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In the Council Chambers of the Municipal Building held on Wednesday, July 30, 1986, at 7:30 P.M. with Council President Regester presiding over a Special Session of the Common Council.

Roll Call: Service, Porter, Olcott, Regester, Gross, Murphy, Foley, Young. Absent: Mayer

The minutes of July 16,1986 were corrected and approved by a voice vote.

Gross said that she has been through several MESSA budget processes over the years from both sides COUNC and this one has been a farce, a joke and a waste of everyone's time. The salary ordinances reflect the fact that some people are vastly overpaid and others vastly underpaid and in several cases there is little difference between management and employee "We need an entire restructuring of the salary scale as well as a job reclassification scale. "We've been told that there isn't much money when in fact there is more than ever before. "The problem is there isn't a plan - capital plans are engaged with a "whimsicalness" without long range capital budgeting the public doesn't have access and input into the plans. She urged the administration to begin the reclassification of salary scales and prepare a long range capital budget.

Olcott said he agreed with Gross and while the administration does have a difficult, job there doesn't seem to be a lot of communication regarding the direction we are supposed to be going. The situation with Utilities has been going on for years.

Allison said that when "we" did the cum cap fund MESSAGES FROM a long range plan was presented. The Council is MAYOR always invited to participate in the planning stages of projects, but to say after the fact that you want to be involved, makes it difficult to satisfy your concerns. One problem that will always be with us is the fact that Utilities is a user based budget, while the Civil City is a tax based budget. The four year contract with the union has made it difficult to meet the agreed salary standards. Allison assured the Council that they too are concerned about salary differences between hourly and supervisory but a total review of personnel is massive and expensive and difficult. "How to cut salaries may be more difficult to do than to say", said Allison.

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that Resolution 86-30 be introduced and read by title SECOND READING only. Clerk Williams read the resolution.

LEGISLATION FOR RES. 86-30

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that Resolution 86-30 be adopted.

Chris Gardner, Chairman of the Human Rights Commission, spoke in support of the resolution and thanked all of the people involved in bringing this resolution to the Council.

Clarence Giliam, President of the NAACP spoke in support, praising the past accomplishments of the civil rights movement to make civil rights a reality for everyone.

Carol Hoffman has organized a ceremoney on August 12, 1986 for a moment of silence.

Murphy said recent legislative concern about apartheid in South Africa has finally reached home and our federal government has discovered a broad base of support among the populace. He suggested a committee to be formed to explore ways for the city to be part of the national concerns. Gross asked to be on the committee, as well as Chris Gardner and Pam Service.

Rev. Butler also addressed the Council in support of the resolution.

The resolution received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

ORDINANCE 86-37 Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that Ordinance 86-37 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that Ordinance 86-37 be adopted.

Tim Mueller said our present code distinguishes between townhouses and apartments in MF zones and with the exception of RH there is a built in incentive for apartments rather than townhouses if the open space requirement is 800 sq.ft. for apartments and 1200 sq.ft. for townhouses. "Our code does not encourage townhouse development"

The ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that APPROPRIATION Appropriation Ordinance 86-5 be introduced and read ORDINANCE 86-5 by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.

There was no discussion and the ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes:7, Nays: 1 (Service)

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that ORDINANCE 86-38 Ordinance 86-38 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that Ordinance 86-38 be adopted. There was no discussion.

The ordinance received a roll call vote of Ayes:8, Nays:0.

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that ORDINANCE 86-39 Ordinance 86-39 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that Ordinance 86-39 be adopted.

Jim Williams presented a number of amendments and those amendments are attached to the original ordinance. Gross emphasized again the need for a total job reclassification. Dean Behnke made a brief presentation about the street inspector and the upcoming plans for streets and sidewalks.

The amendment received a roll call vote of Ayes: 7, Nays: 1 (Service)

The ordinance, as amended, received a roll call vote of Ayes: 6, Nays: 2 (Service, Gross)

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that ORDINANCE 86-40 Ordinance 86-40 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that Ordinance 86-40 be introduced and read by title only.

It was moved and seconded that the Utilities Salaries be amended to reflect the same \$750 raise as the rest of the civil city.

Olcott said he was against such an amendment. The budget was put together in good faith and in a way that they thought was best for their employees, however the City and Utilities are one family. There isn't a problem with this year but next year they have to get with the rest of the City.

Murphy agreed with Olcott saying this was a serious communication problem and it is sad that Phillips and Peoples were put in that position. He said he was not defending the utilities department but this should not have happened. He said he would vote for the amendment. John Goss said there was no communication gap; the Utilities Staff met with the administration and they made strong arguments for their suggested raises. The administration suggested they bring their request directly to the Council for discussion.

Murphy said we could have avoided this problem if the administration had told us of the problem. Goss said he would like to have the Council involved in next years salary discussions. Olcott thought it was important to convey the message that we are all in this together and we need to operate together, Service agreed and thought the best message to send was No, Now.

The amendment received a roll call vote of Ayes: 5, Nays: 3 (Regester, Gross, Young)

Olcott noted that Mr. Andrew Tynan has resigned from the USB and that are sorry that he resigned with bad feelings. Olcott suggested that he might want to get more involved with local government.

The ordinance, as amended, received a roll call vote of Ayes: 7, Nays: 1 (Gross) -

Olcott moved and Foley seconded the motion that ORDINANCE 86-41 Ordinance 86-41 be introduced and read by title only. Clerk Williams read the ordinance.
