Lin Gardner arrived.

Kiesling commented on a recent press conference on the State of Children in the world and pointed out the drawing in the Council Chambers. She also announced the next recycling schedule.

Gardner announced that she has just completed a "quality control study" on our Police Department (Gardner was recently arrested for a citizen demonstration at the Fell Iron and Metal Co. protesting the EPA clean-up of the area, or rather the particular methods employed in the clean-up). She announced that there are new plastic covers, 8-10 monitors on site and that a community forum is expected in early January to discuss the issues concerning Fell Metal and Iron. She also noted that Middle Way is still desperately trying to raise funds for the shelter and any and all contributions would be very appreciated. She had high marks for the police department.

Service said that she and the Mayor sent a letter to the EPA requesting the input forum, wished the Mayor a good trip and thanked all the councilmembers for a very good year.

The Mayor thanked the council for a year of very hard work and commended them on their dedication and willingness to work.

It was moved and seconded that Ordinance 88-60 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.

It was moved and seconded that Ordinance 88-60 be adopted.

Ken Perry, representing Sheriff Jimmy Young said that Bill Walden, a security expert suggested that several spaces be set aside for marked police vehicles in front of the Justice Building. He said this is a fairly economical way to provide a deterrent. Gardner suggested that it did not seem like much of a deterrent and Perry said that no other "official" type vehicles are actually in front of the building because most of the police and sheriff vehicles park in the back or along the side of the building.

Police Chief Sharp said that the police department gave up 6 parking spaces for the judges in the compound in the back of the Justice Building. He also pointed out that officers going in the back of the building have to disarm because it is a secure area.

The ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes; 7, Nays:1 (Service)

It was moved and seconded that Ordinance 88-61 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.

ORDINANCE 88-61

It was moved and seconded that Ordinance 88-61 be adopted.

Jim Williams said that this particular salary line item had been omitted in the 1987 salary ordinance. It received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

There were no petitions or communications from the public.
