Councilman Harry Day asked that the Clerk read proposed Resolution No. 67-18 in its entirety.

Resolution No. 67-18
(Police Academy)

The Deputy City Clerk read proposed Resolution No. 67-18.

Councilman Harry Day moved the adoption of proposed Resolution No. 67-18. The motion was seconded by Councilman Johnson and carried.

Mayor John H. Hooker, Jr. stated that the action of the General Assembly in creating a Police Academy was very timely. Now comes the question of a location for an Academy of Public Safety which would provide training for all law enforcement agencies. Indiana University has worked with the Indiana State Police Department, in training new recruits, for several years. The City of Bloomington has indicated its willingness to provide land for the location of the Academy. Mayor Hooker said he has sent a telegram to Robert O'Neal, Superintendent of the Indiana State Police Department, outlining the same points set forth in Resolution No. 67-18. It is imperative that an academy be connected with the community and the Administration Building is the most logical site since it has so close to offer the Academy, its personnel and its training. Mayor Hooker said copies of the resolution would be sent to both Governor Roger W. Braun and Superintendent O'Neal.

City Attorney James R. Cotner said a petition had been filed in court by Mrs. Robert L. Curdick, 215 Maxwell Lane, requesting the vacation of the lot of the north-south alley between Maxwell Avenue and Park Avenue and Maxwell Lane and Park Avenue. He stated this is not the usual procedure, since a petition of this kind is usually presented to the Common Council for action before a writ is filed. He said, however, since the request has been handled in this manner he has no objection but to file an action of denial.

The Street Department has been actively engaged in replacing signs, repainting directional signs and crosswalks in school areas, building sidewalks on East Third Street, South High Street, South Hamersack Street to Winslow Road and the work to be completed section from Sherwood Oaks to High Street.

Mr. Cotner said opposing briefs in the 1967 condemnation suit had been filed on the deadline date of September 1st. All briefs should be in by September 15, 1967.


CLERK NEW BUSINESS

A RESOLUTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLOOMINGTON, INDIANA
ON THE PROPOSED LOCATION OF AN INDIANA POLICE ACADEMY

WHEREAS the Common Council and the Mayor of the City of Bloomington, along with several other city administrations in Indiana, last year through the Municipal League of Indiana, requested the State of Indiana to establish an Indiana Police Academy, and

WHEREAS the State of Indiana has taken appropriate action for the establishment of an Indiana Police Academy and is now searching for an appropriate site, and

WHEREAS the City of Bloomington and the surrounding land areas offer major natural advantages for the effective functioning of the Academy, and

WHEREAS the City of Bloomington and Indiana University certainly would cooperate fully in meeting every need of the Academy which could be reasonably supplied,


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Common Council does now endorse the actions that have already been taken by the Mayor of the City of Bloomington to encourage the location of the Indiana Police Academy at Bloomington and it also urges the Mayor and all naturally concerned bodies in the community to take such appropriate additional actions as may be required to gain this desired objective, it being recognized that some of the reasons which justify Bloomington as the appropriate site are the following:

1. Adequate land resources in amount, location, and quality of terrain are readily available which include good opportunity for outdoor fire-arms training.
2. One of the strongest departments of Police Administration in this country is a part of the many attributes of Indiana University and there is every reason to expect the utmost cooperation and extremely valuable support in many ways from that Department in contributing to the Academy.
3. All the important basic sciences in police training such as chemistry, biological sciences and psychology are strongly developed and effectively functioning at Indiana University and all can be expected to


cooperate fully in providing expert consultants and extremely expensive laboratory facilities that certainly can be of major importance in modern police training and research.

4. The School of Law at Indiana University constitutes a source of great strength in several areas of much importance in police training and it includes some professors and programs that are particularly concerned with problems of law enforcement. Surely these valuable resources will be readily available to the Academy.
5. The School of Business at Indiana University will assuredly share its expertise in training leadership, management, executive development and research, all of which are important in modern police training.
6. The Research Computing Center at Indiana University is one of the strongest in academic institutions. The broad interests in computer science and expert knowledge in this area which encompasses much of the University certainly would be of value to the Academy.
7. There are various other areas of University activity and special competency that clearly have unique value including even the major intercollegiate athletic program which certainly has spectator appeal for police trainees and personnel.
8. The Indiana State Police Department has been conducting a training program at Indiana University for many years with obvious success and this has indeed acquainted many areas of the University and community with police training.
9. Because the City of Bloomington is one of the fastest growing municipalities of its size in Indiana and the University is one of the largest and most important in this country, the accessibility of the City to highways and airways are indeed sufficient to meet the needs of all who wish to travel to and from Bloomington.

10. The unusually rich recreational advantages of the Bloomington community and the other factors indicated have surely set in motion major improvements in the highways of this area thus strongly promising to effect better accessibility in the near future.
11. Major improvements in the Monroe County Municipal Airport are virtually completed which will provide excellent service for commercial as well as private aircraft.
12. The unusually rich educational, cultural and recreational advantages of Bloomington and the surrounding community would be particularly advantageous in the attraction of high quality personnel to the Academy and in promoting good morale.
