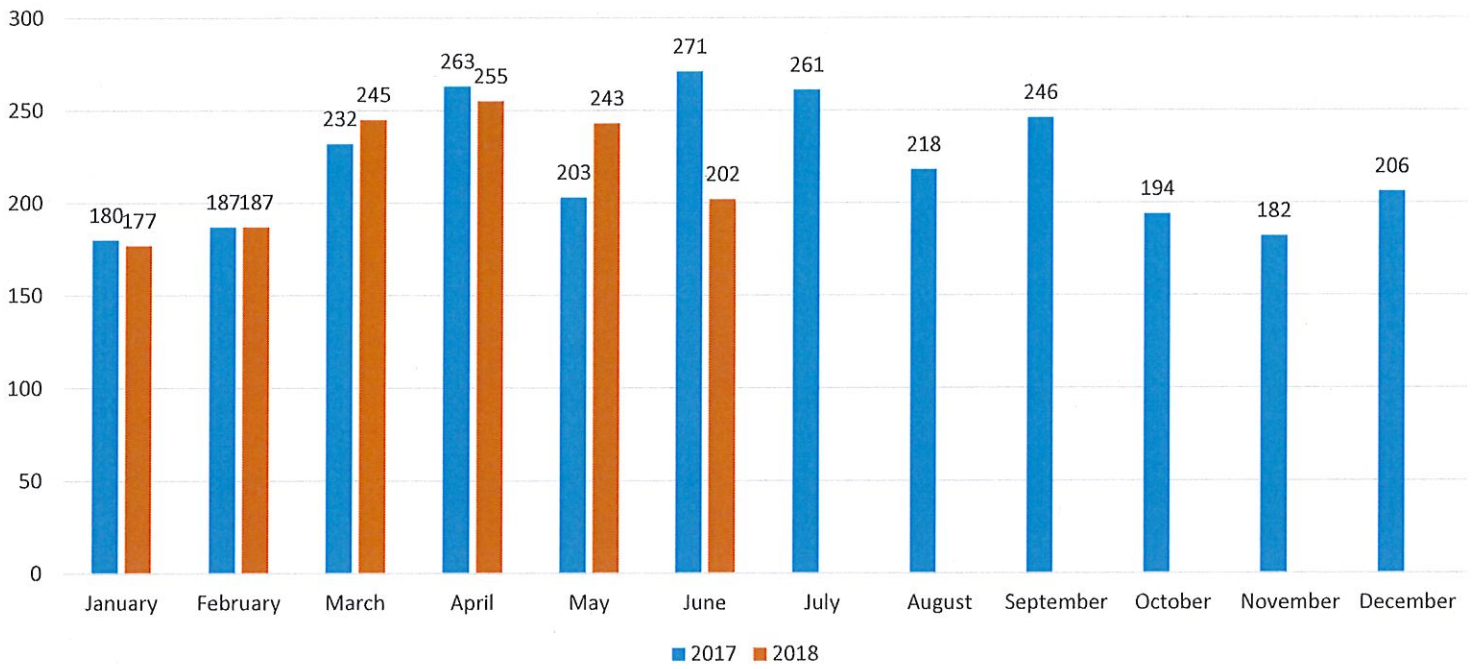
June 2017 and 2018 Compared



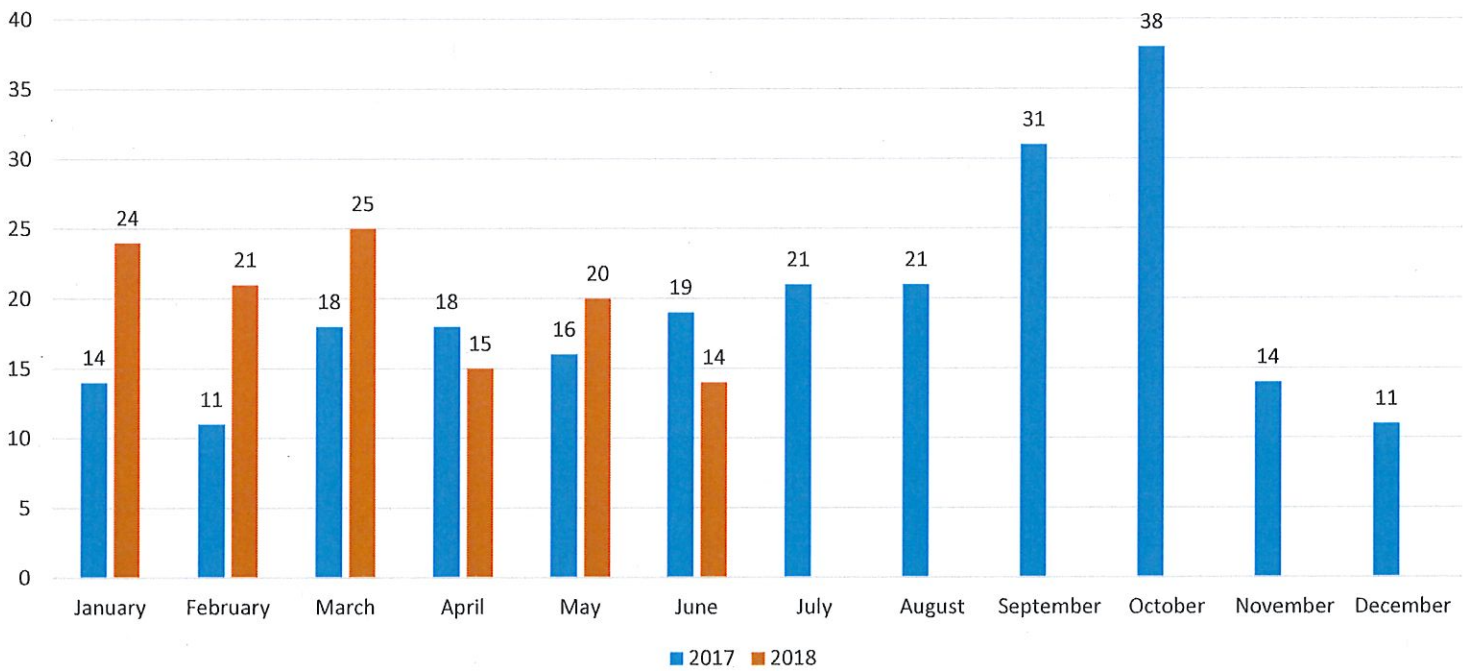
