In the Common Council Chamber of the Municipal Building held on July 21, 1982, with the Council President Pat Murphy presiding over a regular session of the Common Council.

Councilmembers present: Morrison, Towell, Porter, Allison, Murphy, Dilcher, Olcott, Service, Hogan.

Council President Murphy read the agenda summation.

Allison complimented the Youth Group in the Crestmont Area of the neighborhood cleanup.

Service commended the Parks and Recreation Department for their involvement in the "Acting Up" series.

Council President Murphy submitted Barbara Fredin's name APPOINT as the council's appointment to the Environmental Quality ENVIRON Commission for consideration. She would replace Barry Solomon. AND CON

Olcott moved and Service seconded the nomination. The voice vote was unanimous.

Mike Tanck, the manager of Horizons TV introduced himself and pledged his assistance to the Council and desire to work together.

Allison said that although Mr. Tanck had only been in the community a short while he was already active in the Chamber and in the Old Library Landscaping Committee.

Olcott moved and Morrison seconded a motion to introduce and read Appropriation Ordinance 82-10 by title only.

Clerk Williams read the appropriation ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved and Morrison seconded a motion to adopt Appropriation Ordinance 82-10. Olcott read the legislative synopsis.

The motion received a roll call vote of Ayes: 9, Nays: 0.

Olcott moved and Morrison seconded a motion to introduce and read Ordinance 82-43 by title only.

Clerk Williams read the ordinance by title only.

Olcott moved and Morrison seconded a motion to adopt Ordinance 82-43. Olcott read the legislative synopsis.

The amendment to include the 15 minutes parking zones was introduced

Dilcher said that this resolution was for bilateral, mutually verifiable disarmament. While there may be some reluctance to vote on what seems to be a national issue, there is enough evidence to support the fact that each side has enough nuclear power to devastate each other. The federal government asked our community to present a civil defense plan and the conclusion of the committee was that no plan was realistic, in short there was no defense. Thus the response is many conconcerned citizens seeking many avenues of expression and this is the conclusion that this committee has arrived at.

Olcott said that he still has problems with telling Washington what to do without sufficient information.

Olcott moved and Hogan seconded a motion to dismiss the resolution.

The motion was defeated by a vote of Ayes:4, Nays; 5 (Towell, Allison, Murphy, Dilcher, Service).

Hogan objected to the discussion of this resolution of a topic that will have zero impact on the issue. If the council wants to have a round table discussion, fine, but it was out of place to spend two hours discussing the resolution and be here until midnight with budget hearings.

Service disagreed, saying that it was the council's responsibility. Potholes and stray animals seem irrelevant if we are going to be aniahilated. She continued by saying that the council is not really acting alone but that nationwide councils and town meetings, churches and citizen groups are becoming involved.

David Pace said that there is a tradition of local government taking a position and that there is no provision for citizen input if you cannot speak as a council.

Milton Fisk, a member of the Bloomington Peace Coalition, said that citizens should encourage their representatives to speak regarding national issues.

Dr. Hugh Ramsey, former councilmember, spoke against the resolution and cited several examples and experiences against the philosophy of nuclear freeze. He concluded by saying that it was 'better to disagree than for both to be wrong'.

Howard Canada said that nuclear weapons were immoral and that asking for a better way was the only thing to do.

David Goodman presented a list of signatures from the third district supporting the freeze petition. He presented them to councilmember John Porter.

Scott Sanders expressed similar concerns, saying that the council had a responsibility to transmit the feelings of the populace.

Bill Stnadt (sp) a graduate student and veteran of Vietnam supported the nuclear freeze resolution.

Hogan said that this resolution addresses only the United States and not the USSR and does not take into consideration all of the other countries that possess nuclear weapons.

Sam Loescher said that the nuclear build-up must stop if we are to survive economically. Common Council Meeting July 21, 1982 Page 3

Hulda Clark expressed concern for pregnant women and the effects of nuclear radiation on the unborn child.

John Moore suggested a No vote because the resolution falls short of what is really needed.

Mary Lous Miler expressed similar citizen concern.

Jim Simmons, a Vietnam veteran spoke against nuclear war and war in general saying his credentials seemed to indicate that he had some experience with the issue and he supported the nuclear arms freeze.

The motion received a vote of Ayes: 6, Nays: 3 (Olcott, Hogan, Morrison).

The following ordinances were then introduced and read for first reading by title only after motions made by Olcott and seconded by Morrison.

Clerk Williams read the ordinances by title only and Dilcher read the legislative synopsis.
