REGULAR SESSION - SECOND READINGS & RESOLUTIONS - NEW LEGISLATION & UPDATES

Item 1:

Resolution 20-04 - To Approve Recommendations of the Mayor for Distribution of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Funds for 2020

Resolution 20-04 approves the Mayor's recommendations for allocating Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for 2020. As an "entitlement" city, the City of Bloomington receives CDBG funds from the U.S. Housing and Urban Development Department (HUD). The amount of funding is determined by four measures of community need: poverty in the community, housing overcrowding, age of housing stock, and population growth. Funds may be used for social services, physical improvements, and administration.

2020 CDBG Funds

The City expects to receive \$800,000 in CDBG funding this year. In 2019, the City anticipated \$800,000 but in actuality received \$845,710. In addition to annual federal CDBG allocations, federal law provides that any program income generated from the use of CDBG funds may be used for social services and physical improvements. However, HAND Director, Doris Sims, does not plan on adding any program income to the 2020 allocation funds.

Citizen Advisory Committees

HUD administers and regulates CDBG funds. HUD requires that funding for all projects and programs be tied to HAND's <u>Consolidated Plan</u> (<u>linked</u>). The City is in the process of completing the <u>2020-2024 Consolidated Plan</u>, which will be used to inform this round of allocations.²

The City relies on a CDBG Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) which is divided into two

subcommittees: Social Services and Physical Improvements.³ These two subcommittees make recommendations for the allocation of funds and review applications. Fifteen community members participated in this year's process. Eight served on the Social Services subcommittee and seven served on the Physical Improvements subcommittee.

Process

The CDBG funding process spans about 10 months from September/October of one year to June/July of the next. Council consideration of allocations typically occurs in February/March and funds may become available in June/July.⁴ In the months prior to that, the following occurs:

- In September, application and submission information becomes available for interested agencies.
- In October agencies must submit a letter of intent outlining their proposal and attend a mandatory training.
- In early December, completed applications are due.
- In January, CAC holds public hearings to consider and make recommendations.
- In February, the Redevelopment Commission reviews the recommendations of CAC and forwards its decision to the Mayor who then forwards them to the Council.

The recommendations this year, as in past years, have come forward without change and with unanimous support.

Eligibility and Allocation

HUD regulations require that we use at least 70% of CDBG funds for the benefit of low-to-moderate income persons. The remaining funds may be used to prevent or eliminate blighted areas or to address community development needs arising from serious and immediate threats to the health or welfare of the community. Please note that currently all CDBG funds are leveraged to address low- and moderate-income populations.⁵

HUD regulations require that CDBG funds be allocated among three categories according to the following formula: no more than 15% may be allocated for social service programs; no more than 20% may be used for administrative costs; and, at least 65% must be used for physical improvements.

³ The membership of CAC is as follows: two City Council members, two Redevelopment Commission members, and up to 18 community members appointed by the Mayor. This year, the CDBG CAC allocated the maximum allowable in each category:

Administration \$160,000 (20%)
 Social Services \$120,000 (15%)
 Physical Improvements \$520,000 (65%)

Administration

This year \$160,000 was allocated for the administration of Housing and Neighborhood Development Department.

Social Services Funding

Under local rules, agencies may apply for a maximum of \$25,000 per social services program. This year seven agencies sought \$174,999 and five agencies were recommended to use the \$120,000 which was available for allocation.

Physical Improvements

This year, \$520,000 was available for physical improvements. Two departments of the City (which is classified as the "recipient" of these funds), and four agencies (which are classified as "sub-recipients" of these funds) sought a total of \$679,252 in funding.⁶ The CAC allocated a total of \$197,689 for housing assistance; \$114,650 for facility improvements; and \$207,661 for public

In the event of a Funding Differential

As noted in the opening paragraph, the funding figure is an estimate and HUD may send the City more or less than the expected amount of funds. For that reason, the recommendation and resolution direct the surplus or shortfall to be allocated in the following manner as recommended by the Citizen Advisory Committees (CACs):