Period 1: 01-Jan-2017 - 30-Jun-2017 Period 2: 01-Jan-2018 - 30-Jun-2018



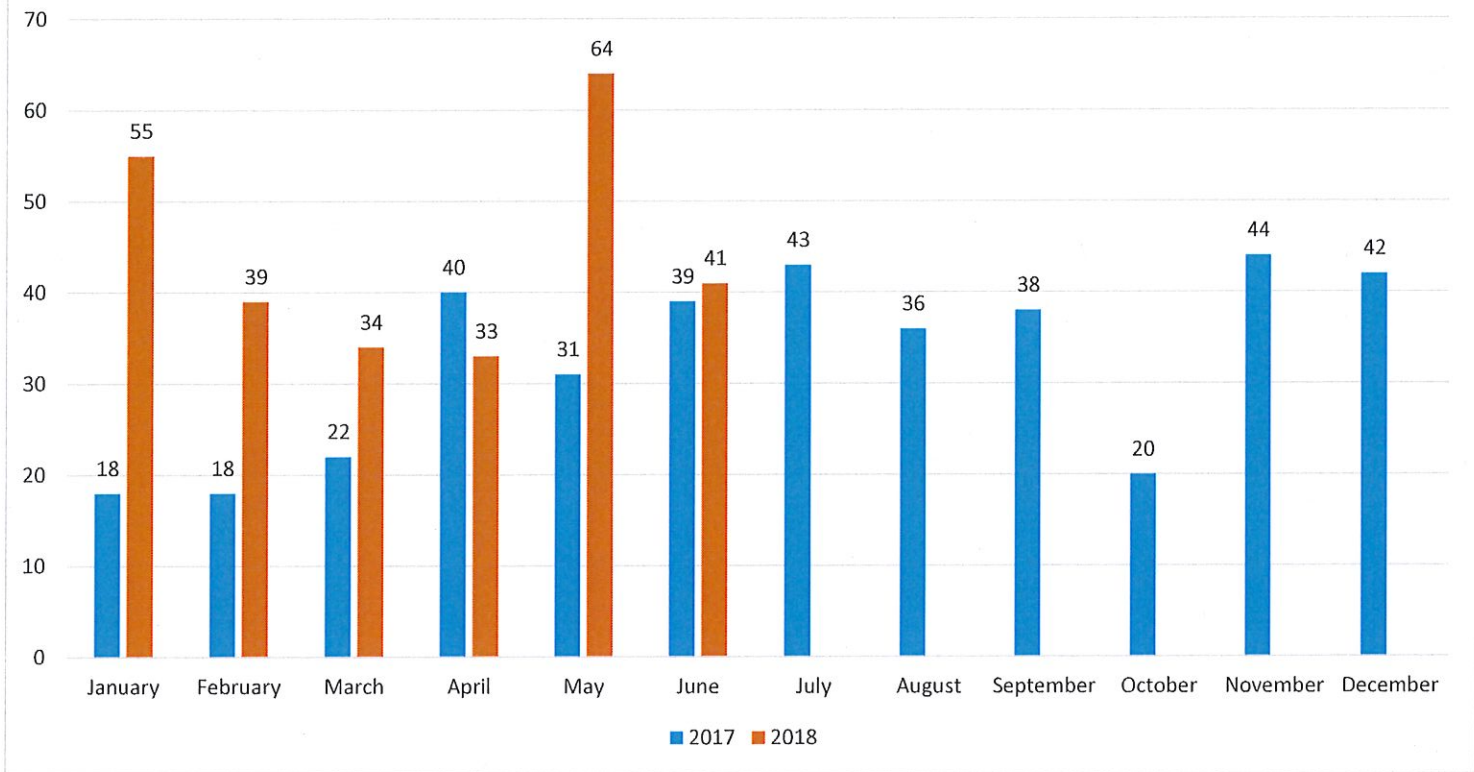
2017-2018 Adult Arrests

