REMONSTRANCES AND OBJECTIONS

Mayor Hooker introduced Mr. Jack Noon, Sanitary Engineer for the Indiana State Board of Health, who spoke briefly on proposed Ordinance No. 66-38. Mr. Noon said the Indiana Air Pollution Control Law became effective January 1, 1963. The State Board of Health does not have rules and regulations for enforcement of this law; rather, the primary responsibility continues to rest with each local area. He said Bloomington's proposed ordinance sets up the administrative organization very well and what few minor changes he would suggest, he had discussed with Councilman Harry Day.

Mr. Robert Snoddy suggested that the Mayor's appointments to the Board for the Examination and Registration of Electricians be made for one, two, three and four years so that their terms of service will be staggered. This method will keep people on the board who are familiar with the workings and actions of the board.

MESSAGES FROM MAYOR

There has been finished the first of four water reservoirs to be located on the grounds of the Monroe Purification Station.

General programs are recovering from bad weather and shortage of help.

Plans for the North Sewage Improvement Program are being finished by Black and Veatch and will be forwarded to the Indiana State Board of Health.

We will be under construction on the Parks and Recreation Improvement Program no later than February 1, 1967. Mr. Hooker complimented City Attorney James Cotner and the Parks and Recreation Board members for their combined activities.

There is no new street construction in progress at the present time. The primary program in the Street Department is leaf collection. Adverse weather conditions has affected the schedule somewhat.

Public Service Indiana is constructing the Atwater Avenue phase of the 1966 street lighting program. There is no way to give a definite time when the new lighting will be in use. Electrical apparatus is critically short of supply all over the United States.

Weather permitting, work on the further widening of Third Street will be started within a week.


OTHER NEW BUSINESS





RESOLUTION No. 66-23

WHEREAS, the City of Bloomington, Indiana, is the home of Indiana University attended by 25,000 students who, together with their parents, travel to and from the City of Bloomington many times each year, and

WHEREAS, adjacent to the City of Bloomington there are located several large industries, such as: Radio Corporation of America, Sarkes Tarzian, Inc., Otis Elevator, Westinghouse Electric Corporation, and Hotpoint Division of General Electric, each of which industries employs thousands of persons who must travel to the City of Bloomington from other towns, and each of which industries uses the roads going into and out of Bloomington for the transportation of materials and supplies by trucks, and

WHEREAS, there is located near the City of Bloomington, the largest body of water within the State of Indiana, the Monroe Reservoir, which has and will attract hundreds of thousands of tourists each year who will use the roads adjacent to Bloomington, and

WHEREAS, Bloomington is rapidly growing and becoming the metropolitan center of culture, education and outdoor recreation of the State of Indiana, with the increasing travel to and from the City of Bloomington resulting from such development, and


WHEREAS, State Highway #37 between Bloomington and Bedford, the dangerous and hazardous road upon which each year there is a number of accidents causing serious personal injuries and fatalities, and


WHEREAS, State Highway #37, between Bloomington and Bedford, is traveled upon by over 14,000 cars upon an average day and far in excess of such number of cars upon those days of special events, such as: football games, basketball games, conferences, etc., occurring in the city, and

WHEREAS, the State of Indiana has a vested interest in the providing of good roads to Indiana University where the citizens of the State of Indiana have an investment of many millions of dollars and where thousands of their children come each year, and

WHEREAS, the State of Indiana has a vested interest in providing good roads to the Monroe Reservoir,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor of the City of Bloomington, together with the Common Council, formally record their support of the construction of a four-lane highway paralleling the present State Highway #37, between the City of Bedford and Dillman Road, the southern terminus of Highway #37 Bypass.