Social Services: If the 2020 funding level is **greater than \$120,000**, overage funds will be distributed as follows: (1) Mother Hubbard's Cupboard will receive funds up to its full allocation request of \$25,000.00, then (2) Monroe County United Ministries will receive funds up to its full allocation request of \$25,000.00, then (3) Middle Way House will receive funds up to its full allocation request of \$24,999.00, then (4) New Leaf - New Life

will receive funds up to its full allocation request of \$25,000.00.8

If the 2020 funding level is **less than \$120,000**, funds will be distributed as follows: (1) Community Kitchen and Boys & Girls Club will each receive 21% of total funds, (2) Hoosier Hills Food Banks and Mother Hubbard's Cupboard will each receive 20% of total funds, and (3) Monroe County United Ministries will receive 18% of total funds.

<u>Physical Improvements</u>: If funds are greater than \$520,000, then additional funds will be allocated by the percentage change in total funds (expected ÷ received), not to exceed amount requested; excluding any project fully funded.

If funds are **less than \$520,000**, then HAND, BHA, Habitat for Humanity, and P&T Dept. will each be reduced by the same percentage.

RESOLUTION 20-04

TO APPROVE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE MAYOR FOR DISTRIBUTION OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) FUNDS FOR 2020

WHEREAS, the City of Bloomington, Indiana, is eligible for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds in the approximate amount of \$800,000 of grant funds for Fiscal Year 2020 pursuant to the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 as amended; and

WHEREAS, the national objectives of the Community Development Program are:

- 1. first and foremost, the development of viable urban communities, including decent housing and a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities principally for persons of low and moderate income; and
- 2. the elimination of slums and blight, and the prevention of blighting influences and the deterioration of property and neighborhood and community facilities of importance to the welfare of the community, principally for persons of low and moderate income; and
- 3. the elimination of conditions which are detrimental to health, safety, and public welfare, through code enforcement, demolition, interim rehabilitation assistance, and related activities; and
- 4. the conversion and expansion of the nation's housing stock in order to provide a decent home and suitable living environment for all persons, but principally those of low and moderate income; and
- 5. the expansion and improvement of the quantity and quality of community services, principally for persons of low and moderate income, which are essential for sound community development and for development of viable urban communities; and
- 6. the integration of income groups throughout the community by spreading persons of lower income into more prosperous neighborhoods and drawing persons of higher income to declining and deteriorated neighborhoods; and
- 7. the alleviation of physical and economic distress through the stimulation of private investment and community revitalization; and
- WHEREAS, federal guidelines set forth a formula for funding where no more than 15% of the total grant may be allocated for social services programs, no more than 20% of the total grant may be allocated for administering these funds, and at least 65% of the total grant must be allocated for physical improvements; and
- WHEREAS, the allocation for administering the grant may be used for a broad range of direct and indirect costs which includes but is not limited to salaries, rent, and fuel; and
- WHEREAS, a proposed statement of community development objectives and projected use of the funds has been advertised; and
- WHEREAS, said statement and projected use of funds reflects programs recommended by the Mayor with input from the Citizen's Advisory Committee and the Redevelopment Commission and are consistent with local and national objectives of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, MONROE COUNTY, INDIANA, THAT:

If the 2020 funding level is less than \$120,000.00, funds will be distributed as follows: (1) Community Kitchen and Boys & Girls Club will each receive 21% of total funds, (2) Hoosier Hills Food Banks and Mother Hubbard's Cupboard will each receive 20% of total funds, and (3) Monroe County United Ministries will receive 18% of total funds.

<u>Physical Improvements:</u> If funding exceeds \$520,000 then additional funds will be allocated by the percentage change in total funds (received/expected), not to exceed amount requested; excluding any project already fully funded. If funds are under \$520,000 then HAND, BHA, Habitat, and Planning and Transportation Dept. will each be reduced by the same percentage.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.

SYNOPSIS

The City of Bloomington is eligible for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development estimated to be \$800,000. This resolution outlines program recommendations by the Mayor with input from the Citizen's Advisory Committee and the Redevelopment Commission. Pursuant to federal regulations, CDBG allocations are made across the following general program areas: Social Services Programs, Physical Improvements, and Administrative Services.

