ROLL CALL

Service gave the agenda summation.

AGENDA SUMMATION

The minutes of June 15, 1988 were approved by a voice vote.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Kiesling observed that the lights at 3rd St. and College Mall Rd seemed to be functioning well and that traffic was moving along smoothly. She congratulated everyone who participated in the recycling program on Saturday June 25, 1988, reported that they collected almost 5 tons of materials. She urged councilmembers to attend the Monsanto trial in Indianapolis to support the City's position.

MESSAGES FROM  
COUNCILMEMBERS

Hogan thanked the Arden Place residents for inviting him to participate in their July 4th neighborhood parade.

Service thanked Police Chief Sharp for the buckle-up memento from the Bryan Park Seat-Belt "belt-in". Service thanked Kiesling and her committee for the re-cycling day success and noted that Kiesling's broken arm did not occur as she fell from an over loaded recycling truck. She thanked everyone who worked on the July 4th parade and while she was not invited to participate in the Arden Place parade there was another parade that was in her entire district.

It was moved and seconded that Ordinance 88-21 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.

It was moved and seconded that Ordinance 88-21 be adopted.

Dean Behnke was available for questions and noted that Section III of the ordinance, regarding the N. College 2 hour parking was to be deleted. The Traffic Commission will review that issue at a later date and said that it will come back to the Council after further public and committee input

Fernandez asked if the stripping along curbs has been completed, especially along the new sections of 3rd Street. He wondered if we should consider towing cars instead of ticketing them to emphasize our concern for vehicles parked in line of sight areas.

Behnke said that in regards to the 3rd St and Atwater speed limits and concerns expressed by councilmembers that this reduction will not improve the problem, the Traffic Commission will continue to watch this area even tho they have postponed the decision about traffic signals on those streets. Behnke was reluctant to agree to Fernandez towing suggestion for yellow curb violators and suggested stricter enforcement as a control procedure.

Gardner asked about yellow flashing lights for 3rd Street and Behnke said that will be discussed and considered for September.

Service said that she has had calls from constituents who feel that the speed limit reduction is a "cop-out" on the city's part and will not really correct the problem. She suggested that IU be brought into the discussion of the problem and attempt to consider what role they might play in attempting to solve the problem.

The amendment received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays: 0 and the ordinance as amended received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

It was moved and seconded that Resolution 88-19 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the resolution.

RESOLUTION 88-19

It was moved and seconded that Resolution 88-19 be adopted.

Olcott said that in the discussion of this request that the question of tie-ins in the Justice Building came up and he wondered if this has been corrected. Marty Laubach said that was correctable.

Fernandez asked about the Joint Board for this changeover and when would it be formed.

Laubach said when the resolution and interlocal is passed by both councils (city and County) He also said that Monroe County is looking into reestablishing the Indianapolis trunk lines.

Young asked what time frame we are talking about.

Laubach said 6 weeks for the Centrex system to be in place and available for BPD and IU and the rest of the system by October 1.

Gardner asked about initial start up costs. Laubach said there was no initial hook-up fee but the switching mechanism and the voice and data communication will cost out to \$35,000 for the BPD and about \$75,000 for City Hall. Laubach said when the system is in place it will provide a seamless communication link between all the agencies and City Hall for both data and voice communication. "it will be like being in the same building", he said.

The resolution received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

It was moved and seconded that Resolution 88-20 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the resolution

It was moved and seconded the Resolution 88-20 be adopted.

Fernandez gave a brief description for the need for such a committee hoping that the parties involved in the planning for their particular unit of government, education or area of interest would participate. "It is important that we know of each other's long term/range plans so that we can plan together for orderly growth and development." He cited a recent park/utilities discussion that certainly benefited from each entity knowing what the other planned to do.

The resolution received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

It was moved and seconded that Resolution 88-21 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the resolution.

It was moved and seconded that Resolution 88-21 be adopted.

Sue Montgomery, Representing the Legal Department said that the actual amount of City funds would be around \$85,000 rather than the \$150,000 allocated in the resolution

Tomi Allison said the original figure of \$150,000 was determined when it was uncertain just how many businesses or industries would go into the Kennedy farm complex.

Gardner asked Bill Brown, the petitioner, how many businesses have agreed to locate there and Brown said so far it is the Tree of Life group out of Florida producing a health food line and will, in no way, be using chemicals or dangerous products. Brown then said that \$86,000 is allocated for engineering estimates for Phase I and Phase II will call for additional monies. He said the company will employ 250 people.

The resolution received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

It was moved and seconded that the following ordinances be introduced and read by title only for first reading by the Clerk. Clerk Williams read the ordinances.


