

Bloomington housing study released

Commissioned in August 2019, the <u>Bloomington housing study</u> assesses the city's housing needs and recommends strategies to provide safe, affordable housing for all residents. The study includes impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, which served to highlight certain trends and vulnerabilities. Among its findings, the study determined that:

- Over 60% of renter households and nearly 30% of owneroccupied households in Bloomington are cost-burdened, spending more than 30% of their income on housing.
- The median sales price of a home in Bloomington rose from \$167,000 in 2016 to \$217,000 in 2019, a 30% increase in three years.
- Bloomington's population has grown at a consistent rate of 1.3-1.9% annually since 1980, and will need an additional 2,592 housing units of a variety of types (beyond student housing units) to accommodate projected population growth by 2030.
- A landlord survey revealed a rental vacancy rate of just below 2%, significantly lower than the estimated vacancy rate of almost 9%.

The study suggests potential strategic housing and neighborhood goals, including streamlining the development review and approval process, conserving existing housing stock as the most affordable and sustainable option, and leveraging new development opportunities such as those at the existing hospital site and alongside Switchyard Park. Finally, the strategies report proposes achieving the aforementioned goals, including community partnerships, options, creative financing sustainable building practices.

Parks and Recreation requests your input

The Parks and Recreation Department invites the community to help develop the Parks' priorities over the next five years. The department is encouraging residents to provide input about Parks' programming and facilities through an online survey during the first stage of updating its Master Plan. The online survey can be found bloomington.in.gov/parks. Paper copies of the survey will also be available at the Twin Lakes Recreation Center, Cascades Golf Course pro shop, Banneker Community Center, and the Parks and Recreation office in City Hall (401 N. Morton St.). The department hopes to collect at least 600 survey responses by September 18.



The Monroe County Health Department has issued <u>recommendations</u> for <u>communal living</u> <u>facilities</u>, including campus organizations with group living facilities, such as fraternities and sororities, as well as off-campus rooming houses.

Results of Digital Equity Study Released

The City of Bloomington has published the results of a survey assessing how residents use internet services as the first step in the development of Mayor John Hamilton's Digital Equity Strategic Plan. Results of the scientific survey, completed by 1,080 respondents, have been collected and are being analyzed with the goal of improving internet accessibility and affordability for Bloomington residents. The survey's full results are available here.

Among the survey's preliminary findings:

- 12% of low-income respondents never interact with the internet.
- Lower-bandwidth households report significant difficulties in completing homework due to internet deficiencies.
- Fully half of respondents said their job now requires internet access at home.

Fresh Food Fridays at Hoosier Hills Food Bank

Hoosier Hills Food Bank's Fresh Food Friday distribution continues on August 21 and September 4 & 18, from 11:00am to 3:00pm at 2333 West Industrial Park Drive. Each box, available to anyone in need of food, includes fresh produce, dairy products, and frozen meat. No ID or proof of income is required.