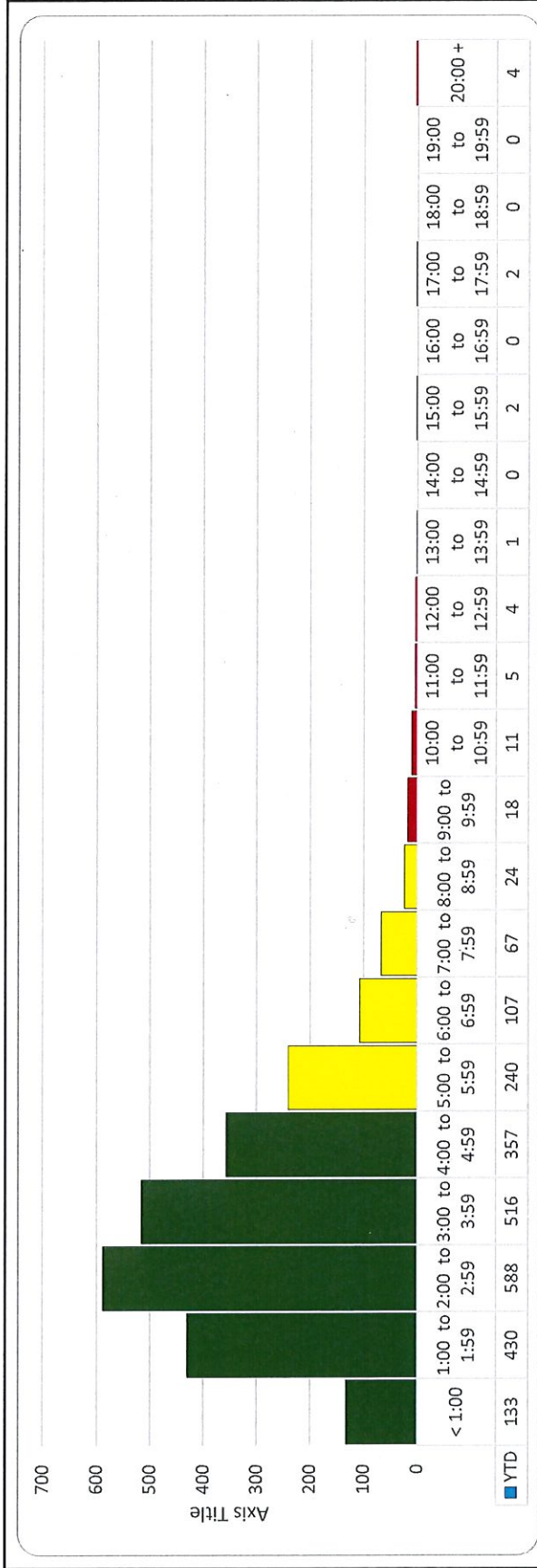

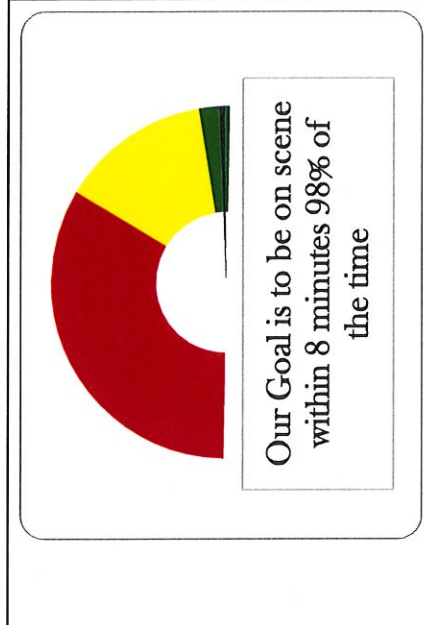
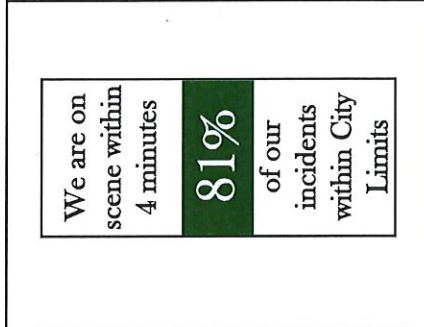
