Assistance for flood damaged homes & businesses

Have you been financially impacted by the flooding event on June 18 and June 19, 2021?

The Small Business Administration (SBA), along with the Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS), will be available in Bloomington this week to talk to renters, homeowners, and business owners to discuss applying for a loan through the SBA. If you do not qualify for a loan, you may be eligible for assistance through the State Disaster Relief Fund administered by IDHS. If your home or business has been affected by the June floods, you are encouraged to take the opportunity to see if you qualify.

In order to complete an application at this event, please be prepared by bringing the follow documentation with you:

- Photo ID (Driver's License or State Issued);
- Copy of Deed or Mortgage (for homeowners);
- Copy of lease agreement, utility bills and rent receipts (for renters);
- Copy of insurance policies (homeowners/renters, automobile);
- Bank information/voided check (disaster relief funds are direct deposited into your bank account);
- **Detailed list of damages** (track all flood-related expenses and retain your receipts);
- Preferred email address (for communications from the IDRF).

The Bloomington Green Home Improvement Program (BGHIP) provides \$1,000 rebates and low-interest loans to Bloomington homeowners who complete eligible energy efficiency upgrades to their homes.

Eligible BGHIP projects include:

- Solar photovoltaic system installation
- Geothermal heat pump systems
- Other green home improvements:
 - HVAC
 - Water heating
 - Lighting
 - Appliances
 - Energy analysis and monitoring
 - Building envelope
 - Electrical vehicle charger

1,000 Households Who Mulch - Sign up now!

A Note from the City of Bloomington Director of Innovation:

I recently answered an email from a frustrated resident who lives at the bottom of a hill on a cul-de-sac. Because of the wind patterns, every year she ends up raking not just the leaves from her own trees, but also leaves blown from many of the other yards on her street. The situation felt unfair and she asked: "What can the City DO about this?!" It is a tricky situation - unlike snow, leaves don't stay where you put them... unless you process them in some way.

If you want to stop raking the leaves from all the trees in your neighborhood, ask your neighbors to sign up for the "1,000 Households Who Mulch" pilot project!

Instead of raking their leaves to the edge of their property where they can blow into the street, onto sidewalks, into storm drains, and into your yard, we'll give your neighbors all the information they need to try any number of mulching or composting options. Heck – we even have people who will come to their yard and help them!

Have you been mulching and composting for years? This pilot is also for YOU! We have partners like the IU Campus Farm, Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Monroe County Parks and Recreation Department who can show you the research they have been doing to MAKE YOUR COMPOSTING EVEN BETTER!

Please help keep the storm drains clear

Have you noticed that many trees have brown tufts of leaves at the ends of their branches?

The cicadas may be gone, but they've left a lot of dead tree "tufts" in their wake. The tufts are dropping off the trees and ending up in storm drains. The heavy rains recently experienced locally, remind us that blocked storm drains are particularly problematic at this time of year.







YOU can help by keeping a watchful eye on the storm drains near you to ensure they are not clogged. If you do come across an inlet that is clogged, please report it to the City via the <u>uReport</u> system. Better yet, if you are so inclined, you can clear out the storm drain yourself! While you're at it, be sure to check your gutters and downspouts as well.

Sleeping behind a closed bedroom door could save you life in a fire

Do you close your bedroom doors before you go to sleep? If not, now is a great time to start! Check out these facts about the importance of closed doors in a house fire:

- 50% of house fires happen between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. Closing your doors before you sleep helps keep you safe
- Because of the increased use of synthetic materials in furniture and construction, fire spreads faster than ever before. Closing doors helps stop the spread of fire.
- A closed door can mean reducing 1,000 degrees down to 100 degrees.
- During a fire, a closed door can keep carbon monoxide levels at 1,000 PPM, versus 10,000 PPM if the door is left open.
- A fire needs oxygen to burn. A closed door keeps more oxygen in the room and away from the fire. When you exit a fire, be sure to close your door behind you to slow down its growth.
