

The Community Gardening Program

Grow closer to your food! Community Gardening offers a variety of gardening opportunities for individuals, families, groups, and organizations. Services provided in the gardens include the initial preparation of the garden area, water sources, maintained paths, composting facilities, fencing, the advice of program staff, and the Garden Beet newsletter. Communal tools are available for use at scheduled times during the week. Gardeners with disabilities or other limitations will find gardening support, including accessible raised beds and access to adaptive tools. Both gardens have plenty of conveniently located parking and are accessible by Bloomington Transit bus routes. Plots are available for use starting in mid-April. Some plots at Willie Streeter, including raised beds, and all plots at Butler Park allow for year-round use.

How to register

Returning gardeners in good standing may renew the rental of the same plot(s) in which they gardened in 2017 between February 1–16.

New gardeners and returning gardeners who wish to garden in an additional plot or in plot(s) other than those rented in 2017 may register on a first-come, first-served basis starting on February 20.

Butler Park Community Gardens

Located in Rev. Ernest D. Butler Park at the intersection of West Ninth and North Fairview
Streets, the Butler Park Community Garden enables gardeners to learn and practice the techniques of organic gardening in rented plots. Now in its eighth season, the garden includes 38 organic in-ground plots available in two sizes and three raised beds for rent. This garden area also supports the Community Gardening program's partnership with Mother Hubbard's Cupboard, a local food resource center, by providing space for them to maintain a hoop house, continue their youth and gardening internship programs, and produce more food for those in need.