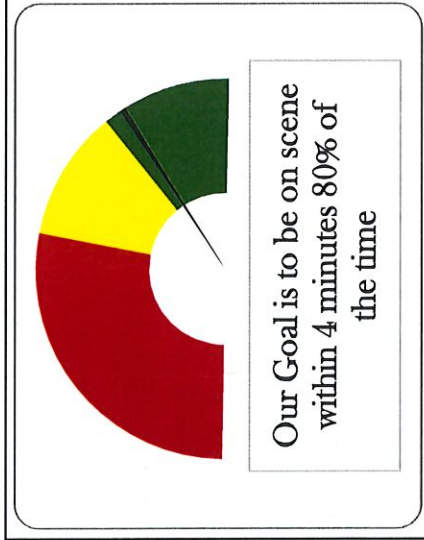
Major / Significant Incidents During Month

Structure Fire - 715 and 717 North Maple

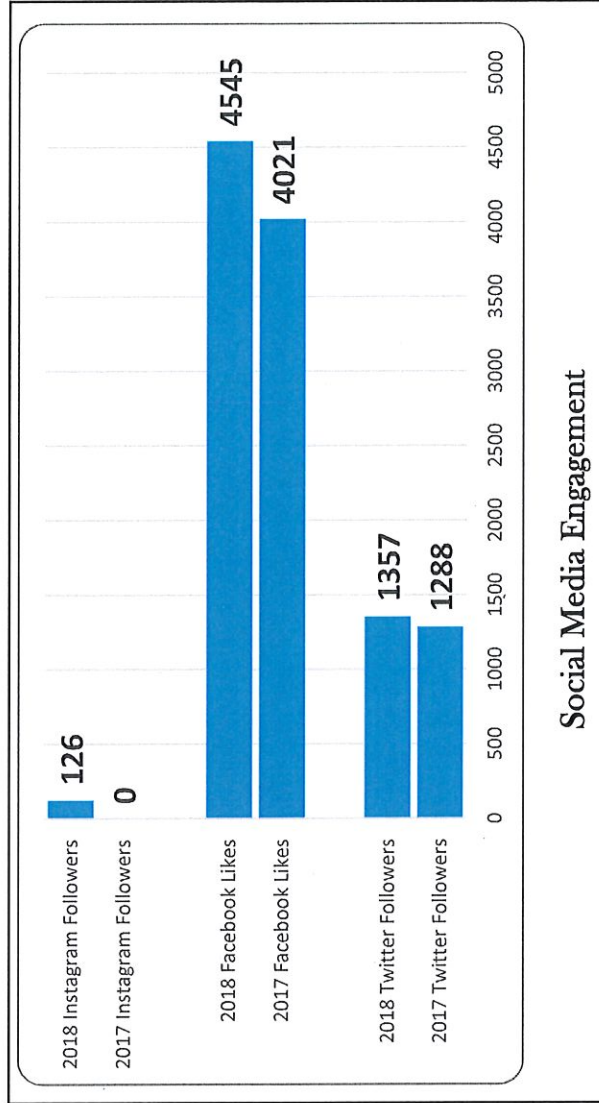
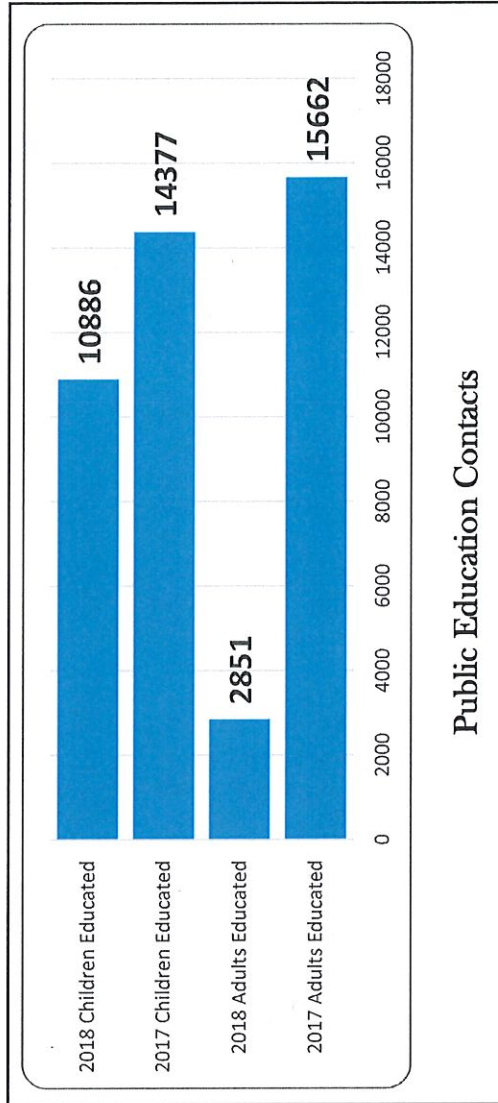
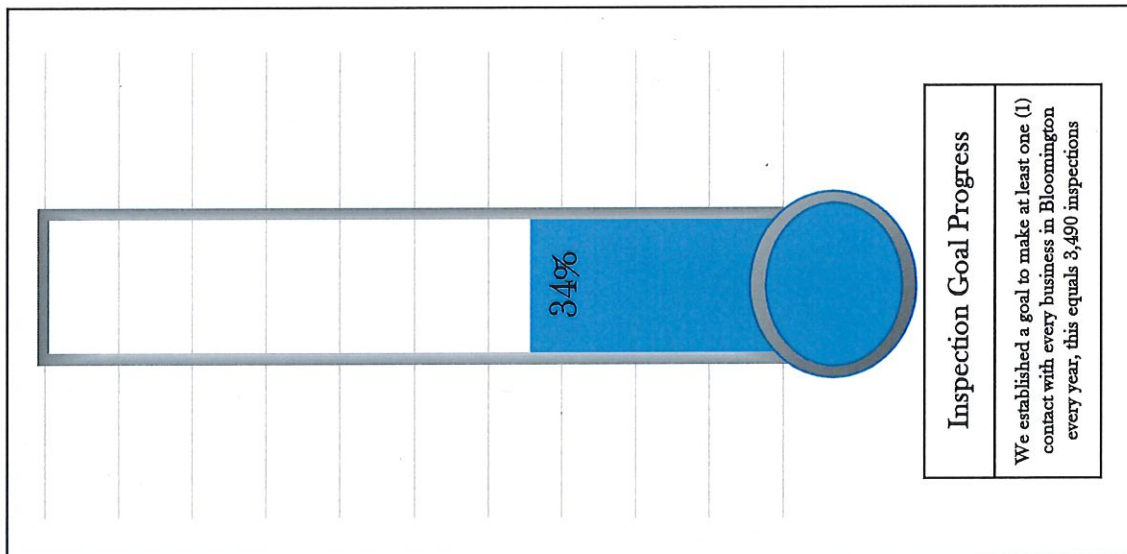
Response Times / Goals



