Charlotte Zietlow announced that the
purpose of this meeting was to finish
the business remaining on the agenda when the
meeting of October 5, 1972, was
adjourned.

Councilman Mizell moved that the
agenda be expanded to include
consideration of Appropriations
Ordinance No. 72-7 for a first
reading. Councilman Davis seconded
the motion. The motion was carried by
a unanimous voice vote.

Councilman Morrison moved that
Ordinance No. 72-63 be advanced
to second reading and ready
by the Clerk by title only.
Councilman Towell seconded the motion.
The motion was carried by a unanimous
voice vote.

Grace Johnson read Ordinance
No. 72-63 by title only.

Councilman Morrison moved that

ORDINANCES - SECOND
READING

72-63 Animal Control

Councilman Powell said that the discussion of the ordinance by the Animal Control Commission led to these changes and some others which will be presented for first reading as a separate ordinance at this meeting. The amendments proposed for Ordinance No. 72-63 were judged to be, in substance, similar enough to the original ordinance to permit amendment. The additional changes suggested by the Commission were judged to require a new ordinance as they cover new ground.

Councilman Morrison said that he objected to the proposed amendments to the Municipal Code because they would require licensing of animals that are kept entirely on private property. Grace Johnson, City Clerk, pointed out that this was not a change in the law; she said that the Code has provided that all dogs in the City of Bloomington must be licensed, regardless of whether they are kept on private property all the time or not.

It was pointed out that all references to cats in the preamble should be deleted.

Carlos Ortigoza suggested that the Council might want to set up a permanent, life-time license for \$10.00 for a male and \$40.00 for a female. A member of the Animal Control Commission pointed out that this had been discussed and it had been decided that it would not be possible to refund the fee, should the animal die or the owners move away. She said that the method of waiving the fee licensing receipts would have the same effect as a life-time license. She noted that this would also cover pets that are given to new owners - if the pet has been licensed for eight years and the receipts are passed on to the new owner, the new owner would not have to pay for a new license. She said the dog, not the owner, was being licensed.

The question was called on the motion to amend.

Mr. Register explained that Ordinances 72-65 and 72-68 were being held for second reading for amendment. The one, dealing with South High Street would be amended to include a larger area.

Councilman Davis moved that Ordinance No. 72-69 be introduced and read by the Clerk. Councilman Mizell seconded the motion. The motion was carried by a unanimous voice vote.

Grace Johnson read Appropriations Ordinance
No. 72-7.

Mr. Wray explained that this money
is for the engineering, design and consultants
for the early implementation TOPICS PROJECTS,
and for the construction of East Third Street.
He said there may not be enough in this
appropriation for the Third Street work and
it may have to be amended later when a final decision
is made on the bid. He said he waited on this
until they could have some idea of just what the
Third Street construction will cost.

Mr. Wray said that the first priority has been
Third Street and second priority is 17th Street.
He said it looks as if there will be enough
money in the road and street account to get the
17th Street work done next spring. He said
other projects have been discussed, such as
North Dunn Street but that some of these projects
will have to be delayed a few months to a year
until the road and street account builds up.
He said Third Street may be about \$90,000 over
the original estimate. He explained that the
final estimate and bidding is handled by the
state and their figures differ from the original
ones worked out by the consultants. He noted
that the State's final estimate of what it
will cost has not been released since the
bids have not been awarded.
