




Department Funding

Annual Budget: \$9.5 million

Switchyard Park

► Vision:

- ▶ Boldly transform an industrial legacy site into a signature urban park through innovative design and forward thinking, restorative, environmental strategies
- ► A park that:
 - ▶ recalls the sites unique history and identity
 - reconnects the city
 - ▶ inspires social interaction and civic celebration
 - catalyzes future development in the surrounding community





PROJECT TIMELINE

- ▶ **1853** Railroad service begins in Bloomington
- ▶ **1892** Switchyard with Roundhouse constructed
- ▶ 1910 Named McDoel Switchyard 700 rail car capacity
- ▶ 1967 Train passenger service ends
- ▶ 2000 CSX Railroad contacts COB about possible sale of rail corridor
- 2005 3.1 mile rail corridor purchased
- ▶ 2009/2011 Phases I and II of B-Line Trail completed
- ▶ **2009** COB purchases Switchyard property
- 2012 Switchyard Park Master Plan completed
- ▶ 2013 "Triple C" property (Rogers St.) acquired
- 2015 Park design begins, "Wee-Willies" property (Walnut St.) acquired
- 2018 Construction begins (May)
- ▶ 2019 Sections of the park open for public use (November)
- 2021 Final completion