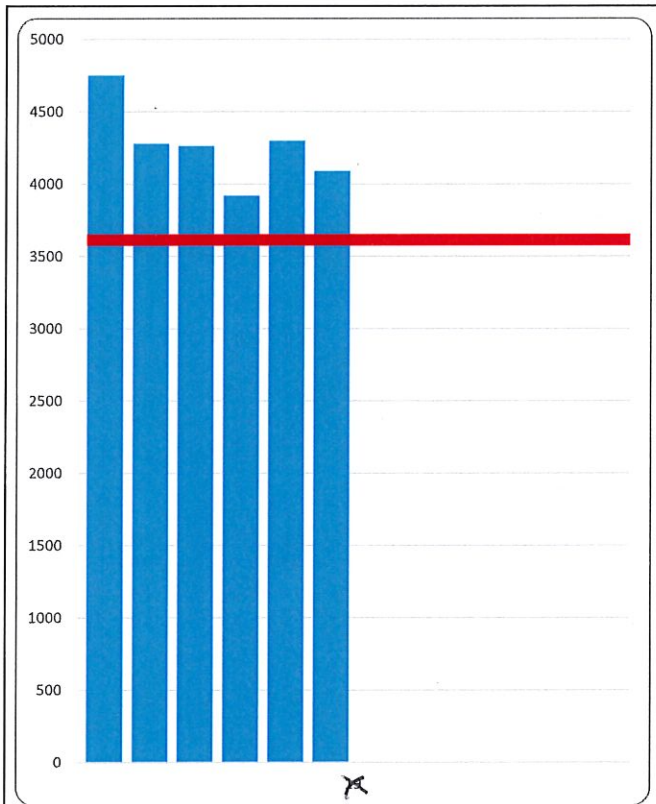
YTD Response Times Incidents within COB Limits



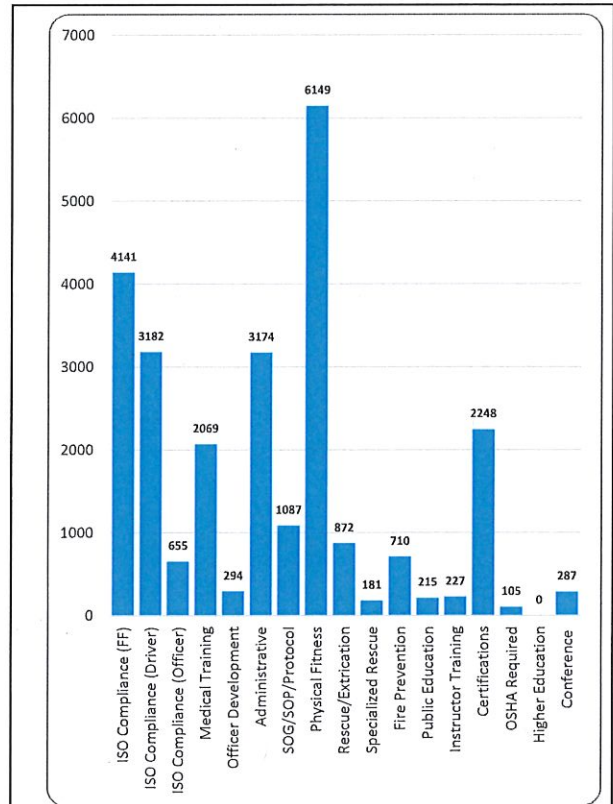
