# What Grants are Available for my Neighborhood?

The Housing and Neighborhood Development Department (HAND) is proud to offer three types of grants for Neighborhoods.

The largest grant is the Neighborhood Improvement Grant. This grant program is very popular because it allows neighborhood groups to apply for funding for non-traditional projects in their neighborhoods. These projects must be larger than \$2,000 and requires a match component.

The second grant option is the **Small and Simple Grant**, which does not require a match component. The maximum amount that can be requested annually is \$500.

The last grant option is the Neighborhood Cleanup Grant, which allows neighborhoods who have demonstrated the need and ability to conduct a successful clean-up, are awarded a HAND sponsored Neighborhood Cleanup.

What is the process for a Neighborhood Improvement Grant?

- Informational Meeting
- · Letter of Intent
- Technical Assistance Meeting
- Submit Application
- Neighborhood Presentations

What is the process for a Small and Simple Grants?

- Write a one page narrative and budget sheet
- Submit Application
- Accepted year-round
- Can only receive grant once per year

What is the process for a Neighborhood Cleanup Grant?

- Choose a weekend that works for the neighborhood
- Gather reliable volunteers
- Submit Application by due date


This guide is primarily for neighborhood residents to explore and plan the materials, events, and projects for their community.