Re: 2020-2021 Community Development Block Grant Allocations

The Community Development Block Grant or CDBG program is authorized under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended. The primary objective is to develop viable urban communities by providing low to moderate income persons decent housing, a suitable living environment and expanded economic opportunity. The city of Bloomington is an entitlement community under this program and we receive an annual allocation of CDBG funds.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines an entitlement community as one that is a metropolitan city with a population of at least 50,000. Bloomington meets that threshold and is therefore eligible for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding. The annual funding is formula based and is based on several objective measures of community need: 1) poverty in the community; 2) housing overcrowding; 3) age of housing stock; and 4) population growth. These funds must be used to meet a National Objective. Those objectives are: 1) benefit to low- and moderate-income persons; 2) aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight; and 3) meet a need having a particular urgency (referred to as Urgent Need). Seventy percent (70%) of the funds MUST be used to benefit low- and moderate-income persons. Included in this packet are excerpts from the CDBG regulations on eligible and ineligible activities.

Every 5 years, HUD requires that each entitlement community do a Consolidated Plan outlining its objectives and anticipated program activities for the next five years utilizing CDBG funds. To assist with our Consolidated Planning process, HAND hired Mullin and Lonergan Associates out of Pittsburgh, PA. To get input into our Consolidated Planning process, stakeholders meetings were held on June 11 and 12 of 2019. In addition to the stakeholder meetings, two meetings were held to invite the general public to provide input on the consolidated planning process. An online survey was also conducted to get public input that closed on July 31, 2019. The survey was available in both English and Spanish. 429 responses were received.

HUD also requires the completion of an Assessment of Fair Housing/Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing. This document requires the City to analyze its housing policies and practices, as well as evaluate access to housing within the community and make sure there are not discriminatory practices which would prevent access to free housing choices.

Each entitlement community is required by HUD to develop a citizen participation plan as part of its Consolidated Plan. This plan sets out procedures for public input into the allocation process. The City of Bloomington has an extremely open process for public input. The allocation recommendations are made by the Citizen Advisory Council (CAC) which is made up of citizens from various councils and commissions, as well as interested parties who apply for appointments. A membership list is included in this packet. The CAC is divided into two sub-committees, one to review physical improvement applications and one to review social service applications. Attached please find copies of the schedules. In addition to each sub-committee's public hearing, the Redevelopment Commission meeting is also open to public comment.

Each year, an Annual Action Plan is developed outlining the programs and activities that will be undertaken with the upcoming year's CDBG funds. The activities that will receive funding are divided into 3 distinct categories: physical improvements, social services, and administration. By law, no more than 15% of the total grant may be used for social services and no more than 20% may be used for administration. The other 65% is used for physical improvements. Additionally, the city can allocate any program income received. Program income is defined as gross income received by the grantee and its subrecipients directly generated from the use of CDBG funds. We did not have enough program income to allocate this fiscal year. Therefore, for fiscal year 2020-2021, the estimated allocations are as follows:

I have included in this packet, a brief description of each program and recommended allocation amount. Also attached is Redevelopment Commission Resolution 20-06 in which they unanimously forwarded on the CAC and Mayor Hamilton's recommendations. Please note that at the time of the CAC recommendations and the passing of Resolution 20-06, the CDBG annual allocation amount is an estimation. Both the Redevelopment Commission and Common Council resolutions outline how funds should be allocated if more or less of the estimated amount is received. Common Council Resolution 20-04 will confirm the recommendations of the CAC, the Redevelopment Commission, and the Mayor.

CDBG ELIGIBLE AND INELIGIBLE PROJECTS

(Excerpts from the CDBG regulations)

§ 570.202 - Eligible Rehabilitation and Preservation Activities

 - (2) Low-income public housing and other publicly owned residential buildings and improvements; and
 - (3) Publicly or privately owned commercial or industrial buildings, except that the rehabilitation of such buildings owned by a private for-profit business is limited to improvements to the exterior of the building and the correction of code violations.
 - (4) Nonprofit-owned nonresidential building and improvements not eligible under §570.201(c).

 - (3) The applicant has previously had a license issued under this chapter suspended or revoked.
